Upon the refusal of the Canal company to issue this stock, Mr. Swim appealed to J. A. Bybee, irrigation engineer, who sustained his contention, holding that no injury to the Canal company or to any stockholder could result from this proposed application of water to beneficial use.

Finch declared it his opinion that one who was not sufficiently interested to attend the meeting in person should be denied representation by L. E. Daniel and by George Leth argued to the same effect, calling for a vote on the original motion.

The organization meeting was recessed from 12 o'clock noon until 3 o'clock in the afternoon on account of the absence of a quorum at the earlier session. At that time T. R. Allen stated that there was no objection to the cancellation of proxies, but that he was not present, but that this matter was not taken up at the later session.

## DEMANDS DAMAGES FOR CANAL BREAK INJURY

A. C. Kline Sues Canal Company for \$1500—Says Flood Impaired Value of Land

Claiming damages in the sum of \$1,500 as a result of injury to his lands, situated six miles southeast of Twin Falls, as a result of the breaking on August 5, 1917, of a canal above his farm, S. C. Kline, through his attorney, T. K. Hackman, has brought an action in district court here for the recovery of this amount from the Twin Falls Canal company. The complaint sets out that the land alleged to have been damaged had been prepared for growing crops this year, and that injury resulted from the washing away of soil and depositing of foreign matter. The canal at the point where the break occurred is alleged to have been defective in construction or insufficient for the purpose for which it was built.

# SAVES TRAINING IS SAFEGUARD OF THE SOLDIER

First Sergeant W. H. Abendroth, U. S. Military Instructor, Talks on Students' Army Training Corps

Discussing the work of the American fighting men in the war for human rights and illustrating his address by means of an exhibit of the trench equipment of the Tenth Infantry, First Sergeant W. H. Abendroth, military instructor at the University of Idaho, spoke in the high school auditorium Wednesday evening to an audience made up of practically the entire enrollment of boy students, their parents and others interested in the subject of the government plan for the technical training of prospective soldiers.

His talk had to do principally with the students army training corps, which is being organized in this state at the University of Idaho, under instructions from the war department. Idaho is expected to train as many men as can be accommodated in this corps and at least 200, Sergeant Abendroth said.

## Preparedness and the Individual

In reply to a mother in another Idaho city who had suggested that the training course was to teach men to kill others, Sergeant Abendroth related that he had replied that the object was far different. It was, he said, to teach men to take care of themselves and prevent others from killing them. The trench equipment of the American infantryman, including rifle, bayonet, gas mask, food, pick, etc., weighs 70 pounds. A mother in Boise asked if her boy would be expected to carry this load. Sergeant Abendroth said: "Madam," he replied, "if your boy is developed to a point where this equipment will be given him to carry, he will not be a boy any longer—he will be a man."

Sergeant Abendroth visited the high school Wednesday afternoon. While there he asked that the students, accompanied by the orchestra, which was rehearsing "The Big Boy Band," in order that he might point out to the students the proper manner of standing and behavior while the national air was being played. ## WENDELL CHEESE SCORES HIGHEST IN CONTEST

State University Extension Department Reports on Results of Dairy Products Judging

Samples of cheese entered by the Wendell Cooperative Creamery, Wendell, Idaho, scored first with 95 points in the fifth educational dairy products scoring contest conducted by the extension department at the University of Idaho. The samples of both cheese and butter entered in this contest were scored by W. F. Gerholdt, assistant dairy manufacturing specialist, and F. R. Cammack, field dairyman. The final scoring will be held during fair week, after which the prize winners and prizes offered will be announced. Following is the report on the results of the fifth contest:

The cheese samples exhibited were of a higher grade than those sent to the two previous contests. The final scores for most of these were very close. The Wendell cheese was of excellent quality being uniformly good in flavor and texture.

Two of the samples fell down in flavor while the others had poor texture. The following is the score of those totaling over 80:

Wendell Cooperative, Wendell, Idaho, 95; Clover Leaf, Buhl, Idaho, 93 1/2; Mutual, Georgetown, Idaho, 93 1/2; Nelsa, Idaho, Driggs, Idaho, 93 1/2; Mead, Pella, Idaho, 92.

The better samples also showed improvement. The worst defects in flavor were old cream and curdy, while sticky brine and lumpy were the criticisms given. The following exhibited better texture above 80:

## PLenty FOR ALL

Apparently the Government will take a hand in the matter of prices charged over the country for the necessities of life. It is good.

