WASHINGTON, May 24 (P)—The worst of the farmers' troubles are over and agricultural conditions are better than at any time in recent years, Secretry Wallace today vold the members of the American Wholesale Grocers' association.

The most marked improvement, he said in an address at the association's annual convention, has been in the cet ton growing states and in the corn boit He said he looked for continued improvement with the difference between the buying power of the farmer's dollar and that of other workers being stabilized.

Charles W. Dunn of New York, counsel for the American Specialty Manufacturers' association, advocated legislation to overcome judicial decisions that "resale price maintenance contracts are illegal," and to pormit the manufacturer of a standard article to determine a standard price for it.

Prohibition of price contract, he declared, "is manifestly inconsistent, unreasonable and unjustly discriminatory in its practical conception and application" and is "unavailing and futile inits larger aspects."


