

GIRL THREATENS HER LAWYER AT SANITY HEARING

17-Year-Old Jazz Maid Orders Counsel Out of Her Sight Before She Chokes Him; Control Breaks.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 8 (AP)—Closing arguments in the sanity hearing of Dorothy Ellington, the 17-year-old jazz maid, were completed this afternoon after a stormy session in which the girl twice interrupted the address of her attorney and once threatened to choke him by "telling what she had to say." Judge Lunderback will charge the jury and submit the case to it tomorrow morning.

The final flourish of the trial brought the defendant herself to the witness stand in the morning. Her prosecution, with which she had sided in the present issue, called her and the court allowed her to testify over the strenuous objections of the defense counsel, who contended it was improper to require a defendant to testify in such a case. Judge Lunderback first scolded himself that the girl wanted to testify and that she understood the nature of an oath.

Calvin Repples. The former "jazz girl" who tried for the murder of her mother, was suspended last week pending the determination of her sanity, gave calm answers to all the questions put to her by Assistant District Attorney, Harmon D. Skidlin. The interrogation was intended to demonstrate the girl's capacity to understand her legal situation and her surroundings.

Even when Skidlin, J. M. Atce, one of her attorneys, put her through a stiff cross examination she retained her composure, responding quietly. She had hoped to be allowed to testify and she came attired in her best frock. It was an "ensemble suit" of a new color known as "blonds," and matched her hair, "benet," which she wore over her reddish locks half hitched.

Different Girl. But in the afternoon she was a different girl. In the context of a pillow-closing argument by Mr. Atce, her grip on herself slipped. She became again the hysterical girl who interrupted with shrieks and fainting spells. But she did not faint today but she assailed her attorney bitterly.

"I can't stand it any longer, listening to those lies," she cried, when she was asked to testify.

Next 20 Years Will Develop Best of All Times for United States, Steel Chairman Declares in Address.

NEW YORK, April 8 (AP)—"I believe the next twenty years will see the greatest conditions and the greatest accomplishment American industry has ever known," said Charles M. Schwab, chairman of the board of the Bethlehem Steel Corporation, in a speech before the annual meeting of the New York Building Congress today.

"It is to this end," the steel master continued, "that God has endowed this country with the abundance of natural resources and a people of the most alert integrity, the bravest spirit and the finest ideals."

GOVERNMENT EXPENSE REDUCTION NECESSARY TO REDUCE U. S. TAXES

Director of Budget Sees No Hope for Cutting Down Levy Without Eliminating Civil Departments.

PHILADELPHIA, April 8 (AP)—Brigadier General H. M. Lord, director of the government budget, told members of the Philadelphia Chamber of Commerce today no further reductions in income taxes would be possible unless greater reduction in government expenditures was effected within the next two years. He said if expenditures continued in the same ratio with revenue as at present, there was no hope of cut.

He estimated that a surplus of \$100,000,000 at the end of this year and of \$300,000,000 at the end of the next year would be necessary to make a tax reduction possible.

PREMIER SHOWS ITALIAN POWER

Mussolini for Second Time Assumes Personal Control of Italy's Affairs With Success.

ROME, April 8 (AP)—Benito Mussolini, the premier, today for the second time within a week showed, in the opinion of political observers, that he more than any European statesman or ruler since Louis XIV of France, could say "I am the state."

But in both cases his assumption of personal control of Italy's affairs, the premier's single handed triumph is said to have marked a setback for fascism. On the heels of the settlement of military problems, Tuesday night by taking over temporarily the portfolio of minister of war, Mussolini later in the evening said this morning advised the knotty stock exchange situation which seemed fraught with danger to the nation's financial life.

PACKER TRUST IS IMPOSSIBLE JARDINE HEARS

Counsel for Armour and Company Defends Purchase of Morris Firm Before Secretary of Agriculture.

WASHINGTON, April 8 (AP)—Monopolistic control of the packing industry is impossible, A. S. Austrian, special counsel for Armour and company, declared today in his closing argument before Secretary Jardine, who is to determine if that company's absorption of the business of Morris and company constitutes a violation of the packers and stock yards act.

On all the livestock markets in the United States, he said, the smaller packers are able to buy livestock at the same prices as the larger packers pay and he argued that unless a concern can control the price of raw material of the industry, it cannot create a monopoly.

Close Arguments Thursday. Secretary Jardine announced that he would close the arguments tomorrow and take the case under advisement. He has prepared arguments on both sides of the controversy throughout the week and plans to give his decision at a later date, either concurring in the two firms of any violation of the act or sending the question to the courts for settlement.

Mr. Austrian declared that it was impossible for Armour or any other packer to control quotations of any market in the United States.

