

ITALY TO TAKE BUSINESS WITH U. S. ON DEBTS

American Commission and Italian Representatives Meet Today for Parley on Ways and Means of Funding Obligations

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, June 24.—The Italian government will begin talking business with the American commission here tomorrow, the seventh power to send representatives to the meeting to take up serious discussion of a settlement.

Italy owes the United States, roughly \$2,138,000,000. It has informed the government that it desires to arrange a commitment by which it can amortize the amount over a period of years.

The first meeting is expected to be given over to a general discussion of the terms to be agreed upon. It is said that he anticipates nothing tangible from it, but he has expressed hope that it will lead to general approval both here and in Italy.

All of the available data which the treaty suggests that Italy has made as being assembled, it was said, and Signor Alberti, through long banking experience, has brought fresh knowledge of conditions in his homeland to supplement the figures.

Washington Worried Over Latest Report on Chinese Trouble

Official Advice Received at Capitol Increase Concern Felt Over Situation; Government Stand May Encourage Riots

WASHINGTON, June 24.—Official advice from China today increased the concern with which officials are watching developments there.

While official word was lacking today as to the immediate situation in Canton, there is no doubt that officials here have cause for anxiety and see little prospect for early subsidence of the anti-foreign wave sweeping parts of China.

In the absence of definite word from China over the killing of the Chinese note to the diplomatic body, comment was withheld on the reiterated hope of the Chinese government that government that extra territorial treaties be revised.

Alarming Aspect of the Peking diplomatic correspondence, as seen here, was the probability that the provisional government's stand might encourage the disorderly and riotous elements engaged in the anti-foreign demonstrations.

The situation was already so tense that apparently it would take little impetus to bring about conditions that could be dealt with only by force, which all of the powers are striving to avoid.

The assumption of the Peking government that the situation was so serious as to proceed immediately with a joint conference covering the wider aspects of the situation rather than the immediate incidents at Shanghai is not in accordance with fact. The Chinese government is not likely to consider requesting authority from their governments for such a conference, provided it is an immediate settlement of the Shanghai case on its own merits.

Apparently the provisional government is being repelled by reiterating precisely the same demands that abruptly terminated the recent conference.

The only other engagement the president had before leaving tonight was the selection of a party of photographers and newspaper men. The reporters got little news but the cameramen had a good time.

In jovial spirit, the president and his wife spent half an hour posing for pictures.

FRENCH DISCUSS ANNUAL BUDGET

Minister of Finance Caillaux Gains Ground in Attempt to Have Matter Settled by July.

PARIS, June 24.—M. Caillaux, in his expressed determination to have France's 1925 budget voted before July 1, made a great step forward today when he secured the approval of the budget in the chamber of deputies and literally stamped that usually disorderly assembly.

He succeeded in disposing of the general discussion in less than two hours, which the opponents are noted objects of the ministries of finance and justice.

After jamming through the chamber 140 articles of the ministry of finance budget and 112 of the ministry of justice, the budget was passed by a vote of 350 to 200.

The finance minister secured an unprecedented success in the French parliament when he succeeded in restraining seven deputies from delivering pre-arranged speeches. The budget as it stands shows an excess of expenditures over receipts of 1,053,000,000 francs.

GREAT BRITAIN READY TO JOIN IN ARMS CONFAB

Secretary of Foreign Affairs Announces Nation's Willingness for Further Limitation on Land and Sea.

(By The Associated Press) LONDON, June 24.—Austin Chamberlain, secretary for foreign affairs, in the course of the debate in the house of commons tonight on the security pact, declared Great Britain would join with the other great powers for the further limitation of naval armaments or for the reduction of land armaments.

"If we are thinking of land matters," he continued, "security is a necessary preliminary and we are for that matter the United States—who have already reduced our land forces to a scale no larger than their own for the interests which we have to guard, are not, therefore perhaps in the best position to summon a land conference."

Mr. Chamberlain thought if the powers with larger armies were desirous of their security they would not be unlikely to propose to take the initiative in amending an international conference or inviting the league of nations to do so, or coming before the conference or league with spontaneous proposals for the reduction of armaments which they had hitherto thought necessary for their safety.

Mr. Chamberlain made an earnest plea for support of the proposed security pact the greater it would be and would therefore be a greater step toward peace and disarmament. He drew a graphic picture of the critical situation as it exists today saying:

"Europe today, still stands ranged in two camps hostile in spirit, mutually suspicious and apprehensive, with suspicions deepened by the progress of time and with the dangers of a new struggle breaking out in the future not growing less as time goes on but becoming greater."

"I repeat it because it is the fundamental fact of the situation. Fear dominates the whole position of the world and the attitude of every country. Everywhere among the conquerors, no less than the conquered, there is the psychology of the vanquished."

