IDAHO'S TIMBER FOR TEAM GOOD

No Dearth of Backfield and Line Material, and Several Players Rather Outstanding.

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, Moscow, Sept. 13—With the date for commencing pre-season football work rapidly approaching Coach Mathews and his staff are making ready to start the practice program.

Because of Idaho's change of coaches on the eve of her first season in the coast conference, sports writers are giving Idaho prospects more than passing review and for the most part they see a fast, evenly balanced squad coming from the silver and gold camp.

Still Has Good Timber.

Although Idaho lost some fine material last season she still holds some of the best timber of any coast eleven and around this lot Mathews will build his new team. Abe Goff, who last year played an exceptional game at center, will be back in the harness. Babe Brown will captain the team during his third and last year. Brown plays both end and fullback but his ability as a punter places him more in harmony with the backfield work. Huck and Beary. Broshers are the other two backfield veterans. The line veterans other than Goff are Sherm Broshers, Polo Barto, Dale Vohs, Jim Neal and Jeff Stone.

There is no dearth of backfield and line material this year and several players among the list of available candidates are rather outstanding. Bob Fitzke, who was ineligible to play last year, will come to the front with a drop kick almost certain within the

45-yard line. Morris Kilne played a whole of a game at center and captained the frosh team last season. He will crowd Goff for his place and this competition should give Idaho two crack centers.

Twin Falls Men on List.

Syb Klaffner, Charley Hansen, Ole Neumann and Noah Hays are the luminants from the froshman team. Walt Remor is a strong contender for the end position left vacant by the graduation of Grover Evans. He did some exceptional playing with the first year team last year and Coach Kelley was expecting great strides of development from him.

David MacMillan, froshman coach, will start his players to work as soon as they have completed the registration. Indications point to a reasonably strong first year team at Idaho this season.

are generally disappointing to seed growers. Seed harvested during the fall months will not be sown until next spring. No one knows what market conditions will be a few months from now when the seed is required for sowing. Most growers, who are not members of the Idaho Seed Growers Association, will be required to sell their seed immediately, especially in view of the low prices of their other crops.

All seed belonging to members of the Idaho and Utah Seed Growers Associations is marketed largely after January first and throughout the season when there is a planting demand for Alfalfa and Clover Seed. Markets are generally better established after the first of the year.

It is logical to believe that the seed marketed by the Seed Growers Association will usually average a higher net return than seed sold outright in the fall when farmers everywhere are selling through the necessity of raising cash. **FORCED SALES NEARLY ALWAYS MEAN LOW MARKETS.**

BUFF DEFEATED BY MANILA MAN

Pancho Villa Takes Title of Fly-weight Champion of United States Through Victory

BROOKLYN, N. Y., Sept. 14.—Pancho Villa of Manila tonight became flyweight champion of the United States by scoring a technical knockout over Johnny Buff of Jersey City...

In the semi-final bout, eight rounds, Elinos Flores of Manila received the judges' decision over Nick Foley of Brooklyn.

The first time Buff did not take a count, but when Villa placed both hands to the head and snapped the American lay on the floor until five was counted and the bell rang, saving him. He was picked up and placed in his chair.

It was Villa's fight from the first. He was always active, always punching for an opening instead of waiting for a chance, as Buff did. His terrific body blows, with both hands, snapped the American champion in the early rounds and his crushing left hooks and jabs to the head in the later rounds brought him the victory.

Buff was unable to open an attack. He tried to edge in blows after the third round, but Villa met every attack with another of two hands, punishing relentlessly.

Villa led at the end of the third round. He drew blood from Buff's mouth in the first, but the American champion did not open until the third. The fighting was now a draw, leading more of the damaging blows and leading in the attack.

Three for Knockout

Villa rushed Buff to the ropes, with a shower of blows in the fourth and sufficed him about in the next two rounds. The Filipino started to measure the American for a knockout in the sixth but Buff kept clear and maintained a safe blocking defense.

Buff showed more action in the next three rounds, but Villa continued to advance his commanding lead. The Filipino met the American's attack with an offensive defense that drove Buff to the ropes in the seventh and trounced him about the ring in the ninth.

Buff's seconds threw a towel into the ring when Johnny, battered to grogginess, stood helpless before the Filipino's attacks. In the tenth round Villa scored two knockdowns. He began by punneling Buff with both hands, driving him to the ropes and then chasing him across the ring. Buff was reeling when Villa landed his left to the head and sent

the American bumping to the floor. Opens Terrific Assault

After he had the American reeling under his independent attack in the tenth round, Villa reopened his terrific assault in the eleventh. Buff, groggy from hard rights and lefts to the jaw fought back gamely and sent the Filipino staggering back with a blow to the chin. They clinched and then Villa drove Buff to the ropes with a series of uppercuts. The American sank slowly to the floor under his opponent's blistering attack and his seconds throw a towel into the ring, in acknowledgment of defeat. Two-and-seven seconds of the eleventh round had elapsed when the contest was ended.

FINAL GAME AT KIMBERLY
