# AGRICULTURE IN BETTER BALANCE THAN IN 3 YEARS

### Report of Federal Reserve Board Indicates That Posi- tion of Farm Industry Is Steadily Improving.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 11 (AP)—With the senate and house agriculture committees one more occupied with the problem of drafting farm relief legislation for enactment by the present congress, the farm industry has improved today that agriculture had slipped to a better balance with other economic activities since 1920. The agricultural industry was in a position, the board's monthly report said, of receding from its present economic position which has been reached by a gradual advance beginning in the late summer of last year.

A similar outlook was presented in the senate committee today by William H. Jardine, a member of the president's agricultural conference, who expressed "reasonable optimism for the future" of the farming industry and declared the farmer was passing through a post war crisis from which his recovery was certain.

### SWEDISH ECONOMIC CONDITION IS GOOD ACCORDING TO REPORT

Stockholm, Feb. 11 (AP)—Healthful stability of Swedish economic conditions in general, contrasted with the depressing effect of the disproportion between industrial wages and market conditions, are the keynotes of the fourth official quarterly report of the Royal board of trade.

The balancing of accounts for the fiscal year 1924-25 shows a budget surplus of \$1,041,000, the principal source of this excess revenue being the import duties and the earnings of various state enterprises, such as the state railways. The total foreign trade is increasing rapidly, with the exports gaining faster than the imports.

## WHEAT PRICES DROP SHARPLY

CHICAGO, Feb. 11 (AP)—In the face of announcement of the largest export purchase of flour ever taken in one day, the grain trade today gave way to bear panic. For at least the time being, all talk of any ultimate scarcity of breadstuffs was forgotten.

With a visible supply of corn about three times as large as a year ago and with stocks of oats also of unusual dimensions, neither corn nor oats today could be lifted in price when wheat showed its pronounced disposition to ascend.

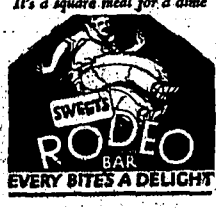

## CLUB OWNERS NOT TO BUILD BALL MEMORIAL

### American League Magnates Decide to Call Off \$100,000 Monument Plan; Place Ban on Exhibition Game in Spring

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Feb. 11 (AP)—Club owners of the American league, meeting with President Ben Johnson for the first time since the joint major league season when they publicly rebuked Johnson for his criticism of Commissioner Landis' administration, voted to withdraw their offer to build a \$100,000 monument to baseball in Washington, D. C., and adopted a resolution prohibiting future spring exhibition games between contestants of previous world series.

The club owners after ratifying the 1925 schedule, also adopted a plan to a definite schedule for world series games and ratified the proposal of the baseball advisory council that the club finishing fourth in the pennant race should be permitted to participate in the world's series pool. The proposal to increase the number of games in the world's series from \$2000 to \$2500, and in city series from \$500 to \$750, was approved.

### Meeting Harmonious

The meeting, with President Johnson sitting in as the directing head, was harmonious in every respect, the club owners evidently trying to forget their action of two months ago in voting their famous letter to Landis rebuking Johnson and removing him as a member of the advisory council.

Action to prohibit exhibition games between world's series contestants was taken after the Giants and Senators, participating in the 1924 series, had arranged an extensive schedule of games during their spring training. The action of the club owners today will not necessitate the cancellation of the Giants-Senators' games but no such games will be permitted in the future.

### Moets Opposition

The offer to build the monument in East Potomac park, Washington, was withdrawn in view of the fact that the proposal had met with opposition each time it came up in congress. It had been supposed to erect the monument at a cost of \$100,000 and on the monument the names of the most valuable players in the league, selected annually, were to be inscribed. President Johnson said no other plan was proposed. The new world's series schedule provides for games 1, 2, 6 and 7 in the American league city, and the 1925 series to be played in the city which wins the National league pennant with games 3, 4 and 5 in the American league city. The following year the series will open in the American league, rotating annually.

vidoes for the judicial department of the state and give \$24,204.22 to the supreme court; \$10,005 to the law library, and \$210,700 to the district court.

Irrigation districts that fall to report assessment fees against lands not irrigated to the state to the commissioner of public utilities will be subject to a fine of \$500 under terms of a new bill which will pass with approval. Another act, passed today, that affects irrigation districts comes from the committee on irrigation and water resources and permits transfer of water rights to other lands that can be watered by the same Carey act irrigation system.

Barrett and Iligwey were successful in getting their measure, allowing farmers to hunt Chinese pheasants on their own lands under a license, passed.

The senate also approved the LaVallo measure creating a game preserve on Boulder mountain.

One new bill found its way into the hopper of the senate. It is from the judiciary committee and provides that upon the transfer of an action for trial to the state supreme court, a new trial need not be again paid.

Final action on house bill No. 125, the proposed three-quarter mill levy for educational institutions improvement, was postponed today when the bill was referred to the appropriations committee by unanimous consent of house members.

### Governor Is Opposed

It has developed Governor C. C. Moore does not favor the levy or has said if the bill passes the three-eighths mill must be deducted from the general ad valorem levy if the sum of the two is greater than the levy of two years ago.

The house will in all probability pass house bill No. 126 providing that couples desiring to marry shall give 20 days' notice to the county recorder who is required to post such notice in the court house. This bill was before the house yesterday for final consideration but some of its friends thought it should be amended to remove certain defects that might, if it were enacted into law, prevent it from being workable. These defects were corrected today by amendments and it was reported back to the house with the recommendation that it do pass as amended. It was introduced by Darrow of Canyon.