The British government is trying to find a way out of this impasse. Mr. Chamberlain declared the time was ripe for an anti-foreign pact guaranteeing, among the allies against Germany could be contemplated, as in the past years.

The minister declared that no nation could isolate itself today, remarking: "Anything which affects the peace of Europe must affect the nation, whether a belligerent or not."

Heat Causes Traffic Tie-Up When Rails Over Bridge Expand

Streams of Water Played Upon Steel to Get Metal Back in Shape to Close Draw

(By The Associated Press) PORTLAND, Ore., June 24.—Owing to the heat the rails of one of the bridges across the Willamette river have expanded so much when the draw was opened today for a ship to pass that it was impossible to bring the draw back into place. Streams of water were turned on the rails to cool the metal. Meanwhile traffic was routed over other bridges.

Marshall and Salem reported all heat records broken with a maximum temperature of 99. Eugene reported ninety eight this afternoon. McFord reported 104 degrees.

FOUR IDAHO MEN TRAPPED IN MINE

Miners in Ajax Property at Burke Thought Drowned by Water From Old Shaft.

WALLACE, Idaho, June 24.—Four men are believed to have been drowned in the Ajax mine at Burke, Idaho, at 10 o'clock this morning when miners broke through the wall of an old shaft and thousands of gallons of water poured through it. A 70-foot wall of rock and mine debris, besides the water, checked efforts of rescue men to reach the trapped men.

The men believed dead are: Iver Anderson, 23; Ed Breckman, 28; Les Crumpler, 37; and Fred Sandstrom, 25. Mine officials said they hope for the safety of Breckman and Crumpler, but have abandoned hope of Anderson and Sandstrom being alive.

Rescue crews were organized immediately, but up to 2 o'clock this afternoon had failed to break through the debris. The entombed men are approximately 5,000 feet from the tunnel portal.

TWO PICTURES OF SHEPHERD PAINTED JURY

Defense Presents Her Suspected of Murder as Magnanimous Churchman, Prosecution as Plotter Against Son.

(By The Associated Press) CHICAGO, June 24.—Two word pictures of William Darling Shepherd were painted during arguments before the jury in his murder trial here today.

That of a magnanimous churchman, a man persecuted by powerful interests bent upon breaking a \$100,000 will, and the representation of Shepherd as the plotter who had used typical means to play his rich foster son, Billy McClinton, into the paralytic picture.

The first was the work of William Scott Stewart, defense counsel, and followed the other in either assistant State's Attorney George A. Gorman's denials at the trial.

Shepherd's Innocent: "Our form in this case is that Shepherd is innocent," Stewart shouted at the jury. "If you gentlemen think Shepherd had dealings with Falman, hang him. You are either dealing with a man who killed and should be hanged, or with a man who is the victim of the worst plot ever heard of."

"Let the verdict in this case say law is the law of all in death," pleaded Mr. Gorman as he concluded today his argument begun yesterday. Prospects at adjournment tonight were that the case will go to the jury some time Friday. At the opening of tomorrow's session, Mr. Stewart will complete his address. Closing arguments will be made by State's Attorney Robert E. Crow and Attorney W. W. O'Brien of the defense.

HAIG NAMED COMMANDER OTTAWA, Ont., June 24.—The destiny of the great war veterans association with its assets of \$2,000,000 was today placed in the hands of Field Marshal Earl Haig, former commander in chief of the British army in France, through a resolution adopted unanimously at the seventh annual convention of the association. Earl Haig is expected to determine the future policy of the organization.

SENATOR HARRISON IS NOT IN ACCORD WITH GOVERNMENT ON SUGAR

CHICAGO, June 24.—Denunciation of the national administration action on the sugar tariff was voiced here today by Senator Tat Harrison of Illinois. "I deplore," he said, "the action of the sugar tariff which is a violation of the law before President Coolidge took action on the recommendation of the senate committee that the import rate on the commodity be reduced."

Pointing out that the president had the tariff commission's recommendation for a reduction on his desk for long time, the Mississippi senator added:

"Not only does he ignore the committee's recommendation but he transfers to Europe the chairman of the commission who had the audacity to join in the recommendation."

HINES ADDRESSES VETERANS OF WAR

Head of United States Veterans Bureau Discusses Problem at National Meeting of Wounded

OMAHA, Neb., June 24.—Discussion and consideration of the problem of legislation, hospitalization and rehabilitation of America's 60,000 wounded veterans, was the subject of a speech by General Hines at a national meeting of the Disabled American Veterans of the World War, in national convention here today.

