WHITEHOUSE DRAFTS FARM RELIEF PLAN

President Keeps Thanksgiving Dinner Waiting While He Hears Perfected Program and Gives Approval

WASHINGTON, Dec. 1 (AP)—The new administration program for immediate financial relief to farmers was formulated and practically perfected today at a conference between Secretary of Agriculture, Secretary Wallace and 12 republican senators headed by Senator Watson of Indiana. It will be put before congress at once and passed with the full force of the administration.

Broadly, the plans bring together in one administration measure the approved portions of various relief measures already pending in congress and contain also provisions to make the intended relief available to the farmer as well as to the large cattle raisers and grain growers.

Keeps Dinner Waiting

The conference was arranged by Senator Watson, who has been making an active survey of the question of relief. It was preceded by a series of conferences between Secretary Wallace and department of agriculture experts. Today President Harding kept his Thanksgiving dinner waiting while he heard the perfected program outlined and gave his general approval.

Would Use Loan Board

The plan proposes to utilize the federal farm loan board as the agency through which relief would be given. The details of the financing have been practically worked out. The general purpose is larger and more liberal credit and cheaper interest rates. The plan also provides for the creation of a new farm loan board, the plan of financing, the administration plans propose to make the government relief available directly to the small farmers who need it.

Marketing Problem Waits

The whole subject of farm relief work was discussed exhaustively but the marketing problem was touched upon only in a general way. The general opinion at the conference was that to extend the program now to include so complex and much controverted a subject as co-operative marketing would only serve to delay the enactment of the relief.

GOLD REALITY SPOILS VISION FOR COLONISTS

Americans, Attracted by Alluring Literature, Are Victims of Terrible Failure of Siberian Experiment

RIGA, Latvia, Nov. 30 (AP)—Joseph Krajewski and Otto Nemitz, naturalized Americans from the state of Washington, who have just arrived in Riga, brought with them a story of the sufferings of Americans who went to Siberia in July as members of an autonomous industrial colony called "Kuzbas," with headquarters at Krasnoyarsk, Siberia. The central office of the Kuzbas, they said, is at 110 West Cortland street, New York city. P. P. Cosgrove, belonging to that office, now is in Moscow, according to Krajewski, as an American delegate to the third international.

Krajewski and Nemitz said today that they had been attracted to the Kuzbas proposition by its alluring literature. Each person, they said, paid a substantial fee, furnished their own transportation and brought their own food. In return they were allotted a tent and permitted to labor in the coal mines on a profit-sharing basis.

The experiment was a terrible failure, the men asserted. There were no profits to divide. The colony, consisting of 400 persons, half of whom were women and children, was in a deplorable situation. Its members all lacked the money with which to return to the United States. Sanitary conditions were described as awful. Food was short and there was much sickness. More than half the men and a majority of the women and children were incapacitated. One American woman committed suicide in despair. Fifty of the colonists had departed, but the remainder were stranded.

When Krajewski and Nemitz applied to the Dutch consul at Riga, director of the colony, for permission to depart, they said they were told that they must remain because they had signed a two years' contract. By bribery, however, they managed to escape to Moscow and thence to the frontier. Before leaving, Krajewski said he said Rutgers the meaning of the term "autonomous industrial colony" and that Rutgers replied, "something for nothing." Krajewski said he made the rejoinder, "yes, something for you, nothing for me."

Krajewski said "Big Bill" Haywood, former I. W. W. leader in the United States, stayed at Kuzbas in warm weather but was sent away in, he went to Moscow. He attributed to Cosgrove the statement that 1500 fresh American immigrants were expected to join the colony.

An American engineer named Alfred Pierson was directing the mining operations of the colony, but despite his great efforts he was unable to achieve success, lacking machinery and capital. In one mine, where 75 American miners were working, the production daily was only two tons of coal. It was asserted by Krajewski that the men could not stay in the mine more than two hours at a time, owing to the fact that there was no ventilation. The illness of members of the colony, which included scurvy, was attributed to "malnutrition." The colonists receive three meals daily of black bread and mash.

