SHAMROCK CREW CHARGES DEFEAT TO NICHOLSON

Resent Slur which They Consider Designer Throws on Their Efficiency and Make Counter Charge

SOUTHAMPTON, Eng., (AP)—When Mr. Nicholson, the designer of Shamrock IV, arrived in England, he placed the superior seamanship of the Resolute on the only occasion Captain Burton was free from interruption and advice the Shamrock crew. The delegate denied a seat is John McKelvey, representing a Seattle, Wash., local union. McKelvey was reported to have made a speech during the convention.

This statement was issued today by the press committee: "No delegate will be seated in this convention unless he is a bona fide, loyal American citizen. No man who has ever been connected with any I. W. W., 'red' or other radical organization can sit here as delegate."

SAN FRANCISCO, (AP)—Pilot John L. The brief report of the airman's safety said he and his plane were found 50 miles south of Elko, Nev.

A telegram saying engine trouble had forced Eaton to land at McNeil smelters in Butte valley, 75 miles southeast of Elko, Nev., was received from the manager of the air mail field at Reno by air mail service officials here today.

Finance Minister Proposes Levy on Capital and Foreign Loan

BUDAPEST, (AP)—Hungary's budget, which was submitted to the national assembly here Wednesday by Mr. Lanyai, minister of finance, shows a deficit of ten billion forgoes, with expenditures at twenty billion. The deficit will be met by a levy on capital and a foreign loan. Greater economy is said by the minister to be imperative. The Hungarian budget prior to the war never exceeded two billion forgoes.

WINNERS' SLATE HOLDS LEAD IN ILLINOIS POLLS

Cook County Returns Favor to Mayor's Candidates with the Country Precincts Voting for Lowden Ticket

CHICAGO, (AP)—Returns today from 3100 out of 3700 precincts in the state gave leads for the Thompson (Republican) candidates. In 1921 precincts in Cook county and 1680 precincts outside, Frank L. Smith was leading in the race for United States senator with 183,500 votes over 170,455 for Congressman W. B. McKinley and 20,262 for B. M. Christopher.

Returns from 1520 precincts in Cook county and 1020 precincts outside gave Low Small 105,088 for governor and 170,399 for John G. Ogilvey, 15,549 for Oscar E. Christensen, 14,866 for Edward N. Woodruff. The additional returns were all from city precincts. The county precincts which were expected to vote for Lowden for Governor.

NEW YORK ELECTIONS TO FILL SOCIALISTS' SEATS

NEW YORK, (AP)—Special elections were held in greater New York today to fill vacancies in the state assembly caused by the expulsion of the five socialists at Albany last spring. The socialist assemblies, who were ousted after a long trial on charges of disloyalty sought vindication at the hands of the voters by appearing as candidates for re-election. They are Samuel A. Dowitt, Samuel Orr, Louis Mahoney, August Claessens and Charles Solomon.

In addition the social party has named Nat Rubin as a candidate at another special election in Albany. The party was organized by the defeat of Assemblyman John Danico, republican. In all the districts, the socialists were opposed by fusion candidates. Indications pointed to a heavy vote.

LEAGUE COUNCIL MEETS TO TALK OVER PROBLEMS

Aaland Island Controversy First to be Discussed at Paris Session; Poland and Lithuania Called to Bar

PARIS, (AP)—The council of the league of nations, which was expected to begin its ninth session here on Saturday, met this morning, the first meeting since the outbreak of the war. Sweden and Finland relative to the Aaland islands.

Poland and Lithuania have been asked to send delegates to Paris for the purpose of attending a session of the council. This step was taken at the instance of the Polish government, however, as long as the frontier controversy which has threatened serious consequences there be considered by the council.

Approval of the purchase of the national hotel in Geneva as the seat of the secretariat of the league for the term of 500,000 francs also will be asked of the council today. Options on adjoining property also have been secured and were to come before the council.

AUSTRIA SEES PERMISSION TO UNITE WITH GERMANY

VIENNA, (AP)—Removal of the prohibition against the union of Austria and Germany will be requested of the council of the league of nations at the meeting that body will hold in Paris in November. Dr. Carl Renner, chancellor of the Austrian government, announced Wednesday in an address at Innsbruck.

"The league of nations," he added, "is the refuge of the imperialist idea, however, as long as the imperialist France plays a leading role in its politics we shall obtain little. We can obtain nothing at all by violence, so we must have patience. We must turn to Germany must and will come again, for the whole proletariat because that both desire that union and is prepared to fight for it."

DISAPPEARING FEZ BETOKENS WANE OF TURKS' RULE

Badge Supposed to be Worn by All Ottoman Subjects is Rapidly Disappearing from Constantinople

CONSTANTINOPLE, (AP)—With the crumbling of Turkish authority and influence, the fez, the badge which all Turkish subjects, Christians, Jews and Turks alike, are supposed to wear, is rapidly disappearing. Although the Moslems still wear their fezzes in the streets, they no longer cling to them slavishly indoors. Soon the Turks may be wearing hats with brims in Constantinople. Moslems in other parts of Turkey insist the Mohammedans in the capital that their power is being lost through their desire to imitate the infidels.