The veterans heard of the progress of the United States veterans bureau during the past year, from General Frank T. Hines, chief director who said that while there was much to be done for the American's disabled, the bureau had been enabled by legislation, better organization and cooperation, to extend a more efficient service to the disabled.

General Hines' address was followed by the annual address of Thomas H. Jones, president of the national legislative committee, who altered the first note of dissatisfaction when he declared that the veterans' bill was a "real bill of hope for the disabled veterans that are virtual fire traps."

MOUNTAIN OF ROCK TOPPLES

Many Buildings Lost and Several Herds of Cattle Swept Away by Giant Slide; Huge Lake Is Forming.

(By The Associated Press) CHEYENNE, Wyo., June 24.—A mountain of rocks, moving at an incredible speed, toppled early this morning from the Gros Ventre river, in the heart of the Teton mountains in western Wyoming yesterday, according to reports received here tonight. A section of the Teton national forest was smashed to splinters and the buildings were swept away and many buildings lost, the advices said.

The river has been dammed by the great heap of earth and rock and a great lake is forming, according to the message. In a short time, according to the dispatches, it will create a lake seven miles long and a mile wide and probably hundreds of feet deep because of the sharp declivities on either side of the stream at that point. Shortly after the strange occurrence, according to the message, which was from J. H. Jones, local manager of the Gros Ventre national forest, Wyo., the river was 200 feet deep at the point just above the disintegrated mountain.

Race to Jackson Jones, according to the dispatch, was informed of the phenomenon by riders in its vicinity who raced to Jackson with the news.

One horseman who narrowly escaped being hurled off his horse when the mountain collapsed, declared that the huge natural jam resulting therefrom caused the rift, which for some time fell to the 100-foot depth in a period of five minutes, according to the report. He escaped by springing astride his horse and jumping to the opposite side in safety. At that time the great mass, which was the cause of the disaster, was 200 feet high.

Radio Complication With Navy Threatens Arctic Expedition

Officials Insist That MacMillan Carry Long Wave Length Apparatus; Ultimatum Brings Acquiescence to Demands.

WASHINGTON, June 24.—Complications over the radio equipment of the MacMillan Arctic expedition, which is to be started to terminate the long winter of the Arctic region, were adjusted today by the Navy. N. S. and tonight the party was said to be preparing to proceed late this week toward its main base, Etah, Greenland.

The adjustment was not reached, however, until Secretary Willbur had served an ultimatum on Donald MacMillan, leader of the expedition, through Lt. Commander H. S. Gildersleepe of the navy section, that standard long wave navy radio equipment which had been requested by the States must be taken along or the navy section would return to Washington.

Announcement of an amicable solution of the difficulty was made here by the national geographic society, one of the sponsors of the expedition. The society's announcement said the navy radio equipment had been left behind by the expedition. Commander Willbur said the department was first informed it had been left behind because the equipment was not ready for use.

The expedition had agreed Mr. Willbur asserted to carry the navy long wave apparatus.

President of Company Mr. Willbur asserted J. F. McDonald, second vice president of the expedition, and president of the Zenith Radio Corporation, had objected to the naval apparatus being carried by the expedition. He discovered the expedition had sailed without the equipment, Commander Willbur said.

The destroyer Putnam was sent to Wisconsin for it and then started for St. Lawrence, N. S. and tonight the party was said to be preparing to proceed late this week toward its main base, Etah, Greenland.

The equipment was regarded by the navy as essential, not only to the safety but to supplement the short wave apparatus on both ships.

The national geographic society made public tonight secretary's message from the expedition's ship the Bowdoin and the Putnam, picked up by another ship during the expedition's departure. The messages reported all well and said of life aboard ship. Two way communication was established in the case with the Bowdoin.

### FLYING FEATURE OF CELEBRATION

American Falls Committee Arranging for Aerial Maneuvers at Jubilee at Dam Site.

POCAHELLO, June 24.—With the assistance of Senator Frank R. Gooding and Congressman Addison T. Smith, the committee in charge of the American Falls Dam celebration, headed by Judge O. B. Hume of this city, is undertaking to assemble an unusual number of army and navy airplanes to give demonstrations as part of the jubilee on July 13. Although the date conflicts with those of the regular flying season, the committee is confident that the aviation authorities will consent to a spin from Cheyenne to American Falls as part of this year's maneuvers, which usually involve flights of considerable distance from the base.

The army flying with possible aviation material will include his unique combination of all and water for this occasion.

Again Lewis and Clark

The American Falls celebration, as planned, will present a history-reviving spectacle. Old Fort Walla Walla reproduced and in the village and other intrepid pathfinders with their respective reliefs, the whole trimmed with emigrants' parties, the pony express, cowboys and Indians. Flashes depicting modern activities will also be included. Half a dozen bands will furnish music for the pageant and during the day.

