# KLAN EMPEROR TALKS ON WOES OF AMERICANS

## Colonel Simmons Tells Kamehala Foreign Population in Great Centers Constitutes Menace to Civilization

TULSA, Okla., April 19 (AP)—New York is the "most un-American center on the American continent," William J. Simmons, emperor of the Ku Klux Klan, declared here tonight to the Kamehala, the woman's organization formed along the lines of the klan, at their first general convention.

Directing attention of the convention to what he said was the "menace to white protestant civilization of the race from all sides," Colonel Simmons said the foreign population settled in the great centers of population. He cited New York.

"Within a radius of 10 miles," he said there are more than 10 million of people congested. Of this enormous centralized population there are only 1,100,000 native born, white protestant Americans. The foremost political and social economic of the world recently made a survey of New York city, and after listening to the babble of tongues, after feeling its hot breath of anarchy, after feeling its restlessness, he calmly turned away and said that Petrograd, in its dust and desolation, was a picture of New York city of the future.

The founder of the klan told the convention that "an organization of patriotic, white, protestant American women" was the other side of the coin, which came to him in his youth. He called on them to take their places beside husbands and fathers "until the ideals of Americanism are established and the institutions of the world's greatest democracy are made secure for all time."

### Interprets Japanese Problem.

Colonel Simmons declared that "on the Pacific coast the Japanese for years have striven for a foothold on the American continent. They have sought to acquire land, to have and to exercise property rights and at the same time hold allegiance to the mikado. All the efforts of the Japanese to colonize on the Pacific coast may be interpreted as a carefully designed plan by which that nation is to take by storm in America for a refuge against the coming day of wrath, which will undertake to have an accounting with Japan.

He advocated English language to be spoken in every section, schools teaching and maintaining a foreign tongue abolished, and newspapers and publications printed in the English language. He said the Kamehala and the Klan, composed of the women of a great American university at Atlanta. Colonel Simmons called on the women to preserve the home and to reform and reorganize "the social life of the nation."

### Prescribes Essentials.

Playgrounds for children in cities and American music, the klan chief said, are essential. He said the public school system was "being threatened and invaded. A sect holding allegiance to a foreign potentate, maintaining the right to educate their children under the supervision and control of their church, inveighs against our national public school system."

### HAWAIIANS PETITION FOR LIGHT WINES AND BEER

Territorial House Adopts Resolution Requesting Congress to Amend Prohibition Laws

HONOLULU, April 19 (AP)—The territorial house of representatives Wednesday adopted a concurrent resolution requesting congress to amend the Volstead act to permit the manufacture of light wines and beers in the Hawaiian islands.

The resolution was adopted by a vote of 18 to 10 after the judiciary committee had recommended that it be tabled. During the argument which followed, the introduction of the resolution, Representative Oudha declared it would "be better for the people of Hawaii to have light wines and beer than to drink alcohol as they are doing at present." Okoleho is a native liquor of strong alcoholic content distilled from the roots of the ti plant.

## DOUBLE TRAGEDY COMES AT END OF MARITAL ROW

Bodies of Luis Quintana and Divorced Wife Found by Guests at Dance in Honor of Their Infant Son

EL PASO, April 19 (AP)—Luis Quintana, 23, and his divorced wife, Ramona Quintana, 49, were found dead in an "back of the woman's home early today by guests at a dance given in honor of the couple's three months' old son.

Luis and Ramona lived together two years. Then the woman charged him with being cruel and they separated. But when the baby was christened, Luis left his work in a railroad shop in Poughkeeps to come to the dance celebrating the christening of their infant son.

Couples danced all night, and for a while it looked as if Ramona and Luis would make up, according to the story gleaned from the dancers by the coroner.

Ramona and Luis went for a walk while the dance went on. Luis pleaded in vain for Ramona to return to him. After they had been away from the dance an hour, the dancers became uneasy, organized a searching party and came across both bodies with pistol bullets in their heads.

"Burn my body with my wife's," said a note found on Luis' person. "The person who made us separate is to blame. I could not live without her."

