are generally disappointing to seed growers. Seed harvested during the fall months will not be sown until next spring. No one knows what market conditions will be a few months from now when the seed is required for sowing. Most growers, who are not members of the Idaho Seed Growers Association, will be required to sell their seed immediately, especially in view of the low prices of their other crops.

All seed belonging to members of the Idaho and Utah Seed Growers Associations is marketed largely after January first and throughout the season when there is a planting demand for Alfalfa and Clover Seed. Markets are generally better established after the first of the year.

It is logical to believe that the seed marketed by the Seed Growers Association will usually average a higher net return than seed sold outright in the fall when farmwill induced average a inguist new terms must seed some outright in the fall when farmers everywhere are selling through the necessity of raising cash. 
