

FARMERS BETTER OFF FINANCIALLY THINKS JARDINE

Agriculture Is Safely Convalescent, Declares Secretary After Eight Weeks' Tour of Western States.

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, July 22 (AP)—Agriculture is convalescent, Secretary Jardine declared today in a review of the situation as seen from his eighth week's western tour.

Cattle and Hogs — "Cattle and hogs men are better off than they have been since 1920, and I did not see any sheep men down at the moment. If the situation are careful in marketing their crops they will get good prices and they are learning to find the market."

Constant Damp Spots — "There are certain damp spots, however, in the general agricultural picture. It is true. The southwest is suffering under incursions and serious drought. The east does not show marked improvement. This region was hit last year by low prices for potatoes, and the dairy industry has had economic difficulties."

EVOLUTION TEST SUITS FILED IN WASHINGTON

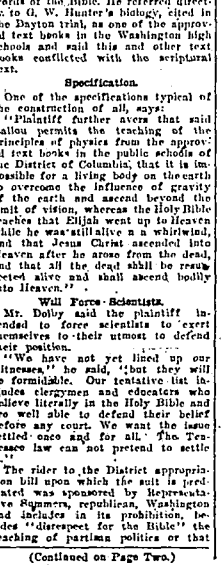
Question May Throw Teaching of Scientific Theory Into Federal Courts Through Action of Capital Taxpayer.

Commoner Discusses What He Asserts Was Charge of Ignorance Brought Against Him by Attorney for Scopes.

(By The Associated Press) DAYTON, Tenn., July 22 (AP)—Clarence Darrow, who has been accused of ignorance brought against him by Clarence Scopes, today testified in expanded form in his testimony, William J. "My life has been spent in the study of and discussion of the economic and governmental problems and, I am willing to abide in the judgment of those whose paramount interest in these problems, and they include more than ninety five percent of the population compared to the small percent who specialize in various lines of science, however important their work may be."

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# STRESEMANN'S EXPLAINED

BERLIN, July 22.—Gustav Stresemann, the foreign minister, speaking today in his capacity as German plenipotentiary at the security conference, said there still were some important points outstanding in the agreement between Germany and Belgium in connection with the armistice. He also stated that the second round of negotiations would be held simultaneously by the plenipotentiaries of the two nations. He also stated that the plenipotentiaries of the two nations would meet in Brussels on August 2nd to discuss the French plenipotentiary's declaration that the armistice would be extended within the time set by the treaty.

The aviators are under the command of Colonel Charles Sweeney of Toledo, Ohio.



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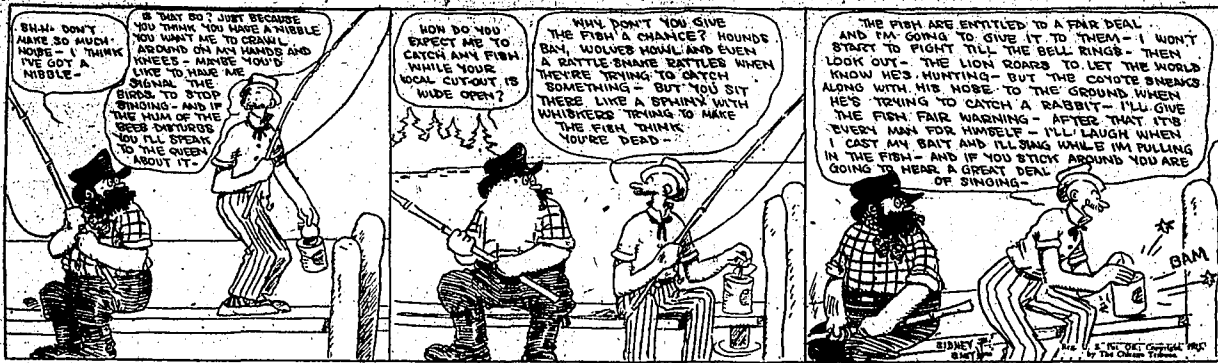