Legion's Commander Gives Greetings of Harding and Wilson

Uses Radio Telephone For Messages of President and Former Executive

WASHINGTON, Nov. 30 (AP)—Messages from President Harding and former President Wilson to members of the American Legion were delivered here Wednesday to Alvin Legler, Mr. Owsley described his visits during the day to the White House and the home of Mr. Wilson.

The national commander said President Harding, in reply to inquiries, had asked him to tell the former service men that the executive was behind the program for hospitals for disabled veterans and was determined that it should be pushed to an early conclusion. The president also declared, he said, for a practical administration of the law giving world war veterans preference in employment under the civil service.

As he was preparing to leave the executive offices, Mr. Owsley said he was informed that Mrs. Harding would be glad to receive him.

"She got up out of a bed of sickness, dressed herself and was wheeled out in an arm chair," the national commander said. "She told me, 'I want you to say to the ex-service men that their friend has been sick, but is much better now and soon will be on the job again.'"

Mr. Owsley said that on his visit to the Wilson home he had told the war time president he had come to pay his respects to him as former commander-in-chief of the veterans and ask for a message to them. He declared Mr. Wilson's eyes flashed, that he sat more erect and his jaw set.

"Say to them," the former chief executive was quoted, "that I am their comrade; say to them that they were the real soldiers who fought for the liberty of the world; say to them that they were the crusaders for liberty."

"Wireless" Via the Piano

When you strike a certain key on your piano a certain object in the room—perhaps a vase, perhaps a lamp—gives out a long-jingling sound. Whenever you strike that certain key that certain object gives out its annoying jingle. Why? You don't know it, but you had been sending wireless telegrams. The vase and the key together make a wireless set. Whenever you struck the key and the vase jingled you were wireless just as truly as any expert high up among his masts and coils in the Eiffel tower. Your vase's note was the same as the key's note. Their sound-wave lengths, in other words, were the same. Now, objects having the same sound wave lengths respond to one another, just as your vase and key did, and this responding power is the basis of wireless. When Cape Cod speaks and the Eiffel tower answers it is, in its essence, just your piano key sounding and your vase giving forth its responding jingle.—Exchange.

Glycolite of Birds and Bees

I think we would do well in saying that, on an average, birds see one hundred times better than man, writes L. E. Dubauks in Our Dumb Animals. By watching each other's actions birds will go a hundred miles to a carcass; and under favorable atmospheric conditions a bird can see what on fresh ground is played ground at a distance of 300 feet. The bee, though the strength of its sight is not remarkable, has a wonderful ocular equipment—five eyes, a cluster of three on top of its head, and one on each side. Zoologists say that the compound eye on top is so made as to be specially adapted for detecting moving objects; and this seems reasonable, as the bee has many enemies that fly above it.

Tree Named by Turks

The finest flowering tree to be seen in Britain, the chestnut, was introduced from Tibet in 1550. The chestnut is also indigenous in the tropical parts of Asia and America, the altitude at which it grows making it possible for it to exist in northern climes. It is believed that Greece is the only part of Europe where the horse chestnut is a native, and it is Constantinople, according to reports, where the tree gained its name, the inhabitants using the nuts for the relief of horses suffering from cough.

MONEY HIDING AT HOME HAS DANGER FOR MILLER

GENEVA, Switzerland, Nov. 30 (AP)—A miller who hid bank notes to the value of 4000 francs in a sack of flour during the recent scare caused by the proposal to levy a tax on capital, is now securing the caution of Argovio in an attempt to recover his funds.

The sack of flour in question was by error included in a delivery with other sacks, and sold by the retailer to some housewife who, thus far, has not reported any unexpected price in her package.

A good many Swiss during the money scare drew their money out of banks and confided it to improvised depositories which in some cases proved to be unsafe. One man, following the example of the farmer at Lorient, France, put a thousand franc note in a gun barrel and then forgot it. He shot the money away a few days later when firing at a rabbit.