An all heads must remain covered in the mosques and it is quite impossible to touch one's forehead to a prayer rug while wearing a hat with brim, the fez is indispensable to the faithful Moslem. Who pray still venerate even military and naval officers must wear visor caps.

The fez still prevails in Anatolian cities. In fact it is unsafe for foreigners to wear a hat in many of them unless he desires to attract a crowd of staring Moslems. The fez is the symbol of starting a riot. Osman Agha, the terrorist governor of Kerasandun, recently checked the tendency of non-Moslems in that city to get away from old customs.

An Armenian who had just returned from Russia walked along the main street of the little city wearing a stiff brimmed straw hat. It was worse than wearing a straw hat on the New York Stock exchange after the season has passed. Osman Agha grabbed the hat from the Armenian's head, slashed the crown from the rim with his sabre, jammed the crown down the Armenian's head. It is a heavy blow with the sabre and warning the unfortunate chap never again to appear in Kerasandun in such ugly headgear unless he wanted to go to jail.

NEVADA IS CAMPAIGNING GROUND FOR COX TODAY

Five Addresses Comprise Candidate's Engagements for the Day

EN ROUTE WITH GOVERNOR COX, (AP)—Nevada was the campaign ground of Governor Cox of Ohio, democratic presidential nominee. Five addresses at Elko, Winnemucca, Lovelock, Sparks and Reno comprised the governor's engagements today following his departure last night from Salt Lake City where he addressed a large audience at the tabernacle in closing his Utah campaign.

The league of nations and progressive reform, together with local subjects such as reclamation of arid lands, headed today's subjects in the governor's address. He was joined this morning at Elko, where he made a 15-minute address, by Governor Boyle and Senator Henderson, who were to go through the Nevada trip ending with an address tonight at Reno.

The governor's Nevada trip today closed the second week of his western "swing," which has taken him to the Pacific northwest and back to the terminus in California. He will begin his California campaign tomorrow noon at Sacramento and speak tomorrow night in the San Francisco auditorium where he was nominated July 6. Saturday also will be spent in San Francisco and Oakland and on Sunday the governor will travel to southern California to spend two days before turning eastward.

2,402 STUDENTS IN THE SCHOOLS

Without Seventh and Eighth
Graders Enrollment is Par-
ticularly Heavy

Up to the close of yesterday the four educational institutions of Twin Falls had enrolled 2,402 pupils in the high school and the first six grades of the grammar schools. Next Monday, according to L. B. Bear, principal of the seventh and eighth grades, at least 400 others should be taken into the schools. Pupils for the junior high school were not permitted to enroll this week on account of lacking facilities.

Disbanded schools the attendance to last night was: High school, 170; Lincoln school, 710; Nickel school, 370; Washington school, 485.

With the expected 400 in the seventh and eighth grades the schools will have at least 2,852 pupils which figure is only 95 short of the peak of last year's enrollment when the mark reached was 2,945 in all schools.

The total number of pupils taking work in the elementary grades last year was 2,277. Of the 100 or more pupils on the total grade pupils thus far enrolled this year in 1725. The expected 400 for the seventh and eighth grades total will be 2182.

In the high school there are 102 seniors enrolled, 107 juniors, 160 sophomores, 67 freshmen, and 100 continuing freshmen, 58 unclassified and four post-graduates.

O. L. and Jennie P. Peterson
Bring Suits against Ed
Johnson

PRINCE SAYS HIS VIEWS ON RED MENACE

Max of Baden Says Present Military Operations Minor Part of World-Wide Offensive as Planned by Soviet

MANNHEIM, Germany, (AP)—"The present military operations are only a very minor part of a world-wide offensive which Soviet Russia is now setting on foot," declared Prince Max of Baden in the course of a lengthy interview which appears today in the Baden State Gazette. Asked whether he saw a way out of the present dilemma for Germany, Prince Max, according to the report, said:

"There is only one very slender hope, which consists in an unconditional maintenance of our neutrality both to the east and the west, and in one last desperate effort to effect a division of Versailles peace treaty."

Prince Max believes that the calls the German resistance to the moral invasion of Bolshevism is bound to lead down in the checking process from the west in the bordering states so that, when the time was ripe for invasion, he would find an open door and a union of comrades."

Prince Max believes that the prospects of such a plan succeeding in Germany are not wholly unpromising, as the "moral invasion" he declares has already taken place in the minds of the German people.

