HOUSE BILL NO. 121 UPON WHICH OUR SCHOOLS DEPEND FOR FUNDS

Full Text of Measure which if Enacted into Law will Permit of the Calling of an Election to Endorse Program of Necessary Taxation

An Act authorizing Boards of Trustees of Independent School Districts to call an election to endorse the program of necessary taxation...

Whereas, A sudden and marked increase has recently occurred in the attendance of public schools throughout the state...

Whereas, This increased attendance has caused not only a marked increase in the current school expenditures but also necessitated additional school houses and school rooms...

Whereas, This condition in certain centers of population, coupled with the necessity of increasing teachers' salaries and unrepresented prices for equipment and increased running expenses following the war...

Whereas, It is deemed advisable to authorize boards of trustees of independent school districts to call an election to meet the present emergency without permanently increasing the taxing powers of all school districts...

Section 1. The board of trustees of an independent school district or a Class A independent school district, with the assent of two-thirds of the qualified electors of the district voting at a special election to be held for that purpose and to be called and conducted as other school elections in said district...

Section 2. Such levies shall be certified and collected as other taxes and expenditures may be made in anticipation of the payment thereof.

Section 3. By reason of the conditions recited in the preamble, an emergency is declared to exist and this act shall be in force from and after its passage and approval.

RAILSPLITTER EULOGIZED AS PATRIOTS MEET

Large Audience Listens to Character Addresses on Lincoln's Day

In address, song and reading Abraham Lincoln, railsplitter and president, was given eulogistic consideration at an annual commemorative session held by local patriotic bodies in the auditorium of the high school Sunday afternoon.

As the affair was inaugurated and in charge of the G. A. R. it was eminently meet and fitting that Capt. O. L. Longley act in the capacity of master of affairs. These duties he carried out with the deference to the occasion, leading the program of addresses with a brief review of the man to whom the meeting was dedicated.

Musical Opening The program was started by the high school orchestra, with an invocation. This was followed with the recitation by Rev. E. L. White, of the Episcopal church, the Ganto Girls' club of the high school following with a group of splendidly rendered songs, directed by Carl Oitz. Mrs. G. C. Benson gave a piano selection of patriotic and southern airs, and Miss Florence Gustafson sang a patriotic number. Miss Juanita Booth and Miss Oregotta Murray gave readings, that of the former being "Lincoln the Typical American," while Miss Murray read Lincoln's immortal Gettysburg address.

The address section of the program opened with a short talk by the Rev. C. Baird, rector of the Episcopal church. He spoke on the subject, "Lincoln the Man," taking up the thread of the religious aspect of the martyred president's life. In illustration he characterized the man as a man possessed of a keen sense of justice, fairness, and mercy, a man of deep humility, faith, hope and optimism.

Attorney Taylor Cummins addressed the audience entertainingly on the more humorous phases of Lincoln's life, characterizing him as a man of dominant will power, but who scorned trickery in any sense. The speaker recited numerous homely illustrations and anecdotes connected with Lincoln's civil, political and professional life, closing his remarks with the statement that the great president was an unchallenged leader at the law bar.

While a lawyer had been called upon to tell of Lincoln as an attorney, it was also the lot of an attorney to deal with the character of Lincoln as an executive. Shad L. Hodgins treated this phase of Lincoln's life in a manner which brought out many of the features of the great statesman's history. He treated largely of the vicissitudes attending the career of the great man, especially during the period of his earlier activities, tracing the history of events to the time of his assassination. The speaker stigmatized Lincoln as a man of extraordinary managerial ability, illustrating this trait of his character most forcibly in depicting the manner of dealing with dissenting elements in his cabinet. "Lincoln possessed clearness of thought when great issues were involved, faith in all the causes he eventually espoused, courage of conviction and rare judgment in all matters of political policy," said Mr. Hodgins.

HIGHWAY DISTRICT HAS BALANCE OF \$50,207.60 FROM TAX ACCOUNT

Showing a balance on hand of \$50,207.60, a financial statement of the Twin Falls highway district has been filed with the county for record. The report is a tax account balance sheet only and covers a period of two years, ending February 1 and has been compiled by the secretary-treasurer, Stuart H. Taylor. The report shows total receipts of \$407,972.51, with disbursements amounting to \$357,765.31. A separate report is being compiled covering the bond account.

