



ARGENTINE STATE UNDER RECEIVER

Political Twiggle in Entire Rios Necesitates Appointment of Federal Interventor

(United Press) — Buenos Aires, Jan. 7. The Argentine state of Entre Rios, today is in the hands of a receiver, whose duty is not to wipe out the province's affairs, but to straiten them out.

The Entre Rios receiver, or Interventor, is Dr. Joaquin S. de Anchorena. The provincial governor is Dr. Miguel Laurencena. Dr. Laurencena is a radical, like national President Trigo-

polon. The Entre Rios legislature is due to elect two senators to send to the federal upper house in Buenos Aires. On joint ballot the legislature is radical by a majority of two votes. Therefore the two senators presumably will be radicals.

The conservative members of the legislature do not want this to happen. Consequently they stay away from the sessions and Governor Laurencena cannot get a quorum.

After repeated attempts to overcome this difficulty the governor appealed to the president. The president placed the situation in the hands of Dr. de Anchorena, as receiver, or interventor.

Federal intervention in the province is not unusual in Argentina. When President Trigo-

polon went into office, as a radical, there were many predictions that he would radicalize all the conservative states by means of intervention.

This was the way in which it was prophesied President Trigo-

polon would do it, but there has been only the one case so far.

CONTRACTS LET FOR WARSHIPS

Four Battleships, Twenty Destroyers and Thirty Submarines are to be Constructed

(United Press) — WASHINGTON, Jan. 7. — The last session of the sixty-fourth congress appropriated \$13,384,212 for the 1917 naval building program. The act was approved August 29, 1916, and the money has ever since been available.

Of the sixty-six vessels authorized, however, in this, the greatest preparedness step in the history of the nation, sixty-six keels yet remain to be laid.

Inability to agree on terms and of costs demanded by private yards have been responsible for the delay, according to Secretary Daniels.

Contracts are yet to be signed for eight of the proposed new vessels, and of the other fifty-eight there remain eighteen authorized submarines for which the building terms are not yet complete.

For the entire program of construction, bids have been received for all but one vessel. This is an ammunition ship for which bids were opened January 3. Contracts already have been placed for four battleships, twenty destroyers, and three submarines. For eighteen of the last named, however, certain details yet remain to be worked out before their construction can be started.

Four authorized battle cruisers are also awaiting final action on building terms before their keels can be laid.

Under the appropriation act provision must be made for the construction of the entire program by February 29.

WOMAN ATTORNEY FOR WAGE LAW

Assistant Attorney General of Colorado Opens Battle Before the Legislature

(United Press) — DENVER, Colo., Jan. 7. Miss Clara Ruth Mozzer, the only woman assistant state attorney general in the United States, appointed to the position in response to the demands of the women of this state, started her campaign to force the legislature to live up to its pledges and put through a minimum wage for women at the present session of the state legislature.

The bill passed by the legislature and vetoed by the governor will be considered and reworked at this session. The most important changes in the bill, which is patterned after the Oregon law, will be the inclusion of piece workmen as well as wage workers in the minimum, according to Miss Mozzer. If the bill passes, all cases coming under the new law while she holds office will be turned over to Miss Mozzer.

HEGSED PROJECT IS WORTHLESS SAYS SMITH

HOISE—State Engineer J. H. Smith has not changed his mind with regard to the Hegsted project and in a report to the state land-board sets forth he can see no merit to it as a Carey act project.

In a separate report regarding the Harrington Land and Irrigation company which was before the state land board the first of the week he says that notice should be served the various entrepreneurs to show reasons why their contracts should not be cancelled, and the entries cancelled unless reasons for not doing so are shown.

At the land board meeting the early part of the week it was said that the lands within the Hegsted project were being held to the exclusion of bona fide entrymen and that there was not enough water to irrigate them. The board showed a disposition to cancel the contract of the company with the state and throw the lands open to entry but first referred the matter to the state engineer.

**AMBASSADORS NOT ON SOCIABLE TERM, M**

Peace Discussions Fall to Oblivion Need of Separate Banquet—Mrs. Wilson Social Arbitrer.

(United Press)

WASHINGTON, Jan. 9.—Discussions of peace haven't reached the stage yet that the "bellicose" delegates at Washington are "exactly chummy." Hence the President again this year is having two diplomatic dinners instead of one—and the first is tonight.

Ambassador Jusserand of France, being the dean of the diplomatic corps here, is the guest of honor. Oaths to be sworn about the executive table in the state dining room of the White House include representatives in Washington of the entente allies and neutral diplomats, together with their wives.

Madame Jusserand will sit at the president's right and Ambassador Jusserand at the right of Mrs. Wilson. The Teutonic allies, together with neutrals, will be represented at the diplomatic dinner next Tuesday evening in the White House.

Mrs. Wilson today is the "ultimate authority" of all invitations at White House social functions. For the first time in years, management of these events has been transferred from the executive officers to the mansion proprietor. As a result, the number of invited guests to the state events has fallen off between fifty and sixty per cent. Incidentally the new regime has brought joy and peace to the minds of assistant secretaries in the business wing of the White House. In the past, the faddish elbow by the President have been attended about equally by those on the regular White House list and by those who request special invitations. Each reception is preceded by letters and phone calls from Senators, Congressmen and others, appearing in behalf of themselves or others, for preclusion of admittance.

Not its all changed. The assistants merely refer those asking invitations, directly to Mrs. Wilson or her secretary, Miss Edith Bennett. Hence the big reduction in guests, noted for the first time at the judicial reception.

**COLONIZATION THE SUBJECT OF MESSAGE**

Governor Johnson Makes Strong Recommendations to Golden State Senators—Reservation Falls.

(United Press)

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Jan. 9.—With the development and colonization of California's agricultural lands as the chief business at hand the state legislature convened here yesterday. Governor Hiram W. Johnson, United States Senator-elect, emphasized the importance of this work in his message to the lawmakers. The water problems conference, appointed by the governor, called attention to the vast possibilities of the state's water resources which, it was pointed out, can be made a source of great wealth to the state. The greater portion of the great Sacramento valley, for instance, is not being cultivated because there is no method of water storage for irrigation.

When Frank Eckward was eliminated as his Republican opponent for the seat in the legislature by the primary election months ago, John D. Wilgard, also a Republican, came here and "rescued" his seat in the assembly. Yesterday Eckward, who left the Republican party after his primary defeat, ran on another ticket and was elected, sat down in Eckward's "reserved" seat.
