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SETTLERS WILL ASK IRRIGATION DISTRICT VOTE

Land-Owners of Salmon River Tract File Notice of Intention to Submit Petition to Commissioners

Notice of intention to file a petition for the creation of the Salmon River irrigation district, to include all of the lands to be retained within the project, in accordance with the recommendations in a report to the state land board, was filed by W. C. Williams, state land commissioner, was filed with the county commissioners here Saturday by Judge James R. Bothwell, attorney for the Salmon River Settlers' association.

The petition, bearing the signatures of 100 landowners of the proposed district, will be presented before the commissioners on Tuesday, September 10. The commissioners will then set a date for a public hearing on the proposition, and if favored will call an election for the creation of the district.

To Take Over System

It is the purpose of the petitioners, according to the notice filed Saturday, to take over the irrigation system and its operation, including the construction of the dam, works of diversion, canal, laterals and distribution system, built by the Salmon River Land & Water company, for the irrigation of the project, together with water rights applied for and appurtenant to the lands included within it.

In pursuance of this plan, if the district is created, the directors of the district, who will be elected by the voters of the district, will take over the operation of the project, and the financial affairs of the project since the financial failure of the construction company.

To Treat on Damages

SAYS THRESHER MUST ACCEPT AGREED PRICE

County Food Administrator Warns Against Violation of Control Act—Declares the Schedule Must Stand

Issuing a note of warning of action which will result from violation of the marketing price schedule adopted by the state and farmers of this county and approved by the state food administration, County Food Administrator C. H. Hansen has issued a circular letter to all the threshers of Twin Falls county, in which he says:

Both Meeting Kicks Over

We understand that a number of threshers met at Boise and raised the price of threshing wheat to seven cents and other grain one cent, when there had been already a county-wide meeting at which all threshers were present and at which a price of six cents for threshing wheat was decided upon. After this was agreed upon, the food administration approved it, and this group raised the price with out the approval of the administration.

This letter is to inform you that we are notifying the farmers that anyone who will bring his threshing receipts into my office can settle with me at the former set price and I will see that the threshers accept it as satisfactory.

Penalty in Similar Instance

The action of this group is in defiance of the food control act which I have said and at which a price of six cents for threshing wheat was decided upon. After farmers and threshers in Pike county, Illinois, had mutually agreed upon a fair threshing price which was later approved by the food administration, an effort to raise the price was made, resulting in a fine of \$15, to teach the latter that such action and agreements are to be held up and respected that we are now at war. Any manifestations of this Hobbesian attitude here at home will be fought equally as hard.

Another practice which has been continued as unlawful and for which a severe penalty is provided is that of "padding up" some farmers and going to others who offer a bonus.

ARMY CALLS FOR TYPIST VOLUNTEERS

Photographers Qualified for Limited Service May Be Given Opportunity to Serve in the Departments of the Judge Advocate General and of the Provost Marshal General

Photographers who have had legal training and who are qualified only for limited or special military service have an opportunity to volunteer for service in the departments of the judge advocate general and of the provost marshal general, and to receive special training. Only white men in group O qualified for limited or special military service will be accepted under this call.

This office will receive, within a short time a call for a large number of typists who have had legal training. Only white men in group O qualified for limited or special military service will be accepted under this call.

Men who qualify under this call will probably be assigned to the judge advocate general's department, and they will be required to report camp, martial cases and attend to other matters pertaining to military law in the field. The work is interesting and will give valuable experience to the fortunate applicants.

Qualified registrants should be urged to present themselves to their local boards and have their names listed for this service. Local boards must be cautioned also not to permit any man to be listed who is not fully qualified for this service, and not to induct men until further orders are received. On August 31 local boards should notify their office of the number of qualified men who have volunteered. Your office should compile these returns and advise this office not later than September 3 the number available in your state. Upon receipt of this information this office will give the allotments and give full instructions regarding details.

Corporal Turlock Wake, of Burley, Tells of Surroundings of Comrades of 146th Artillery in France

IDAHO GUNNERS ARE WELL AND COMFORTABLE

Is Detailed After Night Days in Action at Chateau-Thierry to Return to United States as Instructor

Bringing home messages of encouragement from the Idaho boys at the battlefield in France, Corporal Turlock Wake of Burley, a member of the One Hundred Forty-sixth field artillery regiment, who has been detailed as an instructor of heavy artillery at Camp Jackson, South Carolina, spent a few hours Tuesday with students in Twin Falls.

Orders Take Him from Camp

Corporal Wake received notice of his assignment as an instructor at the South Carolina training camp on July 15, the eighth day after his regiment entered the fight at Chateau-Thierry. He was firing a 155 millimeter French gun at a range of eight miles at the time he was given the assignment. He was given the assignment to return to the United States. ## LET CONTRACTS FOR BUILDING OF THREE BRIDGES

Commissioners Award Construction of Spans Across Rock Creek and Low Line Canal to C. H. Muhl

Contracts for the construction of three local bridges were let Saturday afternoon by the county commissioners at a meeting held in Charles H. Muhl of Twin Falls. One of the bridges, 52 feet in length, is to span Rock Creek immediately west of the Twin Falls sugar factory. The others are to span the low line canal. One, 70 feet in length, is to be built across the canal one-half mile east and two miles south of Filer, and the other, 70 feet in length, is to span the watercourse three miles south of Kimberly. All of the bridges are to be installed with concrete abutments. Mr. Muhl has won the Rock Creek bridge over \$3,000 and on the canal bridge \$2,000.

## BID FAREWELL TO MEN LEAVING TO GET THE RUN

Departure of Thirty-five More Registrants for Training Camps Is Signal for Another Demonstration in Twin Falls

## CROWDS ESCORT MEN IN MARCH TO DEPOT

Red Cross Women Serve Dinner and Supply Sandwiches and Melons for Conscription En Route to Camp

That the magnitude and fervor of a farewell demonstration for men leaving Twin Falls to enter the military service is not limited by the number of men enlisting was evidenced Monday evening when a crowd fully as large as has assembled here on previous occasions gathered to bid farewell to the 35 men who entrained here at that time for Camp Lewis.

Twenty-four of these men were registrants of this county, who, with 10 others leaving from other points, fulfill the quota under this call for men from Twin Falls county. Eleven were registrants of other districts who had been transferred to entrain here with the Twin Falls county party.

**Fight Against Tears**

Assembling at 8 o'clock at the intersection of Main avenue and Shoshone street with the Twin Falls band and veterans of the G. A. R. who formed their escort, the men leaving here to enter the service marched to the railway station. Among the crowd that lined the walks cheering and shouting words of encouragement to the men who are going to help destroy the Hun, there were stout hearts that fought bravely to keep back the tears that rose to the surface notwithstanding, and the hand of practically every man leaving to don the khaki was clutched by a relative or friend, so that it was difficult to distinguish, except for the red or white badges worn by the registrants, which were the men enlisting.

From the time they reported at 10 o'clock Monday morning at the office of the local board, these men were in the military service of the United States. Dinner was served to them at 12:00 o'clock by the women of the Twin Falls Red Cross branch, who also put on board the car a box of sandwiches and three watermelons for the delectation of the men enroute.

**Examinations Held Two Back**

Physical examinations of the men made Monday afternoon resulted in the disqualification of James H. D. Mathews of Twin Falls, for general military service, and the holding of Marlow Morse Rowley of Murtagh, for further examination by the medical advisory board.

Four of the 1918 class registrants called to fill this quota, were not needed and will be called at a later date, while five of the 1918 registrants who had volunteered for induction at this time, were forwarded to Camp Lewis. 