"The violation of a market to any attempted manipulation," he asserted, "would be almost instantaneous, because of the multitude of interests that are watching market trends hour by hour. If the market goes down, or buyers who honorably sell the market immediately execute buying orders sending the market back up, and if the market goes up, all of the lines with the other markets, livestock is at once sent in from other points and the market goes down."

Peace of Europe Is Menaced by Head of Hungarian Republic

First President of Hungary Breaks Long Political Silence With Denunciation of Present Chief.

MONTREAL, Quebec, April 8 (AP)—Count Michael Karolyi, who is first president of the Hungarian republic and whose visit in the United States was marked by efforts to have the state department release him from a pledge not to discuss political affairs, broke his silence today soon after his arrival in Canada.

His comments revolved about present government of Admiral Horthy in Hungary. He reconstituted and equated to democracy in this regime, he said, that not only is the safety of Hungary menaced but also the peace of Europe.

He did criticize S. Stanwood Mahoney, former president of the National Security League, who made an effort to have Countess Karolyi excluded from the United States when she arrived there for a lecture tour. It was "unjust to attack a lone woman," Count Karolyi said.

He thought she would endanger the welfare of the United States "as a woman, not yet 30," he said.

Soviet Should be Recognized. Count Karolyi said he thought it would be for the best if soviet Russia were recognized by all the nations.

The count related with evident amusement that he had been approached by the conductor of the train bringing him to Montreal, who requested that he give his word of honor not to say anything derogatory to the United States while on Canadian soil. Whether he will do so is not known.

SHIPPING BOARD FLEET SALES TO BE PUSHED, PLAN

Chairman Announces Desire to Get Rid of Ships to Americans at Earliest Possible Time; Merchant Marine Need

NEW YORK, April 8 (AP)—Sales of the United States shipping board fleet to private owners who are American citizens and competent to meet the competition of foreign shipping will go forward as rapidly as possible, T. V. O'Connor, chairman of the board, said in an address tonight.

Mr. O'Connor was one of the four majority members of the shipping board to vote in favor of the sale of the five "president" class liners now operated by the Pacific Mail Steamship company on the California-Orient line, to the Dollar Steamship company. This sale is held up by legislative proceedings of the Pacific Mail which bid against the Dollar interests for the liners.

Must Make Money. "If the American merchant marine is to be kept on the ocean for all time under private ownership, the only guarantee of such permanency is the ability of the owners to make money," Mr. O'Connor said.

NAVY OFFICIALS DISCUSS NEEDS

Three Admirals Tell of Changes in 30 Years and Talk of Aircraft Situation of Today.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 8 (AP)—The aviation controversy, the need for a naval base in San Francisco, and changes that have taken place in the navy in the past 30 years were discussed by three admirals of the United States fleet at a luncheon given today to senior officers by the chamber of commerce and the commercial club.

A toast was drunk to the president of the United States.

The called points of the aviation problem were outlined by Rear Admiral W. V. Pratt, commander of battleship division four of the battle fleet. He said that the situation of the United States differs from that of European countries, where "Germany" abuts France and to the south is Italy, with the boundaries marked by demarcation. But our friends on the Atlantic are removed from us by 3000 miles of water, and our dearest friends in the Pacific are 6000 miles from us. No problem of the air can mean to us what it means to the continental countries.

Regarding the alleged obsolescence of the battleship he said that the moment the report of the special naval board reached the president, the entire problem of the navy, including every weapon of the future will carry on her decks many of the airplanes that you have seen resting on the quarterdecks of the ships of the navy, coming in every variety of offense known to the ingenuity of man.

NEW YORK FIRM TO SELL STOCK IN CAR COMPANY

Largest Single Piece of Industrial Financing in American Banking History Proposed in Offering of Dodge Securities.

NEW YORK, April 8 (AP)—The largest single block of industrial financing in American banking history—the sale of \$100,000,000 worth of securities for Dodge Brothers, Inc., the third largest common stocker of automobiles in the world—will be launched tomorrow.

Dillon, Read and company, bankers, who recently purchased the concern from the heirs of its founder, announced that the \$100,000,000 program would be inaugurated with the public offering of \$85,000,000 preferred and class A common stock. The balance of the \$15,000,000 debt work by the sale of \$7,000,000 debenture bonds.

Edge Check Given. Within a few days, as soon as title to the property has been transferred, a single check for approximately \$145,000,000 representing the net purchase price, will be drawn by the bankers to the account of the trustees of the Dodge estate. This, it is believed, will be the largest check which has ever passed in a commercial transaction.

