THOUSANDS KILLED AND HURT IN STORM

might number into the hundreds. No reports had been received at a late hour of damage through the rural regions.

Among the other towns and cities to report damage and loss of life were Decato, Ill., with 150 casualties reported; Parkfield, Ill., with all but three of a population of 800 reported either killed or injured; Princeton, Ind., with an estimate of 100 casualties; Griffin, Mo., with 200; Graham, Ill., with 97; Carmel, Ill., with 150; and Crossville, Tenn., and Harts, Ill., reported 500 persons dead and numerous casualties.

The wind apparently smashed its dangerous proportions in eastern Missouri shortly after 1 o'clock this afternoon. It wiped out most of Mississippi, Mo., and then tore its way across the Mississippi river into Illinois, apparently hitting its devastating force and spreading out like a river delta until the various twisters descended some 25 miles east of the Mississippi.

Bodies in Wreckage Darkened—descended over the devastated area shortly after the wind had twisted its way to the west and the streets of the towns demolished were filled with frantic inhabitants that clambering over the piles of wreckage seeking missing friends and relatives. From the recesses of the jumbled timbers came the cries of injured persons, who were pinned between the wreckage while the bodies of the slain could be seen far down in the debris where it was impossible to locate them.

It was around 3 o'clock when the tornado again touched earth with its mighty sweep, swinging through Murphysboro and Decato and laying those places waste in the twinkling of an eye. The wind rashed on east to north for 15 or 20 miles and then apparently lifted itself until it came to Carmel, Ill., near the Indiana line. After taking its toll in that region the storm again rose only to descend once more, 20 miles west of the state line at Princeton, Ind.

Grain Elevator Moved. In some places where the twirling wind struck hardest whole buildings were moved. At Decato, Ill., a grain elevator at Decato having been carried about 40 feet to the middle of a road. Churches and schools seemed to have suffered most outside of dwellings and less substantial farm buildings.

The storm was not so severe in Missouri where it seemed to emerge from

ing so much property and so many lives. Belled trains bearing doctors, nurses, wreckers and goodly supplies of medicine and food were dispatched from Chicago and St. Louis as well as other points within a few hours after the disaster became known. Governor Tom Hannell ordered troops and the medical corps of the Illinois national guard to proceed to the devastated regions at the earliest possible moment. While the storm started shortly after 1 o'clock this afternoon from its Missouri hit and had terrific demoralizing force it did not reach Illinois until around 3 o'clock and it was nearly dusk before it took its last savage blow in Indiana.

Buildings Like Egg Shells. Whirling and swirling with such incredible energy that it crushed large buildings like egg shells and razed reinforced masonry structures. The punishment inflicted on the towns in its path was meteoric like in its fury. Almost in a moment the inhabitants of the towns struck were crushed to death or buried, maimed, under the debris of buildings that crumbled like cardboard boxes.

Fire a Standstill. It took considerable time to send out word from the devastated towns, but in the meantime citizens who escaped the storm, bent to the terrific work before them only to be handicapped in some places by an outbreak of fire in the debris.

Residents from surrounding cities hurried to the stricken areas in automobiles and by train as fast as possible, and although darkness fell shortly

after the storm had passed, organized rescue work was in progress within a few hours.

Facilities Scarce. In almost all the devastated cities and towns facilities were scarce for taking care of the injured, and many were taken to Carbondale, Cairo and other places where all hospitals were in addition to armories and other public buildings.

In some cases residents of the damaged towns who had escaped injury became panicky and attempted to flee the scene of disaster the best they could. At Murphysboro a number of frightened persons, grabbing a few articles, threw themselves aboard a passing train while in other points many ran into the fields far from the towns.

These panic stricken people were comparatively few, however, and many of them returned later to aid in the rescue. The wind made a jumble of all sorts of property in its path. While buildings were moved only a short distance wherever they withstood destruction, light objects were carried over a great space. Rediviva of a town on the edge of the storm path reported collecting papers that had been blown many miles by the wind from one of the stricken cities.

Financial relief funds, in addition to other measures initiated for the aid of the stricken areas were started almost as soon as word of the disaster reached various cities. Newspapers here, in St. Louis and other places started public subscriptions and in various cities adjacent to the storm territory, civic and fraternal organizations made donations.

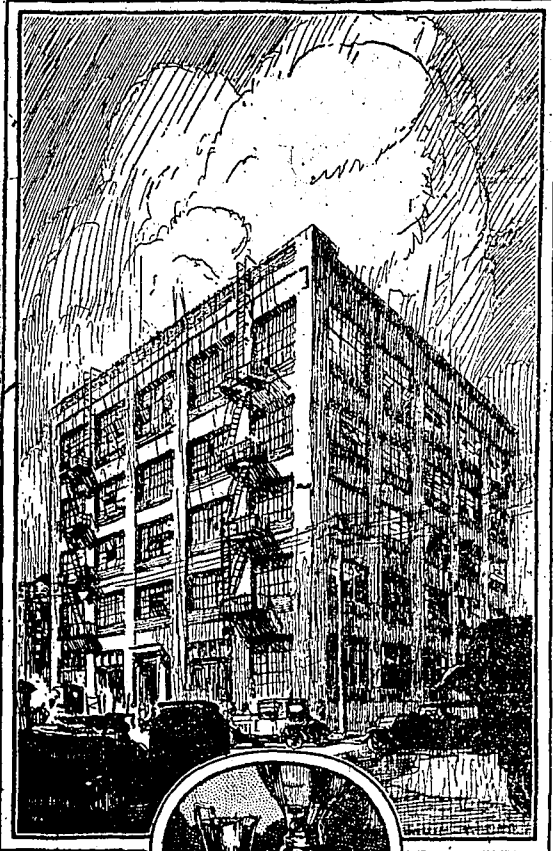

TWIN FALLS LEADING CLOTHIER

JENNINGS SEEK SEPARATE TRIAL

Defense Varies Widely From That of Co-Defendant on Larceny Charge.

In behalf of Raymond and Ennis Jennings, charged jointly with David Harkness with grand larceny in connection with alleged theft of an automobile, O. C. Hall, attorney, filed in district court here Wednesday a notice of motion for separate trial for the Jennings brothers. Hearing on the motion is to take place next Wednesday.

In support of this motion he states that Harkness is alleged to have made statements and admissions concerning the alleged crime that are prejudicial to the Jennings brothers and that the Jennings brothers' defense is so inconsistent with the defense of Harkness that they cannot be tried jointly without injury to defendants Jennings.

Notice of the motion was delivered to Prosecuting Attorney J. W. Taylor.

Mr. Hall's motion followed his request Tuesday to be relieved from duty as counsel for Harkness to which he had been appointed by Judge W. A. Babcock after he had been retained, previously as attorney for the Jennings brothers. E. V. Larson was thereafter appointed as attorney for Harkness. Trial in the case has been set for Monday next.

Defendants in this case are accused of theft of a Ford car, owned by M. F. Goodrich, which they are alleged to have taken to an abandoned dwelling on McKnight street, about a mile southeast of here, and there had dismantled it.

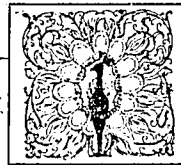
