BORAH ADVISES PEACE GOSPEL FOR OLD WORLD

Senator, Replying to Cecil's League of Nations Address, Says Europe Chooses War that Must Be Outlawed

NEW YORK, April 12 (AP)—Senator Borah of Idaho, replying here tonight to the recent league of nations speeches of Lord Robert Cecil, declared his conviction that any peace league can function for peace "until war has been outlawed as an institution.

The present league, said the irreconcilable leader, not only has failed to make war a crime, but had been dominated by governments which convince the American people they do not "want peace until they have completely won equality and justice." He added that the proper field for dissemination of a gospel of peace was the old world and not the new.

"It may seem harsh," said Senator Borah, who spoke at a banquet of the American Paper and Pulp Association, "to say that the subject of Europe does not want peace upon terms compatible with equality and justice between nations. The record is there and anyone can read it. It is easily read for it is written in blood. Let us recur to recent history, pass by the more distant past—and speak only of events since the war.

Ignores American Efforts.

"Against the persistent efforts of the American representatives, the Versailles treaty was made an instrument of war—of dismemberment, misery and war. Upon three different occasions the two leading nations of the old world financed an invasion of Russia in violation of every precept of people of peace and in the face of the solemn pledges in favor of the principle of national integrity. Russia was invited to war and Turkey was nursed back into power—arms and money were furnished by outside governments with the explicit object in view the defeat of national gain and domination.

"When two courses were open relative to reparations one of arbitration and the other of adjustment by the league of a special conference of friendly powers, the other course, that of force and war was chosen, chosen in disregard for all concepts of peace and in defiance of the dictates of humanity. And tonight, the awful orgy of hate, of destruction and crime proceeds in its bloodiest career in a foreign office in all Christendom is willing to record even a moral protest.

Twelve Powers Choose War.

"During the last three years 12 countries of Europe have resorted to war to settle their disputes at the time they were pledged to arbitration and peace. In all that time not one of the continent during the last three years have seen arbitration and cessation and league pledges passed by and the deliberate and necessary choosing of force of war. We have seen every conference, from Versailles to Lausanne break down over the question of material gain and domination, of oil, coal or territory, or else turn into secret conclave for war.

"The place, it seems to us, for mission work and peace is in the United States, but Europe. This is the record and the people of the United States know it well. They know that a league for peace made up of governments with such policies becomes inevitably a league for war, for spoliation. They know that councils of peace will inevitably become councils of war. They will say to the advocates of peace: If you really want to eliminate war, why not start by putting the brand of crime upon the institution. Write into the law of nations that war is a crime, and into the laws of the respective nations that those who violate the law of nations in this respect shall be punished, and then there can be cooperations for peace.

At Mercy of Maniac.

"As things stand today, a ruler, an irresponsible adventurer, royal mannequin may start a war, engulf a continent in blood and sacrifice the lives of millions and yet never pass under the denunciation or the lash of the law. Until that standard is changed, no league of nations can function for peace. Its makers may make it for peace, but those who execute it will execute it for war."

The association closed its convention by electing Henry W. Stokes, Philadelphia, president.

'CLEAN-UP DAY' IS DESIGNATED

City Commission Sets Aside April 18; Permit for Oil Tanks is Granted

Designation of Wednesday, April 18, as "clean-up day" and the granting of a permit for the establishment of Twin Falls' seventh oil distributing station featured a rather brief session of the city commission Tuesday night.

The subject of setting aside a time for cleaning up yards and alleys was mentioned by J. E. Krivanek, street and waterworks superintendent, who recommended the proposition as a means of giving the city a cleaner appearance. Commissioner S. S. All argued that citizens be requested to burn as much rubbish as possible, leaving the removal of the other refuse to the city trucks and wagons.

The commission, voting unanimously, granted a permit to the Texas Oil company to erect oil storage tanks on lots 33 and 34 in block one of Railroad addition, just southeast of the Utah company's tanks. No objections were raised in connection with the erection of the tanks, which are to cost \$7,000 complete, according to the permit application.

Change Plans

The permit of the Independent Oil company which precipitated a large amount of discussion and objections at the two previous meetings of the commission was not taken up officially as members of the commission believe the company's officials are considering locations other than the one mentioned in the permit.

Mark Murtagh, appealed to the commission for action toward narrowing an irrigation ditch on Ash street near his property to protect children of the neighborhood who, he said, have been in the habit of holding "jumping regattas" and paddling events in the small stream. The matter was left in the hands of the street department.

