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LIBERALS SEEK REPUTATION OF ASSEMBLY'S ACT

Sixty-Six Presbyterian Church Leaders File Protest Against Condemning of Doctrines Preached by Fosdyck

INDIANAPOLIS, May 24 (AP)—Sixty-six leaders of the Presbyterian Church of the United States filed with the general assembly today a protest against the assembly's action yesterday in condemning the doctrines preached by Harry Emerson Fosdyck in the First Presbyterian church of New York.

An attempt was made by fundamentalists to vote the protest out of the record, but Dr. Charles F. Wishart, the moderator, ruled a protest was not admissible without the consent of the assembly.

The assembly completed its eighth day's session and adjourned at 4:15 p. m. to meet at Grand Rapids May 22 of next year.

One of its last official acts was to send down to the presbyteries for their consideration an overture to amend the church law to permit individual presbyteries to restrict the regular employment of ministers of other denominations, such as Dr. Fosdyck, who is a Baptist.

While the overture, if approved, would legalize the employment of Dr. Fosdyck and other outsiders in special cases, it will not change yesterday's mandate to the First Presbyterian church of New York and all other churches of the denomination to see that the doctrine expounded in their pulpits conforms to the doctrine of the church and the Westminster confessions of faith.

Charges Lack of Evidence.

The protest against yesterday's action was signed by Dr. George Alexander, pastor of the church where Dr. Fosdyck preaches; Notina R. Beet, editor of the Continent, a church publication; William P. M. Clark, pastor of the famous Brick church of New York; Rev. Martin D. Hardin, student pastor at Cornell university; Rev. Edward H. Fewe, Portland, Ore.; Rev. James C. Reid, San Francisco; Rev. Murray S. Howland, Buffalo; practically all of the New York delegates and many others.

The protest, which is the result of an action based on allegations of the Philadelphia presbytery on conditions in the New York presbytery, which were "not substantiated by the evidence" that the assembly had condemned without proper hearing; and that the resolution seeks to impose "a doctrinal test on the members of the church."

Speaking of it, Dr. Alexander, under whose direction Dr. Fosdyck preaches, told the assembly "despite the protest which was just heard, the First Presbyterian church of New York city will proceed to carry out the mandate of the general assembly. I ask for your sympathy, forbearance, and I may say, cooperation, as I go back to face the difficult task of interpreting this action to the members of my church."

Fosdyck Not Injured.

"Do not expect us to do everything tomorrow, much as I regret the action of the general assembly. I am not concerned with Dr. Fosdyck. The action will not diminish his popularity or usefulness."

"The question has been raised that he holds his position for its emoluments. I want to say he stipulated he should receive no more under his

agreement, than he did the year previous to his entering into it.

Dr. Fosdyck, more than any man I know, has done for the educated young men and women of today. He has been bringing them back to the light of Christ and I desire not to do anything to hinder or alienate these young people from the church. If there is some delay don't think we are disobeying your mandate. We are simply trying to preserve unity and the power of the Presbyterian church."

UTAH GOVERNOR GRANTS REPRIEVE TO MURDERER

Orders Stay of Execution of Death Sentence Upon G. Gardner when Evidence of Insanity is Found

SALT LAKE, May 24 (AP)—George Gardner, alleged slayer of two men, sentenced to be shot by a firing squad at the Utah state prison tomorrow, was granted a reprieve until the next meeting of the state prison board by Governor Malloy today.

The governor's action followed the declaration that evidence of insanity was found in an examination of the

prisoner by a lunacy commission today. The commission had been appointed by Governor Malloy this morning following opportunities by two sisters of the condemned man.

The next regular meeting of the state prison board is set to be held on June 23.

Gardner was convicted of the murder of Gordon Stuart, deputy sheriff, at the Gardner ranch home, near Welby, Utah, on April 15, 1922. At his trial it was charged that Gardner shot the officer when the latter came to his home to serve a process of claim and delivery of property in Gardner's possession alleged to belong to Joseph Irvine, Gardner's former business partner. Gardner then pursued Irvine, who

had fled, and shot him a short distance from the home.

Mrs. Martha Gorrance, Gardner's common law wife, was convicted of complicity in the slayings and is serving a 10-year sentence.

