COLUMBUS, Ohio, Feb. 4 (AP)—Decline of a student found late today in the stomach of David L. Puskas of Canton, Ohio, Ohio State university student, who died suddenly on Sunday evening.

Unofficially, it is believed that the sudden death of Puskas and another student in the last four days and the violent illness of other students, was due to poison, probably intentionally placed in medicine prescribed on the campus.

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LIABILITY FOR FARMER RELIEF WITH CONGRESS

President Makes Known His Stand on Agriculture Legislation; Has Done His Duty Through Commission Report.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 4.—Responsibility for enactment or failure of legislation to aid the farmers is regarded by President Coolidge as now resting entirely in the hands of congress.

The president's position, as made known yesterday at the White House is that having submitted through the report of his agricultural commission recommendation as to farm legislation and given, progress five weeks to consider same, it is up to congress and particularly its agriculture committee to obtain enactment of legislation before adjournment March 1.

Failure to Enact Bills.

Failure to enact bills based on the agricultural commission's report will be regarded by the president as evidence that the congressional committee entrusted with farm legislation do not regard the present farm situation as of an emergency nature and accordingly he will not be disposed to call an extra session of congress to consider such legislation.

Some members of congress, holding that passage of the farm aid bills is impossible in the four remaining weeks of the present congress, have proposed that the president call a special session of the new congress after March 4, to make plain, Mr. Coolidge has no intention of doing.

Met Separately.

The agricultural committee of the senate and house met separately before the procurement of Mr. Coolidge's views. The senate committee meeting to begin hearings on the basis of the agricultural commission's report adjourned until Monday without making any witnesses. Chairman Norris announced it was decided to hear members of the commission first and, he stated, when he returned to his home during a temporary recess of the committee, nothing could be done until next week.

Hearings were continued by the house committee with Representative William Campbell, Michigan, explaining his revised co-operative marketing bill designed to carry out the agricultural commission's recommendations. The committee decided to have drafted for use as a basis of consideration a bill embodying all of the commission's recommendations excepting the suggestions relative to the tariff.

Two New Measures.

Two additional agricultural bills made their appearance during the day. Chairman Hagen of the house agricultural committee, presented a measure containing some of the features of the McNary-Haugen surplus marketing bill which the agricultural commission refused to endorse. Senator Capper, republican, Kansas, reintroduced his bill creating a federal co-operative marketing board such as has been recommended by the president's commission.

FORMER GOVERNOR SUED:

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 4.—Established Canto, now a resident of Los Angeles, but formerly governor of the northern district of Lower California, Mexico, with Fred A. Dato, his brother-in-law, were named defendants in a suit to collect \$250,000 filed against them by the territory over which Canto once ruled. By agreement the case was continued until November and in the meantime a compromise settlement will be attempted.

POISONED CANDY CHARGE:

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 4.—When Dr. F. R. Kerr, physician of Pullman, was brought into justice court today on a charge of having mailed poisoned candy recently to his divorced wife, Dr. Luella Kerr, it was revealed that the federal grand jury has returned a secret indictment against him, and he was turned over to the federal officers. The indictment charges him with sending poisoned candy through the mail.

Grangers Oppose Appropriation for Maternity Bureau

Resolutions Passed by Executive Committee of State Farm Organization Against Sheppard-Towner Fund for Idaho.

BOISE, Feb. 4.—Resolutions urging that no appropriation be made for the Idaho branch of the maternity bureau under the Sheppard-Towner act, have been passed by the executive committee of the Idaho state grange. Ada county members announce. The following resolutions were passed:

"Resolved that we as a state body hereby advise to mothers whose thrift pays for maternity advice that may be obtained from reliable sources.

"Advice from family doctors is more apt to be practical and costs nothing, while advice given as public clinics is often too hasty to be correct and the money paid for such doctors and nurses is wasted.

"Only careful nursing, not advice, saves the lives of mothers and children.

"When a community cannot care for its own poor, the county hospital will do so.

"This so-called maternity act casts reflection upon the wisdom of the farmers to manage their own affairs. It makes mothers seem careless and incompetent when in reality these mothers are burdened with over work made necessary by high taxes.

"It furnishes jobs to so called women who are the same as the men who wives whom they seek to advise.