On the basis of the net purchase price, which was revealed for the first time tonight by Parsons Dillon, head of the banking firm of Dillon, Read and company, will clear an estimated profit of more than \$10,000,000 on the transaction and still retain control of Dodge Brothers through ownership of 500,000 shares of class B common stock (which each voting power is vested. The indicated profit of \$14,000,000, representing the difference between the \$100,000,000 price and the aggregate amount of securities to be sold will be reduced, several million dollars by the cost of floating the huge stock and bond issue.

Interest Is Large. Public interest in the project, Mr. Dillon said, has been unprecedented for this type of transaction. Invisible Rays of Light to Open New Field in Warfare

Scientist Announces Discovery of Method of Secret Signaling and of Detecting Chemical Frauds and Forgeries.

BALTIMORE, Md., April 8 (AP)—Invisible light rays are opening a new field for the transmission of secret signals in warfare and for the detection of chemical frauds and forgeries, which are illuminated by ultraviolet rays, said tonight at Johns Hopkins university, said tonight at a meeting of the American Chemical Society.

Infrared rays, the long light waves which ordinarily produce no color sensation on the eye, can be employed, he explained, for flashing signals which are invisible to the human eye. Field glasses equipped with a special screen amplifier can be transmitted in this manner in full sunlight from five to eight miles.

Causes Marked Change. "It has been found that these rays cause a marked change in the appearance of objects. An airplane, for instance, could be painted with an invisible color which, however, would not mislead friendly troops equipped with special binoculars with which the true signals would be visible. A nameplate could be illuminated by the anti-aircraft batteries on its own side.

This property of certain pigments and dyes to alter their relative luminosity when illuminated by ultraviolet rays is now being used to produce stage effects. A certain case is painted so as to represent a summer scene which, under ultraviolet light, reveals scenes under near infrared rays."

Demotestors' Light. He then demonstrated how ultraviolet light, by passing through the other end of the spectrum, illuminated a phosphorescent screen at the other end of the room, although the rays were not visible to the eye.

FRENCH CABINET DECIDES NOT TO QUIT FOR WHILE

Financial Crisis Leads Government Heads to Consider Resigning; Change Minds Following Long Conference.

PARIS, April 9 (AP)—Bully shaken by an onslaught of the opposition in the senate on a minor issue yesterday, the Herriot ministry virtually decided to resign, but yielding to the remonstrances of the leaders of the group making up the majority and after a long discussion at a cabinet meeting which lasted until an early hour this morning the government came to the conclusion that the circumstances of the vote in the senate did not call for the government's resignation. In this vote the government received only a majority of five. In addition to deciding not to give up office the ministers came to the conclusion that it was their duty to defend the government's financial bill before parliament to the very end.

Announcement Made.
As the adjustment of the cabinet cabinet a communique was issued by M. Chateaux, minister of the interior. It made no reference to the subject of the resignation of the ministry, but dealt with parliamentary matters which had come up for discussion. It stated that M. de Monzie, the finance minister, had made known to his colleagues the conditions in which the examination of the financial bill was being pursued before the chamber. The cabinet deliberated on this bill and on the necessity of bringing it into line with the declarations made by the government of the rights of war cripples and inhabitants who suffered property damage during the war.

The remainder of the communique dealt with the Franco-German commercial negotiations, the early completion of which, it said, might be expected and the situation of the wheat market.

The financial bill will come up before the chamber Friday evening.

INVISIBLE RAYS OF LIGHT DISCOVERED

them were invisible. He told how he had utilized this principle to devise an invisible light for night use on warships and convoys so that they would not be seen by enemy submarines, although observers on other vessels of the friendly fleet could observe the lights by use of phosphorescent telescopes.

"The same principles are now used," he said, "in detecting forgeries and other alterations of documents. The chemicals used in such frauds can be detected when they are illuminated by ultra-violet or infra-red rays."

Measurement of Mass.
Professor Wood also explained that the invisible light waves of the spectrum had been applied in astronomical experiments which had made possible the first measurements of the atmosphere of the planet Mars. The infra-red rays had also made possible much clearer pictures of the surface markings of the planet, he said.

Professor Wood declared that the use of invisible light opened up a new field for medical research and that it might prove of value in detecting the presence of cancerous and other abnormal tissues in cases where such conditions were not evident under ordinary light.

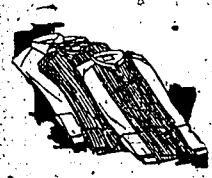

SCOUT DISTRICT AREA INCREASED

Gooding Becomes Fifth County Under Jurisdiction of Snake River Council.

Gooding county was added to the area served actively by the Snake River district council, Boy Scouts of America, at a meeting of the executive board held at Jerome, Wednesday evening. The city of Gooding was accepted as a contributing member. This addition increases the counties in the jurisdiction to five—Gooding, Cassia, Jerome, Minidoka and Twin Falls.