There is something sickening in the thought of millions made in a few months by means of government contracts for the supplying war materials. There is disgust in the heart of every honest man when it is known that profits running into millions are piled up by greedy men and vicious combinations of capital while the cream of America's young manhood gives up life itself for a wage of \$30.00 a month.

Food and clothing cost too much money. Somebody is making a greater profit than he has any right to. Somewhere the figures must be trimmed. Nobody is going to be put out of business, no change will be affected which will give a still greater opportunity to some other class. Goods are going to be placed in the hands of the ultimate consumer in return for a money price which will still leave the buyer with a little money left for himself at the end of the month. Enough to enable him to buy war savings stamps cheerfully and clip an occasional coupon from his bond or two with enthusiasm.

Notwithstanding the remarkable efforts made by the packing trust to prove to the world that its earnings are so small as to seem almost pitiful, the government investigation of the affairs of the combine must still be regarded as the main source of reliable information as to the operations of the beef barons. The retail prices of these products must be cut down. The trust must be compelled to get along, in fact, with a reasonable earning on its operations.

The various other food combines must be similarly treated, with an eye single to the great outstanding fact that men and women must live.

But let it be remembered that all these things take time. Such reforms cannot be instituted in a minute. To begin with it is necessary to get at the facts, and the facts are not always an open book. But a start was made a long time ago. The beginning of the end was in sight with the first picking of the skin when the probe was decided upon as the preliminary measure of correction.

The American Government may be depended upon to get clear to the bottom of the whole wretched business of the gouging of the American public. The responsibility is to be fixed and the abuse corrected. The comparatively few men engaged in the practice will be dealt with according to the measure of their works, good and bad. There need be no injustice and no thought of revenge. Such evils must be corrected, that is all.

Loyal America awaits with confidence the outcome of the Government's announcement.

## SETTLING A STRIKE

No one can escape the element of exact justice contained in the letter of President Wilson to the striking machinists of Bridgeport. The remedy applied is a drastic one but not more so than the exigencies of the occasion demand. In the case of the Smith-Wesson company, which, like the union machinists, declined to abide by the findings of the board of arbitration which existed purely by reason of the willingness of both employer and employee that it should exist, the same impartial course is pursued. The Government takes over the plant. The workers are invited to return to work or be drafted into army or navy.

Here is the essence of the executive action as outlined in the President's letter:

The Smith and Wesson company of Springfield, Mass., engaged in government work, has refused to accept the mediation of the national war labor board and has flaunted its power of decision approved by Presidential proclamation.

With my consent the war department has taken the necessary steps to secure the necessary production and to secure the necessary service of the company.

able rules and procedures for the settlement of industrial disputes. Having exercised a drastic remedy with recalcitrant employers, it is my duty to use means equally well adapted to that end with lawless and faithless employees.

Therefore I desire that you return to work and abide by the award. If you refuse, each of you will be barred from employment in any war industry in the community in which the strike occurred for a period of one year. During that time the United States employment service will decline to obtain employment for you in any war industry elsewhere in the United States as well as under the war and navy departments, the shipping board, the railroad administration and all other government agencies and the draft boards will be instructed to reject any claim of exemption, based on alleged usefulness in war production.

It is difficult to escape the conviction that the President meant business when he wrote this letter, or that his action in the premises is other than just exactly right.

## A HEAVY BURDEN

On the basis of the facts as they exist, the farmers of Twin Falls County have a just cause of complaint in connection with the lack of arrangements made, or matter of arrangements, for the marketing of their wheat.

As matters now stand there is no provision for the purchase of this year's wheat crop. The mills buy up to the capacity of their elevators and marketing ceases until such time as cars are obtained for the hauling away of that already bought. When this is done more wheat is or will be bought, presumably, but in the meantime the farmers are being assessed at the rate of 10 per cent on the value of their crop. They are carrying their crop at this rate of expense, and the fact constitutes a fixed and definite charge against the value of the grain which was never contemplated and never intended, when the wheat was put in the ground.

It is not likely that the individual farmers of Twin Falls County will offer any very strong criticism of the circumstances which have resulted in the conditions now existing. They will cheerfully go on borrowing at current interest rates against the crop which will some day be marketed, just as long as they can get the money. But the apparent lack of adequate provision to pay for the wheat works a hardship upon every line of business in the county. The customary "settling up" period of the Fall of the year, has this year failed to materialize. The results are such as to be gravely disquieting.

