

CHINESE TELL HORROR STORY ON SHIPBOARD

Fifteen Orientals, Survivors of Man-Smuggling Mystery Boat, Unfold Tale of Hand-to-Hand Combat

NEW YORK, June 14 (AP)—A story of horror on the sea within the shadow of the Sandy Hook rum fleet's rendezvous, reminiscent of the days of buccannery on the Spanish main, was drawn piecemeal today from 15 Chinese survivors of the man-smuggling schooner Mary Beatrice, picked up last night at the entrance to the harbor.

They unfolded a story of hand-to-hand encounter between 21 Chinese passengers and the crew of four. In the fight the crew and five Chinese were slaughtered and thrown overboard after the unidentified captain had deserted the craft with \$2000 passage money. When their stories were concluded the authorities were as mystified as they were when the little schooner slipped into the harbor with her strange passengers.

Trace Ship's Origin

The British consul, communicated with officials at Nassau, Bahamas, the port from which the Chinese said they had last sailed, in an effort to trace the whereabouts of the craft and her captain's identity. Nothing throwing any light on the situation had been received tonight.

The stories of the 15 survivors pieced together, indicated that the schooner had arrived off the coast about June 6, and stood off for several days awaiting a vessel to approach the shore. Provisions and drinking water ran short and then the mysterious captain, to whom each had paid \$250, quit the ship and has not been seen since.

The suspicion of the Chinese were aggravated when the mate demanded an additional \$250. Two white men and two negroes complained of the resistance to the demand for more money was said to have started a general battle at dusk Tuesday, implements of every kind being brought into play.

Battle of Minox Weapons

Interlopers gathered from accounts given by the Chinese that the attack first was made on one of their number, then they joined in the struggle for self-preservation, using knives, razors, axes, marlin spikes or anything that could be used as a weapon.

The outnumbered crew was overpowered and killed, and with five of their opponents who lay in a fray, their bodies were cast into the sea.

The mystery was intensified by the absence of ship's papers or navigating instruments.

The 15 Chinese will be taken before officials of the Chinese bureau of immigration tomorrow. If it is found that the schooner was British, it was said the Chinese would be turned over to the British government, and if the craft was of American registry the federal authorities probably would prosecute the 15 men for the killing of the crew.

Doubts Chinese Casualties

John F. Danton, inspector in charge of the Chinese division of the immigration service, said he was skeptical whether the five Chinese had been killed on the boat.

He based his conclusion, he said, on the fact that on June 10 he was advised that a schooner was on run rum with 15 Chinese aboard.

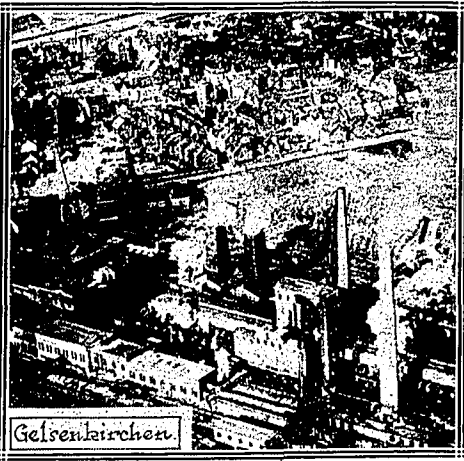

LIQUOR TANGLE DEBATE THEME

Possibility of Inability to Modify Dry Rule Figures in Washington Discussions

WASHINGTON, June 14 (AP)—Negotiations with maritime powers for reciprocal concessions by treaty to clear up simultaneously rum smuggling and ship liquor problems still lacked any authoritative indications today of how a powers approached would receive the state department's proposals. Neither through the Washington diplomats nor American ambassadors abroad for it could be learned, but an official intimation of this nature been transmitted.

Foreshadowing some further development in the diplomatic conversation, a storm of argument swept Washington today dealing for the most part with the relation of supreme court rulings and the new administration plan for cutting both the commercial intercourse and rum smuggling embarrassments that surrounded it. One school of thought had developed which contended that the "transit" decision of the court had set up such a construction of the "transportation" prohibition clause of the eighteenth amendment that the government, even congress, was powerless to authorize transportation of liquor within American territory.

Rejects Barrier Theory

For administration viewpoint, it is declared flatly and authoritatively that such a construction of the effect of the court's opinion would not and could not be tolerated. It also was said to be the determination of administration leaders to present a contrary theory up to such a time as the supreme court might decide, in a specific case presented to it for decision and directly involving that point, that the amendment did in fact prevent congress from exercising powers of regulation of the transportation of liquor.

In that event, it was stated, there exists no means of relieving the ship liquor situation except by further amendment of the legislation through ratification of the amending resolution by 36 states. How many years such a process might take, nobody in authority would predict.

Two Ways Open

Following what is held by high administration officials to be the only common sense and practical view of the supreme court's decision and statements, prolonged study of the ship liquor questions at the state department has convinced Secretary Hughes that nothing could be done except through

a change in the Volstead act. Two means of effecting such a change are open and the administration, it was explained, has elected to move at once toward exercising the treaty making power to supersede any existing statute. Supplementary remedial legislation by congress also may be undertaken later.

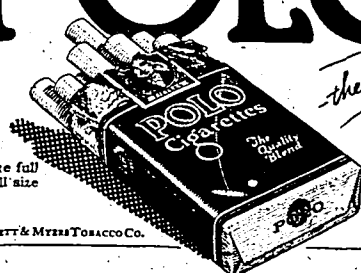