In a preface to the report Mr. Taylor, explaining the use of a two-year period, announces that this was done for the purpose of including some bank balances and credits which were made by the banks just as the report for the year ending February 1, 1920, was closed, and that while the credit was shown upon during the term of the report he was not advised as to the credit being passed.

SAN FRANCISCO. (AP)—A new tong war throughout California, ushered in last night with three deaths and five men wounded in San Francisco, Los Angeles and Stockton made armed camps of Chinatowns in these three cities today.

Where last night the Chinese inhabitants of these three cities were celebrating Chinese New Year with gorgeous and light-hearted feasts, they found themselves entrenched behind closed doors, shuttered windows and hidden deep from possible enemy attack. Police departments of all three cities and many of the armed men into Chinese districts to guard against new attacks. The New Year celebration of last night was forgotten. Death and fear had come.

In San Francisco last night the war opened in a room where there were six men. Taking advantage of the noise of the New Year celebration the six began firing point blank at each other. One was killed, another may die from wounds and two others were seriously wounded from the fusillade of shots in which every man, according to the police, emptied the shots in his revolver at others of the six.

It may not be generally known that this place is the third in sanctity of all the sanctuaries of Islam, and indeed for a short period it actually formed the Kibla toward which all Moslems prostrated themselves in prayer. Among the more important religious associations of this rock we may mention that it was here that David and Solomon were called to repentance, and on account of a vision David chose this site for his temple. From this name, says Mohammed, descended the Seventh Heaven after his night journey from Mecca, and lastly it is to be the scene of the great Judgment. The historical associations are not less striking, and such names as Omar, Abd-el-Malek, Saladin and Subulman are all connected with the rock.—From the Zenith.



# CARDINALS VIEW STIRS UP IRISH

### Self-Determination League Secretary Issues Caustic Statement

LONDON, (AP)—Great indignation was caused among Irish Catholics in England by the pastoral letter written by Cardinal Bourne, archbishop of Westminster, which was read in English churches under his jurisdiction last Sunday, says a statement issued here today by Art O'Brien, secretary of the Irish Self-Determination league.

Cardinal Bourne's letter warned people of his arch diocese not to allow themselves to become implicated "by active sympathy or even actual cooperation in societies and organizations which are in opposition to the laws of God and the Catholic church." In the course of the letter, the cardinal referred to the "horror and outrage in Ireland."

"His Eminence," the statement declared, "may rest assured the only impression left upon the Irish laity, as well as the Irish clergy in his arch diocese, by such letters, is one of disgust at his narrow and un-Christian attitude."

Mr. O'Brien referred to Cardinal Bourne's attitude toward Sir Roger Casement, who was executed for high treason during the war, and characterized it as "not only un-Catholic, but anti-Christian." He said the cardinal had continuously refused to allow his name to be used in repudiation of the "British barbarities in Ireland."

"Cardinal Bourne may hope," the statement continued, "that his partisan political lecture will help the activities of his government at the Vatican, which, during the past year, have been very vigorous, and which, it was hoped recently, would produce fruits in the papal condemnation of the republican movement in Ireland. If His Eminence has any hopes in this direction, it would be well for him and leading English Catholics who are shoring his hopes to understand that not even the most devoted Catholics in Ireland or among the Irish throughout the world will accept political guidance or dictation from Rome."

## FIRES TAKE HEAVY TOLL

### Inconducium Is Suspected in Blaise Wiping Out Cotton Warehouse

ENNIS, Texas, (AP)—Six thousand bales of cotton were lost here last night in a fire which destroyed three warehouses. The loss is estimated at \$400,000. Officers are working on a theory of inconducium.

PAGOSA SPRINGS, Colo., (AP)—A large section of the business district here was destroyed by a fire that started early today in Hardman's candy store. The loss at noon was estimated at \$250,000. Twelve buildings, including the plant of the Pagosa Journal, were destroyed or damaged. A bucket brigade fighting the flames saved a large hotel building.

SIoux CITY, Ia., (AP)—Fire which threatened to wipe out the business section of Onawa, Ia., 37 miles south, was checked early today after it had caused a loss of \$20,000. The Onawa Sentinel plant was among the buildings damaged.