"We resent the efforts of imprudent city politicians who are seeking further appropriations to maintain this maternity bureau.

"We believe the rural mothers prove themselves during war years as efficient as city women and we believe further than rural mothers are often wiser in their advice for their homes cheaper and better than that given by this bureau.

"And lastly, may God forbid the continuance of this paternalism which insults the peace and dignity of American homes and mothers."

Break Feared in Opium Meet:

Developments Unsatisfactory to American Delegation at Conference; May Refuse to Sign.

GENEVA, Feb. 4.—So unsatisfactory from the American standpoint were today's developments at the international opium conference that, if they stand as the last word of the delegates, it may be impossible for the American delegation to sign the anti-narcotic convention which is now near completion.

"Such was the impression radiating from the American delegates tonight," Stephen G. Porter, head of the American delegation said last night that he thought today's action was the most serious that had occurred, because it struck a blow at the most vital element of the American proposals, which is that opium production should be limited to medicinal and scientific needs.

Unable to Agree:

The subcommittee which has been struggling with this question for two months definitely concluded this afternoon that they have been unable to agree because of reservations made by five opium growing countries. Turkey and Persia, particularly, explained their objections, whose very existence depends on their crops and not upon cultivating the opium poppy unless their crops are given them in return and this costs money. Mr. Porter would seem to find difficulty in signing a convention which does not tally the American principles because of the very nature of his instructions.

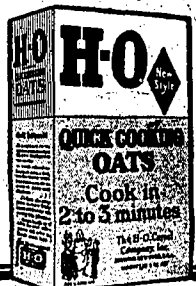

ROTARY ETHICS THEME OF TALK

Water Clear, Pocatello, Traces Modern Business Development in Address Here.

The ethics of Rotary formed the subject of an address of unusual interest delivered before the Twin Falls Rotary club and a number of invited guests on Wednesday evening by Walter Clear, planner merchant of Pocatello, and a charter member of the Pocatello club. Mr. Clear traced the development of modern business from the time 40 years ago in the primitive conditions upon the principle that trickery and misrepresentation were a legitimate part of the business of selling goods. He drew from his own experience as an experienced clerk in an English city, for example of the principle, describing the custom of making one half of a shipment of goods at a price to afford a legitimate profit, and the other half at a price bringing an exorbitant gain and carrying the other a premium upon all sales at the higher price.

This declared the speaker, was regarded as entirely ethical and thoroughly respectable. The scheme with variations was practiced by the most successful merchants and generally accepted as the only way in which to conduct a store.

Came then a new school of merchandising which stood upon the principle that honesty was the best policy and much of the evils of the old methods disappeared. Still later merchants began the practice of rigid honesty and fair dealing, not on the ground alone that honesty was the best policy, but because it was the right policy and the right thing to do. From this point Mr. Clear traced the tendency of modern merchandising into the field first down by the ethics of Rotary and similar institutions, which not only practiced honesty for its own sake, but went even farther and endeavored to give with each transaction a degree of service far in excess of the requirements of trade, and for about twenty years ago.

The speaker closed with a forceful admonition to his auditors to "be careful in the selection of the things which money can buy, not to lose the things which money cannot buy."

Mr. Clear introduced by the club's president, C. E. Booth, completed the better part of an hour, during which his hearers listened with rapt attention. The applause upon his conclusion was of unusual duration.

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LIABILITY FOR FARMER RELIEF WITH CONGRESS

President Makes Known His Stand on Agriculture Legislation; Has Done His Duty Through Commission Report

WASHINGTON, Feb. 4 (AP)—Responsibility for enactment of failure of legislation to aid the farmers is regarded by President Coolidge, as now resting fully in the hands of congress.

The president's position, as made known yesterday at the White House is that, having submitted through the report of his agricultural commission, recommendation as to farm legislation and given congress five weeks to consider them, it is up to congress and particularly its agriculture committee to obtain enactment of legislation before adjournment March 4.

Failure to Enact Bills.
Failure to enact bills based on the agricultural commission's report will be regarded by the president as equivalent to the failure of congress to take any action on farm legislation. The president accordingly he will not dispose to call an extra session of congress to consider such legislation.

Some members of congress, holding that passage of the farm aid bills is impossible in the four remaining weeks of the present congress, have proposed that the president call a special session of the new congress after March 4, to take up such legislation. This, it is made plain, Mr. Coolidge has no intention of doing.

