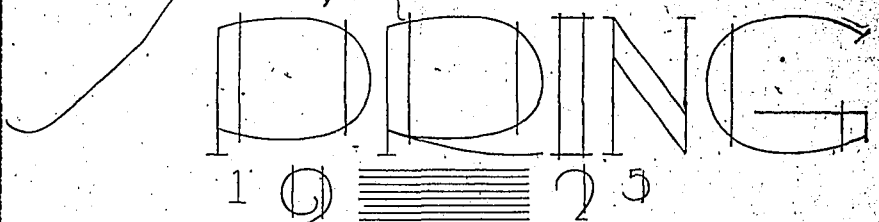

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HEAVY FALL OF SNOW RECORDED

Depth for January at Least Equal to Normal and Water Content Exceptionally High.

Snowfall conditions in elevated regions of Idaho for January were generally far better than those obtaining at the same time last year, says a United States weather bureau climatologist reports last night at the Boise office. The snowfall for the month was far more copious and the moisture content of the snow cover, due to frequent rains, is for the most part unusually heavy. Precipitation for the month was much in excess of normal in the drainage basins of the upper Columbia, the Malheur, the Payette and the Boise rivers. There was, however, a deficiency noted in some of the lower Clearwater, the Wood, the Lost and the Bear rivers. There was a considerable increase in the extent and depth of snow cover, particularly in the high mountain sections during the first part of the month. The rain and milder weather later caused rapid shrinkage, especially in the lower valleys and on the south slopes. The runoff during the period was rather free. Reports indicate that the seasonal snowfall and the extent and depth of snow cover at the close of January are at least equal to normal conditions and that the water content is exceptionally high.

Burley: January snowfall approximately 18 inches; much drifting, especially in the lower basins, but drifts on upward slopes 9 to 15 feet deep; snow very wet; conditions much better than last year.

St. Anthony: Average depth low ranges 37 inches; high ranges 63 inches; depth of snow and moisture content now above normal; for season snow is well packed and has high moisture content, but there has been little drifting.

Mackay: Snow drifted and has good water content; there is 50 per cent more snow than at the same season last year. Depth reports, Withhorse R. S., on Big Lost river, 9 inches; Antelope R. S., on Antelope creek, 14 inches; Hasting ranch, on Little Lost river, 24 inches.

Wood River Drainage: Heavy January snowfall above normal; conditions of snow cover in the high and moisture content generally satisfactory; total seasonal fall to date several inches above normal, and three times as much as that of last year; conditions a little more favorable at Malad and South Fork of Boise rivers than Big Wood river drainage.

O. S. L. Bargains for Water Supply for Roundhouse

Construction Department Engineers in Conference with City Officials, Estimate Early Activity in Building.

Beginning construction here in the rear future of an Oregon Short Line round house and other terminal facilities for the Rogerson-Wells line, now nearing completion, was indicated Wednesday when two Oregon Short Line construction department engineers interviewed municipal officials with regard to obtaining a water supply for these structures.

The engineers, who conferred with R. Keel, finance commissioner; H. E. Finburn, water works superintendent, and J. L. Mee, city clerk, were given assurance that the city would extend a water supply pipe of adequate dimensions to the municipal boundary, and it was stated, the railway company would be required to extend the pipe from that point to its round house site and yards that already have been obtained a short distance west of Rock creek canyon in adequate dimensions. The engineers stated that they would

return Friday to continue negotiations. They stated that a six-inch pipe probably will be required to carry water sufficient for their requirements. Blueprints to which they referred during the interview Wednesday provided for construction of a seven-valved round house.

Further indication that work on terminal facilities here is to begin in the immediate future was seen in the statement made here about a week ago by Asst. Engineer of the Utah Construction company, to the effect that he had been advised to look over the ground here with a view to undertaking some grading for new tracks. The only new track laying under consideration here, H. E. Sullivan, Oregon Short Line agent here stated last evening would be in connection with the Rogerson-Wells line terminal.

Mr. Keel stated Wednesday evening that he had been advised some time ago that work on the round house and other terminal facilities would begin about March 1, next.

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
Wider Range Shown in Temperature Record