How English Pound Derived Its Name

The word pound, as used in England to denote a certain sum of money, is derived from the poundweight of silver, used as a money standard by the ancient Romans, and introduced by them into their conquered provinces. Originally this pound of silver was coined into 20 shillings, but from the time of Edward II (1307-1327) these coins were gradually reduced in size, until finally as many as 253 shillings were coined from the same weight of metal.

The use of gas for operations was slowly coming in again and would in time supplant the other anaesthetics.

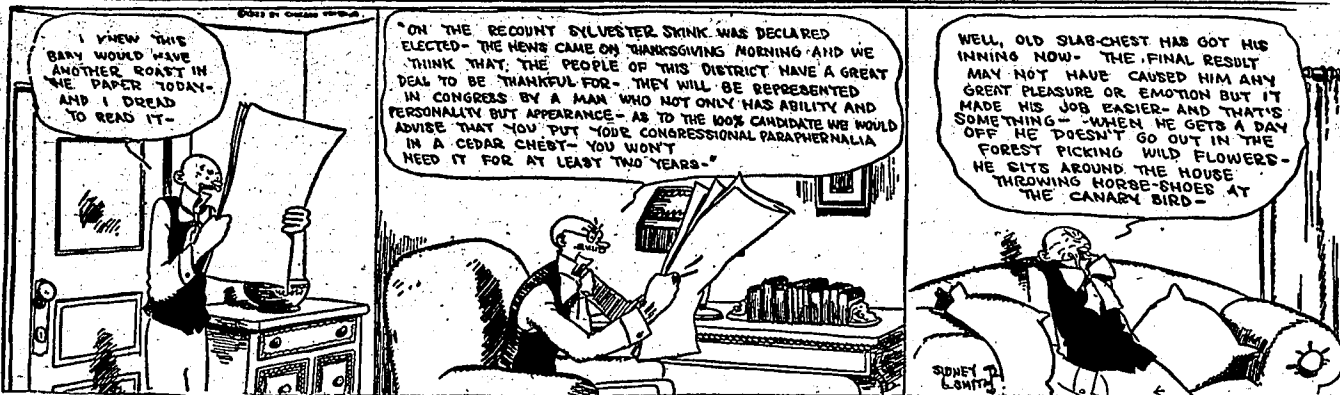

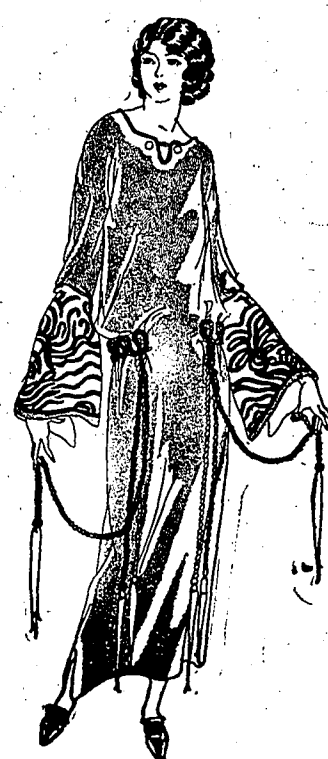

NOT SUBSIDY—PROTECTION.

"This man, I trow," said bluff King Hal, speaker of Cranmer, "has got the right now by the ear." In language less homely and more elegant, but equally to the point, it may be said that Col. Nyron W. Robinson, president of the American Manufacturers' Export association, voiced a great truth when he declared that development of an American merchant marine will benefit the whole country as well as the ship-owners.

Promotion of foreign trade, retention of about \$300,000,000 a year in freight money in this country, employment of thousands of men in shipping and allied trades and the creation of a naval reserve, making it certain that never again will it be necessary to create a fleet at a cost of \$5,000,000,000 in an emergency, are among the benefits which Col. Robinson said would naturally flow from the placing of an adequate merchant marine on the high seas.

