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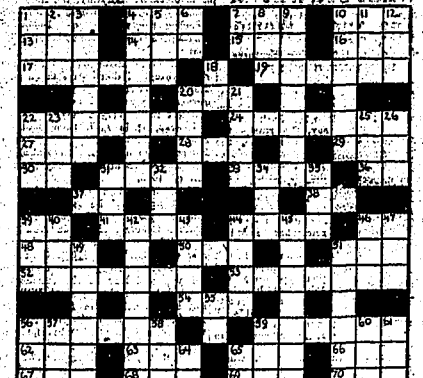

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# BUILDING UNDER WAY INVOLVES \$60,925 COST

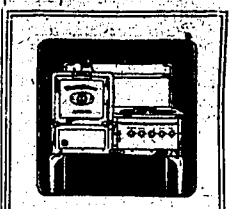