Mr. Krivanek announced that approximately one mile of facing along various portions of the Eighth avenue lateral is badly in need of repairs as well as some of the gratings over the crossings which, he said, present the danger of children falling through into the covered ditch. DRY LAW CAUSES BRITAIN WORRY

Foreign Office Deliberates the American Representations Bearing on Liquor Smuggling

LONDON, April 12 (AP)—The British government is giving due deliberation to representations made by the United States government concerning the smuggling of liquor to the American mainland from Nassau and other West Indian ports, the house of commons was informed tonight by Ronald McNeill, under secretary for foreign affairs.

The question came before the house when members asked whether attention had been called to the participation of the traffic by ships flying the British flag and whether steps were being taken to prevent "this action against the law of a friendly power."

Mr. McNeill in confirming that representations had been made by the United States, said that the liquor appeared to be introduced subsequently into the United States by small craft from the American coast manned by United States citizens.

"It is very difficult," he added, "for his majesty's government to interfere with the legitimate export of any articles from British territory, especially as action by the British government alone would merely drive the trade into other channels.

"The government, however, deplores any complexity of British subjects in the infringement of the law of the United States and is considering, in consultation with the other departments concerned, whether any action can be taken in the sense desired by the United States government."

AMBASSADOR TO RETURN

LONDON, April 12 (AP)—American Ambassador Harvey am. Mrs. Harvey, together with their daughter, Mrs. Marcellus H. Thompson, and their granddaughter, Dorothy, are planning to leave London shortly for a trip to the United States, it was said at the embassy Wednesday. The exact date of their sailing will not be fixed until the ambassador returns to his post in Norfolk, and Mrs. Harvey, who is in Paris, return to London next week.

Society of Dunkards

The first society of Dunkards or Dunkards, a sect of German Baptists, was founded in Schwartzhafen, Germany, 214 years ago by Alexander Mack and seven others. The name "Dunkler" was originally given them as a nickname, and was derived from the German word meaning "to dip." They were also called "Tumbler," from their mode of baptism—putting the person while kneeling head down under the water. The members prefer to be known by their official name of Brethren. The church in America is divided into four sections, the conservatives being by far the largest branch, the others being the old order, the progressives and the seventh day. The original Dunker societies in Germany were cruelly persecuted and about two centuries ago they were forced to leave the fatherland, emigrating to Holland and Friesland, and later coming to America. Most of them settled in Pennsylvania, Maryland and Virginia, later dispersing themselves throughout the continent.

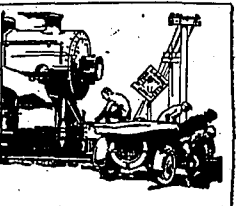

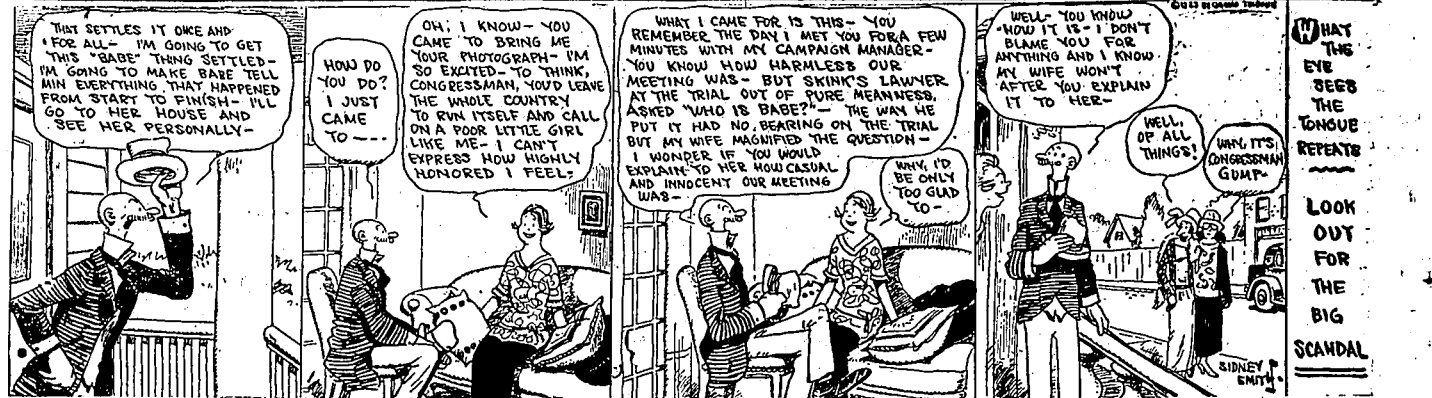