And he is right in his contention, for transportation is essential to prosperity and for transportation ocean-going vessels are in their own way as important as railroads or inland waterways. There are some persons who admit the truth of this proposition and yet hesitate at the idea of ship subsidy. These good people are of the type who balk at sympathy—by way, not of lessening or extenuating his offense, but of creating pity for the feelings that followed his deed. Then the world was young. All around was teeming life. Death had not come to raise its mystery. When the first murderer struck, he must have known that he was offending against man and God—but he could not have realized the full result of his act. He could not have known in advance the horror of seeing a living being sink into dead clay.

But those who have followed Cain have known what to expect. They have killed, knowing what death means. And they are still killing. That horror which Cain must have experienced is not theirs. They slay because they are willing to bear the horror for the sake of gratifying evil passion. They have even less claim to sympathy than had Cain.

What I Do Not Believe.

A PRESENT-DAY philosopher, in discussing the merits of doubt, sums up thus: "What we do not believe is just as important as—probably more important than—what we believe."

1. I do not believe that this country is (a) going to the dogs; or (b) turning Bolshevik. It never has. It won't.

2. I do not believe that we have never had such a crisis as this one. We are always facing a crisis. It's good for us.

3. I do not believe that there is a plot to overthrow the government and set up either a Wall Street or a labor soviet. I am too old to put faith in logies, except on the golf links. Moreover, I have read history.

4. I do not believe that flappers, prohibition, the tariff, or the mayors of New York and Boston will increase vice and the high cost of living.

5. I do not believe that any congressman is much wiser than I am. Hence I do not expect him to solve problems that I can't solve.

6. I do not believe that Main Street is the main street of America. It is Elm Street, where people live, not where they work.

7. I do not believe that it makes much difference "What Europe thinks of us." Can Europe think and can't we?

8. I do not believe that all Presbyterians, all Catholics, all Episcopalians, all members of all sects are narrow bigots. I refuse to believe anything but the best of each religion.

9. I do not believe that the Jews, the Irish, the Yankees, the farmers, Henry Ford, La Follette, the bankers, or the trusts either control America or that they want to. Americans control America.

10. I do not believe that Jesse or the movie is wrecking the home. When a home is wrecked it is invariably done by (a) the husband; (b) the wife; or (c) the mother-in-law.

11. I do not believe in Socialism, Capitalism, Communism, Christianity or Americanism as now practiced. We require a judicious and improved mixture of all five with more of the last two.

12. I do not believe in being afraid of birth, life, death, disease, politics, crime, climate, labor, or capital. I believe only in fearing anything but God and the facts.

13. I do not believe that we place sufficient faith in human beings and humanity.

14. I do not believe that we shall get through next winter, next year, this Congress, or existence unless we exercise the two chief attributes of man; namely (a), the brain and (b), the power of laughter.

Twin Falls District Landowners Will Conduct Campaign to Spread Facts Concerning American Falls District

Supporters of the proposed American Falls irrigation project met in the office of A. L. Swin Wednesday afternoon and formed a tentative organization to further the project principally by an educational campaign. Another meeting will be held next week to complete the organization.

Spence Chosen Chairman

W. H. Spence of Kimberly was elected chairman at the meeting Wednesday, and Mr. Swin was named secretary. The speakers included Mr. Swin and Mr. Spence, Guy Flommer of the Idaho State Reclamation association, Carl Miller of Castleford, Ivan Lincoln and others. The speakers emphasized the fact that the object and purpose shall be to bring out actual facts without exaggeration and it was stated that when the purpose of the organization is realized the support of the public will be received.

Committees will be appointed to carry on the work in each community in the Twin Falls tract, including Murtough, Hamon, Rock Creek, Kimberly, Twin Falls, Elmer, Dink, Goodfellow and others. The state reclamation association will lend its assistance, as will the federal reclamation service, although the latter is to be regarded as a matter principally of supplying needed information and not attempting to dictate policy, it was said.

"Although the Chamber of Commerce will play a part in this work, it will not be in charge," said Mr. Swin. "It will contribute toward the support of the organization, but is planned to leave the organization to the aid of actual water users to cover the entire Twin Falls tract."