BUHL COMMUNITY SMASHES ALL ATTENDANCE RECORDS AT FAIR

Thirty-Five Hundred People Register at Turnstiles of Exposition Grounds on Wednesday. Set Apart for the West Enders—Even Home Horse Wins Race Event of the Occasion

All records for single day attendance at the Twin Falls county fair were smashed yesterday, Buhl day. Approximately 3500 admissions were scored at the turnstiles during the day, the afternoon session showing the biggest throng in the history of the county agricultural exposition.

The day marked a new epoch in the attendance at any county fair in the state, it is verily believed, and I look for a still greater attendance today, which is Twin Falls day at the fair, declared J. M. Madril, secretary of the exposition, this morning.

The Best Weather.
Weather of a most propitious order, especially for the season, prevailed yesterday, thus providing an opportunity for all persons so inclined to attend the fair. The fact that Buhl merchants almost to a man closed shop and left only the police and invalids at home helped materially to establish the high attendance mark of yesterday.

With so great a concourse of Buhl people present it was appropriate, too, that the feature event of the afternoon's program should be won by a Buhl horse and the trophy carried home by a Buhl resident.

Appropriate to the Day.
The Buhl Chamber of Commerce

derby was won by "Redman," a speedy nag owned by Lon Lilly of Buhl, in 1:45 seconds. But the victory was hard earned for Redman was only able to push her muzzle ahead of Hula at the finish. Hula gave the Lilly racer a hard drive all around the course, and looked good enough to win in another furlong when the race finished. Hula is owned by Al White of Ellet. Attempts are being made to match these two horses again for a finish battle.

Record Purse.
The Buhl Chamber of Commerce derby carried purses aggregating \$800 more money than has ever before been paid for a single race at any fair in the state, and equalled by but a few state fairs in the country. Of this prize the Buhl Chamber of Commerce gave \$300, \$200 by race horsemen of Buhl and \$100 by the county fair board.

The attending throng, made by Buhl was marked all over the fair grounds all yesterday afternoon and evening. Men and women paraded the enclosure, viewing the inside of the city, while from the lapel of almost every person assembled in the grandstand and bleachers and along the track fences fluttered flags and bunting distinctive of the community of Buhl.

WRECKED AUTOMOBILE BLAZES TRAIL TO BOOZE CACHE NEAR CITY LIMITS—AUTO'S DRIVER IN HOSPITAL—SLIM BUSH ON GUARD

Sheriff Sprague and City Officers Get Wind of Smashup on Road South of Town and Find 10-Gallon Keg of Alcohol Secreted Nearby—Farmer's Rig Demolished in Collision—Bob Linville Hurt

Just how the liquor came into this section Sheriff Sprague does not positively aver, but says the keg was found near a wrecked Maxwell car guarding which Cleon (Slim) Bush was found when the authorities arrived on the scene. Bush is said to have left soon after.

Sheriff Sprague has information in his possession purporting to fix ownership of the wrecked car upon "Bob" Linville, said to be an employee of the Schwan Auto Sales company of Twin Falls. Linville is in a local hospital being treated for injuries when the car was wrecked soon after midnight. It is declared that the rig had been removed from the machine and cached behind a fence a few feet from the car.

If the information given out by the sheriff is correct, the driver of the Linville and occupied by Bush crashed into a farmer's rig, which was demolished, the collision causing the automobile to overturn. Linville's condition, it is related, was considered of a sufficiently serious nature to warrant serious attention, and he was hastened to a hospital early after the accident.

The sheriff was informed of the affair and on the way to the scene picked up the city officers. Cleo Bush is said to have been on guard beside the damaged machine, but alleged to have left in another car with two men who arrived shortly after the sheriff's posse. One of the men occupying the machine was said to be in a daze, and held under bond for trial in the police court, with two others, on charge of drunkenness. Sheriff Sprague gives his name as "Hatch," or "Harris."

It was soon after Bush and his companions left that the officers made the discovery of the keg of alcohol near the fence. The sheriff charges that Linville was quite drunk and that Bush was under the influence of intoxicants at the time of the accident. Bush last spring was found guilty of having intoxicated driver in his possession in violation of the prohibition law and paid a fine in the district court. He was at the trial declared to have been implicated with L. W. Stevens, now serving a term in the county jail for drunkenness in a "whisky-running" offense during the summer of 1919.

This afternoon, from 2 to 3 o'clock Mrs. B. B. Rough, of Kimberly, was in charge of the demonstration department, showing the operations by practical use of the steam pressure cooker. Meals were prepared by this system.

Supervised by Miss Ladwig the classes conducted by the women have been of vital interest to housekeepers of the district, and have attracted in attentive attention on all occasions. Every question of household interest has been propounded and discussed at these meetings.

The classes in general. The crowds at the women's building have been so large every day of the fair that no attempt has been made to keep a record of the attendance. Miss Ladwig, however, declares there were more people in the building on opening day this year than on all the days of the fair together last year.
