PORK BARREL METHODS OLD, LETTERS DISCLOSE

SPRINGFIELD, Mo., July 29 (AP)—The operation here of the pork barrel was shown in the efforts of the Illinois state secretary to secure the resignation of Albert Gallatin, secretary of the Illinois state treasury. Letters by the state secretary to the department and the state secretary department are being held. The resignation was written by Pope to Gallatin, July 11, 1925, transmitting his resignation. Pope replied that he thought \$2 was the minimum he should be allowed for office rent. He said he believed the secretary should have two rooms, "one to lodge in and the other for the public papers of his office." The compromise was finally made at a month and Pope, perhaps a little incensed at the conservative policy of Gallatin, immediately began another controversy with him as to whether the secretary had to supply food for the Illinois territory with satisfactory.

RUSSIA PLANS OIL PORT

MOSCOW, July 29 (AP)—Russia has decided to build at Toussou on the Black Sea, a special oil port in order to facilitate the handling of big ocean tankers with oil for export. The bulk of Russian oil export is now concentrated at Toussou. The long discussed project of building an oil tunnel from Grouzy to Toussou has been approved by the State Planning Council and is expected work will begin this year, and the tunnel will be complete by 1928.

SUBMERGED VILLAGE OF 300 YEARS REAPPEARS

CHAMBER-GRIIND, Switzerland, July 29 (AP)—Reappearance of a village in-undated more than 300 years ago was noted recently at Lake Anzoua. The village of Anzoua was submerged by a monster spring flood and has been submerged for three centuries.

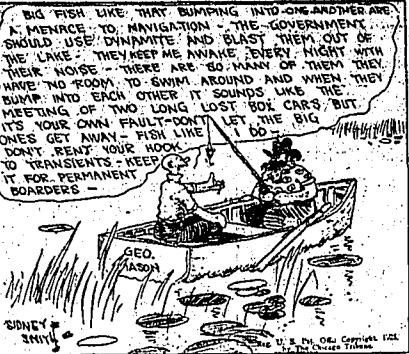
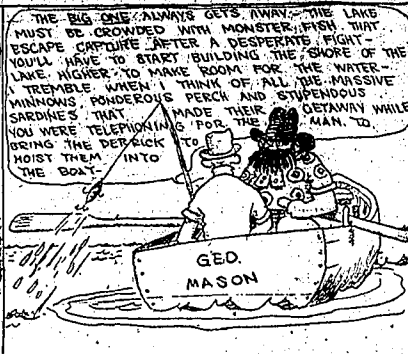

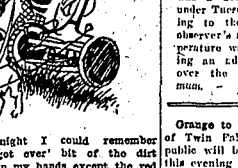
