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CRUSADE IS STARTED TO FORCE CAR ISSUE

Producers and Shippers Take Action at Meeting to Compel Service

Approximately 40 men of the Twin Falls district, all interested in production or shipping of products, at the Bowers hotel yesterday afternoon listened to a thorough and enlightening exposition of the car and transportation situation as it relates to the Twin Falls section.

Discussion of the various phases of the transportation condition was lengthy, and left no stone unturned. Leonard Way, rate expert of the South Idaho Traffic Bureau, and secretary of the Farm Market Bureau, addressed the assemblage. The latter spoke of the benefits to be derived through co-operative organizations, and the handling of commodity matters relating to products and their shipments through one head.

During Mr. Way's address the fact was developed that the car requires more for the Twin Falls district area than 1700 refrigerators for potatoes and 1000 cars for apples in the next 30 or 40 days. Mr. Way explained the purposes of the traffic association and urged co-operation by all shippers and producers in foreign improved conditions from the national people.

First-class mail service to Russia was opened last April and with the resumption of parcel post service all classes of mail except registered letters and packages may be mailed in the United States to any point in Russia. The rate to Russia is twelve cents a pound plus a transit charge depending on destination and weight.



WHEAT PRICES SLIP SLIGHTLY
Foreign Crop and Exchange Situations
Count as Bearish Influences
CHICAGO, (AP)—Fresh declines in the price of wheat resulted today from rains in Argentina, further robbing the drought in that country. On the other hand, complaints that unreasonable wet weather in the Dakotas was spoiling wheat in the shock failed to attract much notice. Freezing temperatures in Canada failed to stimulate the buying. Initial quotations, which varied from unchanged figures to 1 3/4 lower, with December \$1.30 to 1.30 1/2 and May \$1.34 to 1.34 1/2, were followed by slight rallies and then by a moderate downturn all around.

Subsequently new breaks in foreign exchange rates, centered as a bearing influence and to, too, did slowness of export demand. The market closed unsettled, 1 3/4 to 2 3/4 net lower, with December \$1.29 1/2 to 1.29 3/4 and May \$1.33 to 1.33 1/4.

Offsetting gains included United Drug, American Leather and Sumatra Tobacco, these gaining large fractions of a point each when an unexpected demand for masey forced call loans back to five per cent. 