**Birds Ric Cattle of Parasites.**  
The ox-pecker, a bird inhabiting the dark continent, is so called from its fondness for being around domestic and other cattle, which it rids of various parasites.

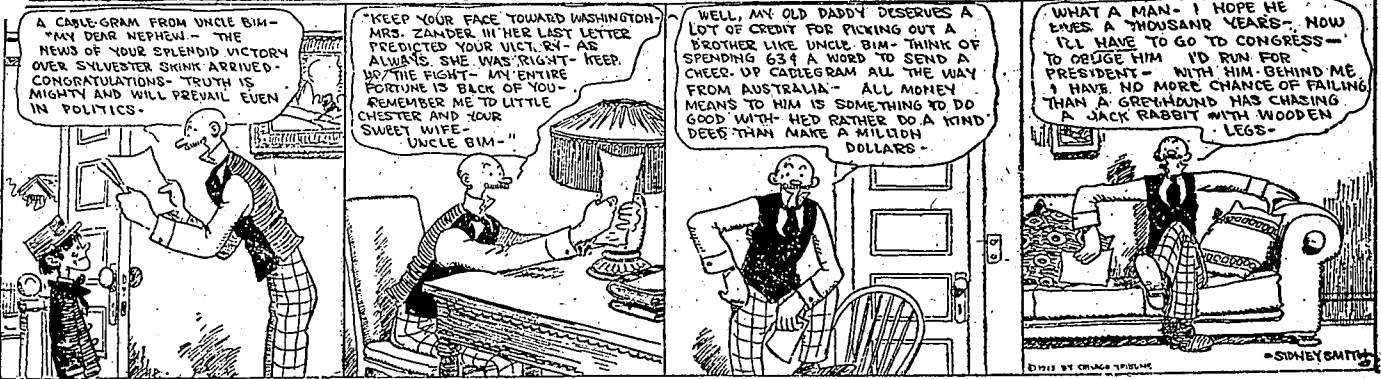

# CONVICT CAMP WHIPPING BOSS TELLS STORY

Florida Legislature's Investigators Hear Accused Man's Side of Alleged Abuse of Prisoners

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., April 10, (AP)—The first one of the legislative investigation into alleged convict abuses in this state, relating to the death of Martin Tabert of North Dakota in the private camp of the Putnam lumber company at Clara, Fla., drew near the end today with the appearance of Walter Higginbotham, the "camp whipping boss." Higginbotham, 35 years old, attired in a neat blue serge suit and silk shirt, came into the committee room in response to his summons. Committee members said frankly that he belied their mental pictures of the "whipper." Higginbotham told the committee in a few words that while he was the official "whipper" of the lumber camp, he carried on his work in a humane manner. He never administered more than 10 or 11 lashes at one time, while his monthly punishments averaged about 10, he said. He did not give Tabert more than six or eight blows, gentle as they were. After a lengthy session today the committee recessed until Saturday morning to allow for the summoning of eight witnesses, four residing here, and the others at nearby Florida towns, by G. Grimson and J. W. Kaczshaw, assistant attorney general of North Dakota.

Two former employes of the Putnam Lumber Co., H. Lagrann of Meigs, Ga., and Jess W. Walters of Cross City, Fla., today testified that they recommended to Higginbotham that Tabert be whipped properly and that the number of licks given him were not more than ten.

**Physician Testifies**  
Dr. C. M. Pusley, of Tallahassee, chairman of the board of the county commissioners of Leon county at the time the board entered into contract with the Putnam company to supply it with prisoners, gave his professional opinion that pneumonia which had been alleged by the lumber camp as the cause of Tabert's death, might be induced by a severe whipping such as Tabert is said to have received.

Assistant Attorney Grimson informed the committee that it would not be necessary to summon but eight of the 37 witnesses, which he had requested Tuesday. Those residing as far west as the state of Washington, including the mother and brother of Tabert, will not testify.

**PAVES WAY FOR AMERICA TO JOIN WORLD COURT**

LONDON, April 10, (AP)—Elliot Wadsworth, assistant secretary of the United States treasury, arrived in London today from Paris where he had been negotiating with the allied representatives for reimbursement of the American army costs in the Rhineland. While he has appointments with American Ambassadors tomorrow, he said, his conversations with the latter would not be concerned with the delay in the British debt funding agreement. He plans to return to Paris Monday to attend a meeting of the reparations commission.