The matter is not the fault of the mills. So far this year probably a million dollars has been used by the mills in the purchase of wheat. Some of this has been shipped and some of it is still in the warehouse and elevators, but there is apparently no provision whereby the government is enabled to pay for it at this time, and seemingly there is no means of finding out when it will be paid for.

Upon the farmer falls the burden of the bulk of the load. As long as it is necessary that he should continue to carry this load the farmer will not complain, but the farmer and everybody else would like to be very sure that it is necessary.

## FROM THE IDEAS

Enacted by the Eleventh Session of the Idaho Legislature, 1911—Session 160, Article XVII of this Act.

"In all districts of this state, all parents, guardians or persons having care of children shall insure them, or cause them to be insured, in reading, writing, spelling, English grammar, geography and arithmetic. In such districts, every parent, guardian, or other person having charge of any child between the ages of eight (8) and sixteen (16) years, shall send such child to a public, private or parochial school for the entire school year during which the public schools are in session in such district; provided, however, that this chapter shall not apply to children over fifteen (15) years of age, where such child shall have completed the eighth (8th) grade or may be eligible to enter any high school in such district, or where the child is necessary for its own use or for parents' support, or where for good cause shown it would be for the best interest of such child to be relieved from the provisions of this chapter; provided, further, that if a reputable physician within the district shall certify in writing that the child's bodily or mental condition does not permit its attendance at school, such child shall be exempt during such period of disability from the requirements of this chapter. It shall be the duty of the superintendent of the school district, if there be such superintendent, and if not, then the county superintendent of schools, to hear and determine all applications of children desiring for any of the causes mentioned herein to be exempted from the provisions of this chapter, and if upon such application such superintendent hearing the same, shall be of the opinion that such child for any reason is entitled to be exempted as aforesaid, then such superintendent shall issue a written permit to such child, stating therein



### NEW REGISTERED MEN TO RECEIVE QUESTIONNAIRES

Local Board Today Begins Task of Collecting Data for Classification of Material for Uncle Sam's Fighting Forces

Pursuant to orders received Tuesday from the adjutant general's office, the local board for Twin Falls county is today mailing out the first list of questionnaires to certain of the men who registered under selective military service regulations in this county on September 12. At least 10 per cent of the total number of questionnaires must be mailed out each day, according to the order. Seven days' time from the date of mailing is allowed each registrant to return his questionnaire.

#### Fill Up Certain Age

There were registered in this county on September 12, 4001 men between the ages of 18 and 45 years, exclusive of those previously registered. Under the order from the adjutant general, questionnaires are to be mailed at this time only to those registrants who are above the age of 19 years and under the age of 45. Subjects of Great Britain, including Canadians, also are to receive no questionnaires at this time.

#### Orders From Governor

Following is the order in respect to the mailing of questionnaires received from the adjutant general: The previous mailing general, directed that the following be communicated to all local boards:

"Beginning on Wednesday, September 18, and continuing for nine days,"

Thereafter, questionnaires of the third edition shall be sent each day to ten per cent of the registrants who were on September 12, 1918, between the age of 19 and 36 years, both inclusive. Questionnaires shall be sent to all registrants within such ages who registered on September 12, 1918, or who have registered thereafter except British subjects, including Canadians.

In mailing questionnaires, local boards shall proceed according to serial numbers of such registrants and shall defer making any entries on the classification list until after the order numbers have been assigned in accordance with the regulations subsequently to be promulgated.

"Space for the order numbers on the questionnaires shall be left blank, their order numbers to be filled in after they have been determined and the questionnaires are returned. After the order numbers have been determined the names shall be entered on the classification list in the order of their eligibility for service, as will be prescribed under later regulations, and the data on each questionnaire is mailed to each registrant shall then be entered. For such purpose a tentative list of the date on which the questionnaires were mailed must be kept by each local board.

"If in the opinion of the local board with due regard for the convenience of the registrants and the work of the local advisory boards, questionnaires may be mailed at the rate of more than 10 per cent per day, the local board may mail more expeditiously but, however, not more than 10 per cent per day."