Issue Separately.
The agricultural committee of the senate and house met, separately before the pronouncement of Mr. Coolidge's views. The senate committee, meeting to begin hearings on the basis of the agricultural commission's report adjourned until Monday without calling any witnesses. Chairman Norris announced it was decided to hear members of the committee first and, as soon as they had returned to their homes "bring a majority report of the committee's holdings could be done until next week."

Hearings were continued by the house committee with Representative William, republican, Michigan, explaining his revised co-operative marketing bill designed to carry out the agricultural commission's recommendations. The committee decided to have drafted for use as a basis of consideration a bill embodying all of the commission's recommendations excepting the suggestions relative to the tariff.

Two New Measures.
Two additional agricultural bills made their appearance during the day. Chairman Hagen of the house agricultural committee, presented a measure containing some of the features of the McNary-Chapman surplus marketing bill which the agricultural committee refused to endorse. Senator Capper, republican, Kansas, reintroduced his bill providing a federal co-operative marketing board such as has been recommended by the president's commission.

FORMER GOVERNOR FUED.

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 4 (AP)—Estaban Cautin, now a resident of Los Angeles, but formerly governor of the northern district of Lower California, Mexico, with Fred A. Dato, his brother-in-law, were named defendants in a suit to collect \$257,000 filed against them by the territory over which Cautin once ruled. By agreement the case was concluded until November and in the meantime a compromise settlement will be attempted.

POISONED CANDY CHARGE.

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 4 (AP)—When Dr. P. E. Kerr, physician of Ellmore, was brought into justice court today on a charge of having mailed poisoned candy recently to his divorced wife, Dr. Luella Kerr, it was revealed that the federal grand jury has returned a secret indictment against him, and he was turned over to the federal officers. The indictment charges him with sending poisoned candy through the mail.

Resolutions, Passed by Executive Committee of State Farm Organization Against Sheppard-Towner Fund for Idaho.

BOISE, Feb. 4.—Resolutions urging that no appropriation be made for the Idaho branch of the maternity bureau under the Sheppard-Towner act, have been passed by the executive committee of the Idaho state grange. Ad county members announce. The following reasons are given:

"Bait from taxes is more necessary than advice to mothers whose thrift pays for maternity advice that may be secured from more reliable sources."

"Advice from family doctors is more apt to be practical and costs nothing, while advice given at public clinics is often too hasty to be correct and the money paid for such doctors and nurses is wasted."

"Only careful nursing, not advice, saves the lives of mothers and children."

"When a community cannot care for its own poor, the county hospital will or should."

"This so-called maternity act casts reflections upon the ability of the farmer to manage their own affairs. It makes mothers seem careless and dependent upon the charity of those who are not their own doctors."

"It furnishes jobs to so called women who know less than the farmers' wives who they are to advise."

"We resent the efforts of impractical city club-women, who are seeking further appropriations to maintain this maternity bureau."

"We believe the rural mother proved themselves during the war just as efficient as city women and we believe further that rural mothers are capable of getting advice for their babies, cheaper and better than that given by this bureau."

"And lastly, may God forbid the continuance of this paternalism which insults the sense and dignity of American homes and mothers."

BREAK FEARED IN OPIUM MEET

Developments Unsatisfactory to American Delegation at Conference; May Refuse to Sign.

GENEVA, Feb. 4 (AP)—So unsatisfactory from the American standpoint were today's developments at the international opium conference that, if they stand as the last word of the delegates, it may be impossible for the American delegation to sign the anti-narcotic convention which is now near completion.

Such was the impression radiating from the American delegates tonight. Stephen C. Porter, head of the American delegation said last night that he thought today's session was the most serious that had occurred, because it struck a blow at the most vital element of the American proposals, which is that opium production should be limited to medicinal and scientific needs.

Unable to Agree.
The sub-committee which has been struggling with this question for two months finally decided this afternoon that they had been unable to agree because of reservations made by five opium growing countries. Turkey and Java, particularly, explained that their peasants, whose very existence depends on their crops, can not cease cultivating the opium poppy unless other crops are given them in return and this costs money. Mr. Porter would seem to find difficulty in signing a convention which does not ratify the American principles because of the very nature of his instructions.