## HANSEN HEARS SOCIAL THEME

### Farm Institute Lecturer Delivers Powerful Address on Subject, "Our Neighbors."

HANSEN, Feb. 11 (Special to The News)—A powerful address delivered this evening by E. T. Eboral of the International Harvester company, on the subject "Our Neighbors," was a crowning feature of the second day's sessions of the second annual Harvester corn show and farmers' institute that was opened here Monday evening to continue for four days. Our neighbors, the speaker asserted, are all those with whom we rub elbows, in the community as well as in larger groups. A really self-centered policy, he declared, is an impossibility, and a policy can be successful only if it benefits alike all that it affects.

Tren C. Moore, poultry specialist of the University of Idaho extension division, who is to address sessions Thursday at the morning session to day discussed "A General Poultry Survey" and this afternoon conducted a poultry school.

On the 11th of the day, president of the Twin Falls County Dairymen's association, discussed the results of four months' activities of that organization and in the general discussion that followed his talk, there was no word of criticism of the association, but rather sentiment expressed was wholly favorable to the undertaking.

Lecture Topics

Mr. Eboral at the morning session discussed farm seeds with reference especially to corn, and his subject this afternoon was "Co-operative Marketing."

Speakers at the women's session this afternoon were Miss Zella Wigont of the International Harvester company, who spoke on the pressure kettle for cooking, and Miss Esther V. Kahle of the University of Idaho, who discussed "The Extension Program for 1925," in which provision is made for instruction.

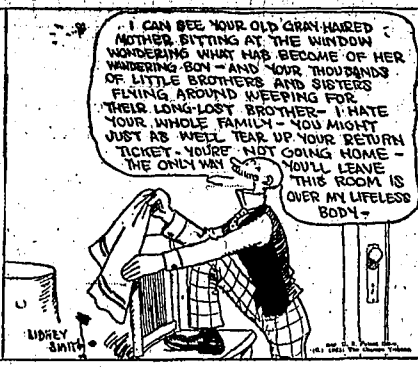
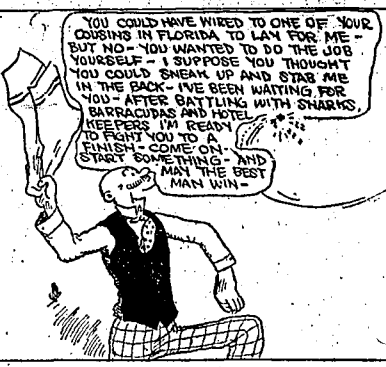
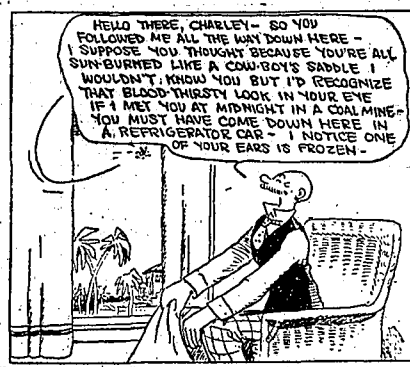

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### REGULATION OF HOUSE-TO-HOUSE SELLING URGED

#### Business Men at Dinner Meeting Declare in Favor of Measure for Protection of Community and Consumer.

A meeting of about 50 Twin Falls business men at a merchants' banquet, served Wednesday evening at Tom's Cafe, following discussion of passage of an ordinance adopted in Portland to regulate activities of house-to-house solicitors and peddlars, resulting in appointment by Charles F. Dwight, secretary of Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce, of a committee of three members to study the situation and present a bill to the municipal commission with request that it be incorporated in Twin Falls ordinance, with view particularly to protection of the community and consumer.

The Portland ordinance, which has been upheld in lower courts and now is being tested in the United States supreme court, provides that specified solicitors and peddlars must obtain municipal license and furnish satisfactory bond in the sum of \$500 for indemnification of losses to their patrons in the event that wares or services are not delivered according to agreement.

The bond is to remain in effect for 30 days after the expiration of license. The ordinance provisions apply only to solicitors who demand advance payment of goods or services to be delivered or services to be performed at a future time.

Blue Card Indorsed. In connection with discussion of this measure the chamber of commerce "blue card" system for regulating activities of solicitors for contributions from business men was made a topic for debate, with the result that meeting voted unanimously for retention of the system.

The meeting, which convened with the chamber of commerce, discussed problems of interest particularly to merchants, heard also statements by J. M. Clegg, secretary of the Idaho Wool Growers' association, summarizing factors that make Twin Falls an ideal location for wool manufacturing industry.

It heard also the appeal of high school students, voiced on this occasion by a representative of the high school annual this year and request that business men subscribe for one or more copies of the publication.

Prices Rise and Fall. On this occasion also Irwin Clay, manager here for the American Export Bread Co., announced a reduction in express transportation ranging from 10 to 35 per cent to be made effective March 1st, and W. Zenas Smith, secretary of the Royal Bakery announced that the price of bread in Twin Falls would be advanced one cent a loaf beginning today in consequence of increasing production costs—a principal factor, in which was an advance of 9¢ per barrel in the price of flour.

In the absence of W. A. Van Engelen, chairman of the chamber of commerce committee on Commerce and Industry, Dwight presided at the meeting, which was given over to informal discussion of the several subjects presented.