**INVESTIGATORS ON FIRE SCENE**  
SACRAMENTO, Cal., April 19 (AP)—Almost while funeral services were being held today for nine of the ten children burned to death in a fire which destroyed the dormitory of the Japanese school here, representatives of the state arson board arrived to investigate the circumstances of the fire. The funeral of the tenth child will be held later. It has been suggested in several quarters that this and other fires in the Japanese quarter were incendiary. Inquiry into their cause was begun yesterday by the fire department.

**JURORS DISQUALIFY SELVES.**  
SAN FRANCISCO, April 10 (AP)—After a jury had been sworn in today to try a group of building contractors and building material firms on a charge of violating the state anti-trust law, one juror was excused when he announced that he was acquainted with a number of the defendants, and two others were excused because they had developed opinions regarding the case.

FORESEE BIGGER CROPS IN IDAHO

Federal Bulletin Predicts Increase in Winter Wheat; Labor in Demand

The outlook for the winter wheat crop in Idaho early in April indicated a 9,000,000 bushel crop for 1923, taking into consideration the assumption of average abundance of acreage and average influence on the crop until harvest, according to an official report from the Boise office of the division of crops and livestock under the department of agriculture.
The report, in part, follows:
"The 1922 crop totaled 8,653,000 bushels, and 1921, 10,152,000 bushels. Average abandonment due to winter killing in the average for the past 10 years on April 1, 1922, the annual average was 5.8 per cent. It was the lowest in 1919, when 2 per cent of the crop was abandoned, and highest in 1917 and 1920, when 10 per cent of the acreage failed to survive winter conditions.
"As is usually the case, April found much of the state's winter wheat still snow covered, with uncertainty existing as to the true condition of the crop. The past winter has not been severe and winter killing should be less than average. On April 1 the crop had a condition of 91 per cent of normal against 95 per cent a year ago and 94 per cent of normal for the past 10 years on April 1. The crop improved 10 points from December 1, 1922, to April 1, 1923.
"The Idaho States winter wheat forecast is 672,317,000 bushels, against 586,041,000 bushels last year, 600,312,000 bushels in 1921, and 565,995,000 bushels in 1920. The average for the past 10 years is only 72.3 per cent compared with 78.4 per cent a year ago and 91 per cent April 1, 1921. Furthermore, the average for the 10 years is 8.9 points below the 10 year average.
"Hogs Increase.
"From all over the state come reports of increased interest in the swine industry. The number of breeding sows has increased in the average for the past 10 years and 5 per cent over the usual number on hand April 1, which would indicate a healthy increase in the spring pig market in the average for the past 10 years. A survey made last December through the rural mail carriers, which showed that the number of litters farrowed in the fall of 1922 was 33 per cent greater than in the fall of 1921. The total January 1, 1923 survey found 235,009 head of swine in the state, or 20 per cent more than the previous year.
"Labor Supply Equals Demand.
"Farm labor supply, relative to the farmers' demand for it, shows a material decrease for the past two years. On April 1, 1923, the ratio of supply to demand was exactly 100 per cent, while on April 1, 1922, it was 118 per cent. The supply this year is only 92 per cent of normal, but the demand has increased about 10 per cent. The reason farmers are not in a position to finance all their labor requirements, increased activity in mining, lumbering and other industries, and the fact that considerable labor at better wages than offered in farming districts.
"Under the heading 'Idaho at a Glance' in the report, the report says:
"Although the season up to April 1 was backward, still it was somewhat earlier than last year. In the western part of the state the ground was still wet to plow. The first week in April, however, saw numerous showers and reasonable temperatures, which brought a crop to early seeding, pastures and ranges in southwestern counties.
"The North—Boundary, Bonner, Kootenai, Blaine, Clearwater and Latah counties, spring work backwardly, with about April 15, ground was filled with moisture. Outlook better than last year. Logging operations still drawing the help. Bean acreage due for increase. Pastures and pastures and winter wheat. Spring work well advanced.
"Central—Lemhi, Valley, Custer and Boise counties, backward spring; no work started. Soil moisture short in farming areas. Range rather dry around Challis.
"South Central—Snow still 11.2 to 2 feet deep in Camas county. In Shoshone, Lincoln, Jerome, Minidoka, Cassia and Twin Falls counties, it was cold and backward. Snow still just getting started April 1. Rain was needed. Minidoka county reports everything normal except money.
"The East—Practically no field work started as yet. Snow and Fremont counties south to the Utah line. Mostly snow covered, Pocatello north and east. Heavy snow in mountains favorable for