The committee is informed, it states, that several Idaho officers are preparing to participate in the parade in more or less distinctive fashion. One of the "Dan's" is preparing to further advertise the celebration. "The Dan Eagle" will make a flight the entire length of the Snake river valley. Added to "Wagon" leading the towns with emigrants. "Meet the Pilots at American Falls July 13," Richard Steely, reserve officer, will pilot the ship, which will carry as passenger Guy Flenner of Boise, managing director of the Idaho Reclamation association, which is cooperating in the American Falls jubilee.

The eagle will make the round trip from Pocatello to Ashton on July 13 as at present scheduled. On the third of the bombardiers will hop off from this city to Boise, making a stop at Twin Falls, where, during the celebration, they call for a flight from Boise to Weiser; then toampa, Id., a stop at the Springs at July celebration, and back to Boise on the 21st. Pilot's pay is \$100.00. The committee pays fees for gas.

Emigrants in the "retainers" are arranged for the celebration on July 13 are an elaborate daylight fireworks display, one of the largest ever shot in the northwest. It is stated, an unusually large carnival with numerous shows, a "Slide 'Em Round" Road special airplane stunts, baseball and other sports.

The formal ceremony of laying the cornerstone of the great dam will be held in the forenoon, preceding the opening of the jubilee. Secretary of the Interior Work will officiate. A musical group will be fitted from the city of Snake river by day of the high crews' how in operation on the dam. Later it will be greeted by a "Hochee" table fully decorated.

Secretary Work will speak later from the same platform with an Indian chief who, in full tribal regalia, will talk briefly in his native tongue.

They will then leave for the ice fields to establish a base for the expedition into the Arctic.

Commander MacMillan received a message here forwarded from New York expressing the thanks of Reid Amundsen and Lincoln Ellsworth for his plans to go to their bases when their north pole exploration party was thought to be lost. Amundsen and Ellsworth conveyed their deepest gratitude and appreciation, and wished him a "glorious journey."

### CANTON DEMANDS ATTACKS CEASE

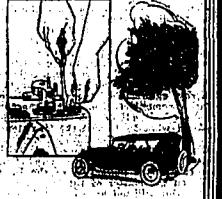
Government in China Orders Outrages Against Foreign Settlement Stopped.

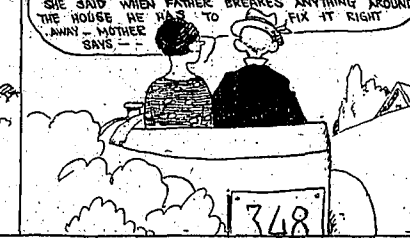

# IBAHU AGREES UPON PUBLIC LANDS POLICY

### Hearings Conducted by Wool Growers and Associated Organizations Indicate United Opposition to State Control.

Citizens of Idaho at a series of 11 hearings conducted by the Idaho Wool Growers' association and state horse and cattle associations co-operating have expressed themselves without exception in favor of placing the public lands under some form of government other than state control, according to Donald McLean, secretary of the woolgrowers' association who testified here Wednesday after attending hearings held this week at Boise and Mountain Home. The series of hearings is to be held next Friday at Oakley.

To Wally Sentiments. A series of the hearings, which have been held throughout the state, Mr. McLean stated, is to determine and unify sentiment with regard to the public lands in order that there may be no division of opinion on the part of Idaho citizens at public hearings to be held next August in Boise and Pocatello by the president's livestock commission that is headed by Senator Carey of Wyoming and assisted by the secretary of Agriculture Justice in this position.

The position taken by citizens at the hearings, Mr. McLean stated, is in opposition to further expansion of state control of public lands, approximately 25 per cent of the public lands being already under state control.

Idaho's Views. The resolutions adopted at the 11 hearings already held were given today by Mr. McLean, as follows: That it is the consensus of opinion of the public domain put under some form of government rather than state control;

Provided, 1. That the forest and public domain be administered by the same bureau or department of the government. 2. That the public domain be under a lease system operated by associations rather than the present allotment system. 3. That the grazing rights on both forest and public domain shall be sold to the highest bidder. 4. That a board of appeals be created by congress, members of which shall be appointed by the governor upon recommendations of the livestock and farm organizations and associations along the public domain and that this board shall be made up of one man actively engaged in the livestock business for each of the 11 western states and public land states who shall be paid a per diem and expenses. 5. That the administrative offices of this bureau which shall have control of the forest and public domain be established in the western states.

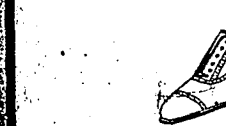
