

OFFERS REWARDS JAILBREAKERS

Lincoln County Sheriff Seeks Trio of Alleged Burglars Now at Large

Lincoln County Sheriff, J. H. Howell, is offering a reward for the arrest and delivery to an officer of Lincoln county, either C. W. Derry, Frank Sullivan, or Edward Miller, with the help of the sheriff's deputies, who broke into the Lincoln county jail on the morning of November 3, at Shoshone, where they were being held as prisoners in district court to grand juror J. H. Howell, and the grand jury, including the lock with an improvised key, he succeeded in unlocking the three cells and liberating the three men.

Second in Command
Sullivan, Miller and Derry, in company with Frank Walsh, Joseph Hogan, George Dummelford and Wm. Miller, operated the Idaho state number of months prior to their arrest in Shoshone by Sheriff Howell and Dummelford. They were arrested in June of this year while in the act of carrying away \$400 worth of merchandise from at Wendell, which they burglarized. Merchandise to the value of about \$15,000 had been stolen from stores in Twin Falls, Elmore, Lincoln, Bonneville, Bannock and Bear Lake counties, and these men played an important part in each of these robberies. They now are now serving terms upon conviction of burglary in the Idaho state prison.

Are Widely Implicated

Sullivan, Miller, Walsh, Hogan and Derry were arrested September 17 by Sheriff Wheeler at Jerome. It is alleged that they have been implicated in a number of store robberies in Idaho and other states and are now on the evidence upon which the officers made the arrest was obtained by the Revenue secret service.