The plan of the national scout organization was stated, in that the Snake River council shall eventually supervise the work in all of south central Idaho. This plan is being carried out by the local organization principally as the work can be properly organized and supervised. In less than two years, the organization has grown from work with 327 boys in four communities to more than 820 boys in 20 communities. Eighty-five scoutmasters, assistants and commissioners give one or more evenings a week in the direction of the 20 troops of scouts, while more than 800 other men give from one to several hours service weekly as examiners, committee men, and other officers. These 400 men are at the center of the work, the scout worker being the executive, who devotes his entire time to the supervision, education and discipline of these 1500 men and boys.

Summer Camp Plans
Tentative plans were made at the meeting for a summer camp at Camp Shoshone, 40 miles south of Twin Falls, Idaho, for the summer of 1925. The announcement of date, cost per boy, etc., was left to a later announcement by the camping director, Thomas M. Robertson of Twin Falls.

Executive F. Douglas Hawley reported that during the month of March that 26 meetings of various departments were held, attended by 1200 people. In all camps, 22 scouts departed during the month by 22 scouts; the motive made 26 troop visits, and traveled 705 miles. He stated that more than 150 advancement awards were conferred on the eight camps of the month in March, and that one more scout had reached eagle rank, bringing the total eagles to 15 in the council.

Louis Philippe and Wife.

Louis Philippe (1874-1890) was the eldest son of Duke Louis of Orleans. He supported the French revolution, but was suspected of aiming at the crown and was compelled to leave France in 1793. He did not return until after the fall of Napoleon in 1816, having spent the intervening time in Austria, America and Great Britain. After the revolution of 1830 and the abdication of Charles X, he was elected "king of the French by the grace of God and the will of the people." He held this office until 1848, when another revolution occurred, and he fled to England, where he and his wife—arriving as "Mr. and Mrs. Smith"—settled in Claremont, placed at their disposal by Queen Victoria.

His relative F. Douglas Hawley reported that during the month of March that 26 meetings of various departments were held, attended by 1200 people. 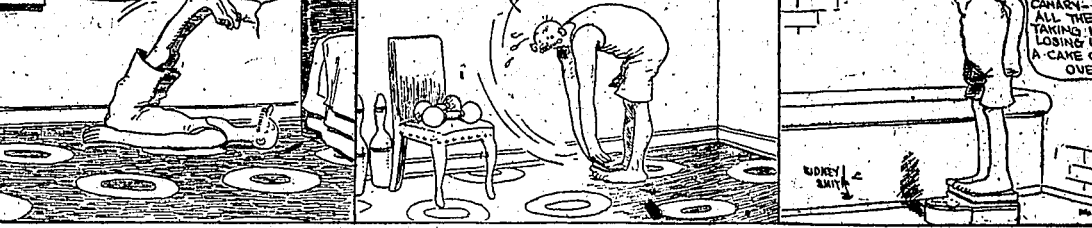

SALVATION ARMY WORK DETAILED IN REPORT

A report just received by Captain A. Watten, in charge of the local corps of the Salvation Army, describes the growth of the organization throughout the world during 1924 and lays particular emphasis upon the rapid spread of its missionary work in many distant fields.

The report has been prepared at the national headquarters, in New York, for distribution among all officers in connection with the diamond jubilee observance of the Army, which occurs this year. Founded in 1865, as a small mission in the East End of London, the organization is now 60 years of age. In spite of this short span of existence, the Army has now files in 80 countries and colonies, and its religious and social service activities are conducted in 65 languages and dialects.

The missionary work, maintained almost entirely by an annual week of self-denial on the part of Salvationists throughout the world, which occurs this year in the western territory of the United States from April 5 to 12, represents one of the greatest advances of the year. This work is now flourishing in 4,174 centers, in ten widely separated fields of activity, under the supervision of 2,750 commissioned officers who have dedicated their lives to consecrated work far from their own homes. In addition to the evangelizing the Army program includes industrial schools for native boys and girls, homes for the aged and infirm, hospitals, shelters, food depots, prison services, emergency relief stations, rescue work among native girls, agricultural schools and a score of other social services and educational activities.

If he decides to keep the other machine he shall use our money to pay for it and return our machine to us.

At the same time the buyer shall make affidavit that he has not received from any one any consideration, monetary or otherwise, in selecting the machine he has decided to keep and has been guided solely by his own honest judgment as to which machine is best and will best answer his separator requirements in the long run.

This proposition is not confined to any one buyer, but is open to all reputable buyers in our territory.