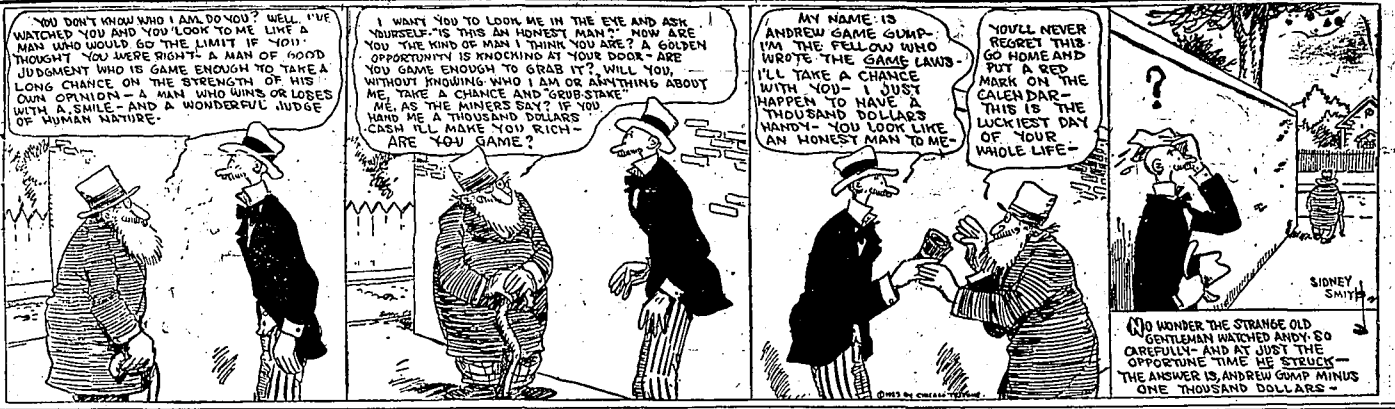

Hundreds of other cities and towns in the West look at the matter in the same way, and many of them are coming to be known favorably throughout the land because of their kindly and thoughtful reception of summer visitors.

The eastern part of the country has been strangely slow to realize the value of this kind of hospitality, and loses accordingly.

MOVIE STAR INCOMES

Ever since Charlie Chaplin signed his famous million-dollar contract back in nineteen hundred seventeen, the public has had an idea that movie stars made money in fabulous amounts and with comparatively little effort.

Other contracts for one hundred thousand dollars or more for a single picture, have dazzled the public mind. But that money is not all clear profit, as shown by evidence brought out in a federal trade commission inquiry.

Film stars, said the witness, are paid for the completed negatives. Out of that lump sum the star—be it man or woman—must pay the producing expenses. These include the salaries of the director, camera men and supporting cast, building of sets, film negatives, location costs and traveling expenses.

Await Outcome of Test of New Law

Interest Shown in First Case Under Senator Pike's "Lazy Husband" Measure

Considerable interest surrounds the outcome of the preliminary hearing of Ivan Cobb of Filer, in probate court Friday morning on a charge of family desertion, the case being regarded as a test case of the "lazy husband" bill passed by the state legislature.

The county commissioners will attend the hearing for the purpose of obtaining an insight into the operation of the law and as a matter of guidance.

The law was introduced at the last session of the legislature by Senator W. F. Pike of Twin Falls, and the procedure is believed to be the first on record since the measure went into effect.

The measure provides three ways in case of conviction, in which the cases may be disposed of. The defendant, if found guilty, can be put at work at a wage of \$1.50 a day, part of which is turned over to his family, and the rest remitted to the county, or he can obtain work of his own choice and pay the specified amount, or he can pay his fine in one sum.

The board of county commissioners has received occasional requests for financial assistance from men apparently alcohol-habituated and the commissioners are interested to know whether or not these men can be classified under the new law.

J. W. Taylor, prosecuting attorney, will represent the state in the hearing, and Frank Stephan, former prosecutor, will be counsel for the defense.

Seek Candidates for Summer Camp

Legion Puts County Representative in Field for Military Training Courses

In response to a request from Lester F. Albert, adjutant of the Idaho department of the American Legion, C. H. Kroneck, Twin Falls post commander, has appointed a county representative to have charge of enlistments for the Legion's Military Training Camp this summer.

Major Drew W. Standard, of Pocatello, has been given charge of the work in this state and he is urging Legion officials throughout the state to appoint representatives to have charge of the enlistments and to push the work as rapidly as possible in each county.

Twin Falls county is entitled to 14 men, and Adjutant Albert asks that an alternate be selected for each candidate in order to insure the full quota to which the county is entitled.

The candidates residing in the ninth army corps area will be sent to three different camps, each being located in the various sub-districts. The Idaho candidates will go to Fort Douglas, Utah.

Three courses are offered at the summer camps, which are conducted entirely as a matter of keeping the young men of the country in able condition for military service. The training is conducted along military lines, although recreation in practically every approved form is added to make the courses more pleasant. Training expenses are paid by the government and the candidate is not compelled to take the full course, the opportunity being offered of leaving the camp when he desires.

LOCAL MOTORISTS JOIN IN AUTO ASSOCIATION

Campaign Progresses Favorably for Members Here; Field Secretary Outlines Aim of Organization

R. W. Adams, field representative of the Idaho Automobile association, reports that the campaign for membership in the organization through the assistance of the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce is progressing in a satisfactory manner although the number of sign-up applications are fewer than was at first expected.

The present aims of the association are to log and mark the highway from Granger to Weiser, issue literature of interest to the tourist in southern Idaho and directing him as to the best routes and calling attention to Idaho's various attractions.

Membership in the Idaho association carries with it membership in the American Automobile association and co-operative privileges and favors in each co-operating state association, including California, Oregon, Washington, Montana and all other western states.

The local drive for members will probably be closed Saturday or Monday, according to Mr. Adams.