Cleaning Spark-Plugs

THE ONLY PART of a spark-plug which it is essential to keep clean is the surface of the porcelain, lava or mica core that insulates the center or live terminal from the side or ground portion. It is the center or live terminal that sparks, the points themselves, despite the general belief to the contrary, although any deposits that bridge between the points should be removed. Plugs will not become dirty except in engine using over-rich mixtures or which allow loose oil to collect about the pistons. Even when these conditions exist for a short time and then cease, plugs will clean themselves automatically—the electrical discharges and the combustion disposing of soot and oil deposited on the insulation. In an engine that is run on a correct mixture and has a properly working oiling system, it should run thousands of miles without attention. Plugs, the insulation of which around the live spark-point is exposed can usually be cleaned sufficiently merely by brushing off the deposit from the end of the bushing. It is unnecessary to remove the plugs from the engine to clean them. The end insulation of which is not exposed, usually have to be taken apart to enable the porcelain to be wiped off.

OVERLOADED TIRES



T. E. R. asks: I get very low mileage from my tires although I take good care of them and am not a hard driver. Do you think the car could be too heavy for them? How can I find out about this?

Answer: Drive your car with its regular equipment onto a platform scale and obtain its total weight. By weighing the front and rear sections separately you can obtain very closely the weight that they respectively carry. Your tire sections are usually a little over the limit of weight that they carry. To secure the best mileage results it is advisable to keep the tire loads below the limit recommended by the maker. You may need over-size tires.

POLISH FOR BODIES



E. T. H. asks: Should polish be used on the car and if so what kind is best?

Answer: After a car has been serviced for a time, the varnish

tends to lose its qualities to some extent and it is considered advisable to apply to it a liquid containing ingredients designed to restore these qualities. A suitable quality of furniture polish, such as is used on chairs and other finely varnished surfaces, is considered good for automobile bodies, once in a while and giving them a fine body should be absolutely free from grit, or scratching will result. The polish should be applied with a very light coat, with a piece of cheesecloth and wiped off and gently polished with another piece of dry cheesecloth.

FLAT TIRES



O. B. T. asks: Is there any danger in a tire becoming punctured without the driver knowing about it?

Answer: When a front tire goes flat the car steers hard and often there is a noticeable grinding noise from the gears and rear bearings. A deflated tire makes more power necessary to run the car. The car "drags," taking away the buoyant, springy action, which it ought to have and giving the steering to skid. A flat tire on a front wheel is much more dangerous than one at the rear.

NOVELIST PROVED HIS CASE

Critics of Dickens' "Spontaneous Combustion" Death Proved Wrong by Eminent Medical Men.
It may be recalled that Charles Dickens, the famous novelist, employs spontaneous combustion to give force to one of the episodes in his fascinating story known as "Bleak House."
One of the dark characters of the story is old Krook, proprietor of a rag and bone warehouse. He is a grumpy drunkard, consuming great quantities of gin. One day two men, occupying an upper room in the old warehouse, smelt burning, and on going below to investigate, found a smouldering heap of something looking like charred old rag. At the inquest the coroner's jury held that old Krook came to his end by spontaneous combustion.
Some critics of Dickens challenged this as being impossible. The account of Krook's death was, therefore, bad art and a blemish on the whole story. Dickens saved by citing a similar case that had occurred in Paris, France, and was confirmed by a report of several eminent medical men who had thoroughly investigated the matter.