### W. S. S. SALES IN COUNTY ARE STILL DECLINING

Postmaster's Report for Month of August Shows Drop of \$208.25 From Low Water Mark of July

Decline of \$208.25 from the low water mark of July for the sale of War Savings Stamps in Twin Falls county, through postoffices outside of Buhl, is shown in the report of the sales for the month of August just completed by Postmaster M. A. Storch. The total sales for August amounted to \$18,795.45, as against \$18,904.06 for July; \$38,226.62 for June, and \$18,943.25 for May. Receipts from the sale of 4191 War Savings Certificates were \$17,500.29, and of 4941 Thrift Stamps were \$1,235.25, during the month of August. # ASKS AGGRESSIVE CAMPAIGN IN THE SALE OF W. S. S.

Director A. Guilbert Says County Is Likely to Fall Short of Quota By Wide Margin, Unless Action Is Taken

Twin Falls county is likely to fall short by \$368,675, or 25 per cent, of fulfilling its War Savings Stamp quota this year, according to the statement of A. Guilbert, county War Savings Stamp director, before the council of defense in an argument for provision for a vigorous and persistent campaign to make good the deficit.

Up to the month of June, Mr. Guilbert stated, the investments in War Savings Stamps in this county had reached the total of \$185,179. In the month of June of county-wide campaign was waged to secure the signing of individual pledges to purchase these securities, with the result that the investment of \$259,440 additional was pledged, making the total for the county \$394,610. The quota is \$460,000. Mr. Guilbert estimates that without a campaign such as he proposes, there will be a loss of 10 per cent in realization on the pledges.

He asks that provision be made for the opening of a centrally located War Savings Stamp campaign headquarters for the county, to be maintained until the end of the campaign on January 1, and that a secretary be employed.

Mr. Guilbert announced that he had completed arrangements for conducting a War Savings Stamp booth and sale at Piler among Twin Falls county fair visitors.

## SOLDIER WANTS RECEIVER TO CLOSE SHEEP DEAL

Edward Henderson, Bellevue, Wash. Will Die of Old Age Before His Return

The appointment of a receiver, to complete for him the details of a transaction in respect to his purchase of sheep—a matter which is now involved in litigation—is asked by Edward Henderson, a member of the army at a technical training camp at Fort Omaha, Nebraska, in an action brought by him through his attorney, T. K. Hackman, in district court here. The defendant's name in the complaint are E. O. Brown and B. B. Brown, doing business as Brown Brothers, who sold to Henderson the sheep in question and who hold a mortgage in the sum of \$12,000 against them; the First National bank of Piler which is alleged to have an interest in the Brown Brothers' mortgage; and William Chase, who also holds a mortgage in the sum of \$1,900 secured by the sheep in question.

Henderson sets out in his complaint, that he expects to be called soon into foreign service; that already \$500 or \$550 of the sheep in question have died of old age and that it is likely that all but 25 of the remainder are so aged that they cannot be held until his return from the war.

In the litigation involving the purchase of the sheep Henderson charges that the Brown Brothers used fraud and deception.

### PRAYS FOR ALLIED VICTORY, GERMAN SLASH HER THROAT

French Mother Found in Pool of Blood Beside Child—Victim of Kultur

WITH THE AMERICANS ON THE METZ FRONT, Sept. 19.—While a French mother in Hattenville, a mile north of Vigonville, knelt by the bed of her sick child, praying for an allied victory, and while the Americans were approaching, a bullet slashed her throat, according to stories told by the villagers to American officers.

Lieutenant Raymond Penney entered Hattenville with a tank and found the woman's body in a pool of blood beside the bed. Her throat was cut. Villagers told how she was killed.

German officers lived in the woman's house during their occupation of the village, forcing her to cook for them. When the bombardment started the women began preparing to leave. The woman dropped to her knees, praying aloud for victory. Her life was the forfeit for her patriotism.

### BAKU IS ONCE MORE IN HANDS OF TURKS

British Troops Said to Have Evacuated Town Center of Great Petroleum Industry

LONDON, Sept. 19.—British troops have evacuated Baku, according to reports received here today.

Baku, located on the western shore of the Caspian sea and the center of the greatest petroleum region in the world, was suddenly occupied by British troops on August 16. The expedition had fought its way across Persia from Bagdad.

Supported by the Russians and Armenians the British prepared to hold Baku against the Turkish and German. The report would indicate that Baku may have been seized by an overwhelming force of Turks, although Baku was awarded to Russia by the Brest-Litovsk treaty.
