

NEW FIGHT STARTS IN OKLAHOMA

Senate Rearranges Program of Measures with View to Unmasking Klan; Stringent Law Under Consideration

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., Nov. 22 (AP)—Anti-Klan Klan measures underwent a baptism of fiery assault and loyal defense in the Oklahoma senate today without an agreement being reached on as much as one section of the bill which the senate hopes to present to the governor.

With several bills before the upper house all seeking the same end in some degree and virtually every senator with an idea as to necessary provisions for the act, the senate decided to dissect its committee substitute measure section by section and by incorporating features of various other bills into the measure which will unmask the Klan in a way and make public its membership lists.

Today's arguments went no further than the question of the measure which would compel all secret societies of the state to file with authorities in each county the names and addresses of their officers and members.

A plan for a measure with teeth, not much and milk, found many ardent supporters.

Predicts Civil War - A prediction that civil war would come in Oklahoma if the Klan is not unmasked was made by Senator Frye, of Sullivan, who declared he had been informed persons in the southeast part of the state are organizing and waiting to see what this legislature does.

Many of the senators arrayed against the proposed measure declared that while they favored anti-klan legislation they were opposed to public membership rolls for secret organizations.

Transact Enactment Bill - An impeachment bill charging Charles H. Babb, supreme court commissioner, with trafficking in executive clemency, was presented to the senate today but was not acted on pending consideration of the possible disqualification of Chief Justice Johnson of the state supreme court who by virtue of his office would preside over an impeachment trial.

Resolution Killed - Members of the lower house today killed a resolution asking the expulsion of Representative Guy Bigler of Carter county, who was mentioned in a resolution which would be presented.

Criminal action against J. C. Walton for alleged offenses during his administration as governor did not materialize today. The district court grand jury failed to report.

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GRAHAM SEEKS LEADERSHIP IN LOWER HOUSE

Believes Coolidge will Pursue "Hands Off" Policy in Contest; Opposes Continuation of Representative Gillett

WASHINGTON, Nov. 22 (AP)—Representative Graham of Illinois after a conference today with President Coolidge announced he would remain in the race for republican leader of the house. He said he had gained the impression that the president would pursue a hands off policy in the contest which has developed between him and Representative Longworth of Ohio. Mr. Graham explained he had gone to the White House to discuss the general political situation with Mr. Coolidge and his secretary, C. Dawson Slamp, for years a member of the house.

While the president desires intraparty and Mr. Graham to express no preference on to candidate for leadership, but indicated it was a question to be settled by republican members of the house.

Discusses Policy.
During his talk with the president Mr. Graham expressed the view that continuation of Representative Gillett of Massachusetts as speaker by Mr. Longworth, an Ohioan, as republican leader, would not prove popular with the country at large. Such a policy, he contended, might injure the republican party prospects in the presidential election next year, because of its national character.

In a formal statement issued after his interview at the White House, Mr. Graham declared the movement to make him leader was not a "radical or insubordinate" one.
"It is a sane, progressive movement," he continued, "in support of what we are convinced will be for the best interests of the republican party and the country. It is just a matter of good, common sense."

Outlines Views.
"If the republican party is to be successful," said Mr. Graham, "if its presidential candidate is to be elected, it must be because the people of the country believe that the whole country is represented and being considered in the administration and conduct of national affairs by the party. We cannot be sectional in our councils. The content being made on the organization of the house has nothing to do with individual candidates; it is simply an effort to make the house of representatives what it ought to be and what the people demand it shall be, representative in its acts of the whole country, east and west, north and south. To concentrate power in any portion of the country does not meet this requirement."

Mr. Graham declared that house republicans supporting him were deeply concerned with the makeup of committees and would press for representation on all the important ones, including the republican steering committee.

Supporters of Mr. Graham predicted they would muster at least 80 votes for him in the republican organization conference which will be held a week from Saturday, two days before the convening of congress.
