The officer discovered smoke coming from the end of a pipe buried beneath a pile of rocks at the side of the road. He then entered the three-foot culvert. Tapping on the sides indicated an empty space surrounding the culvert.

On digging through from the surface of the road, through four inch bolted planking, the officers dropped into a room approximately 15 by eight feet, where they found a complete still, a wood stove, and other apparatus, they said. The room was lined with shelves bearing reading material, among which was a book on liquor manufacturing, according to the report.

A trap door on one side of the cul vert, operated by a secret lock, has been used to enter and leave the dis tillery and it automatically dropped back to permit more working space in side, it was said.
