

ITALY PLANS TO PAY AMERICA ALL SHE CAN ON DEBT

(By The Associated Press) ROME, Aug. 12.—Italy hopes that the toll of her war debts to the United States will be paid in installments, somewhat similar to German reparations under the Dawes plan, according to statements in the press that apparently reflect the views of the government.

The terms "hood pigeon" and "publicity plot" were used in the courtroom in the defense counsel's warning to the contention that Home and Raymond fostered the alleged "plot," using Louis Geck, a police informer and his liquor to stem the alleged plot and to control the kidnaping channels while the two detectives listened. They termed this the talk of "a bunch of drunks."

To support their charge that the affair was publicity stunt, the attorneys pointed out that Mary Pickford and her husband, Douglas Fairbanks, knew nothing of it except what Home and Raymond told them, and that the two were applied of the forthcoming threat by Home five days before the capture of the trio.

The defense attorneys told the jury that Stephens never testified, was "ashamed to come into court to tell his version."

EL PASO MAN IS HELD ON SWINDLE

Dr. John C. Dysart Arrested in San Francisco Accused of Mexican Land Fraud.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 12 (AP)—Charged with using the mails in an attempt to defraud in connection with the promotion of a land colonization scheme in Mexico, Dr. John Clayton Dysart of El Paso, Texas, was arrested in a hotel here today by the postal inspector's office.

The arrest was made on a warrant based on an indictment returned two days ago by a federal grand jury in El Paso. The indictment charges Dr. Dysart with gross misrepresentation of the holdings in oil Mexico of the Lottus-Dysart Development company with headquarters in Los Angeles, William Lottus of Los Angeles, and Dr. John C. Dysart, in aid of the El Paso man.

The indictment against Dysart charged that he fraudulently represented the company's holdings in Chihuahua, Mexico, as in excess of 200,000 acres when they aggregated only 62,000 acres; that printed circulars pictured the land as irrigable and fertile when it was found to be arid and nearly worthless; that settlers there suffered untold hardships and even died from starvation and exposure; that pictures of water wells represented as being located on the property were more than 100 miles away and that other pictures of growing crops also were not on the property.

The company originally was known as the Dysart Van Gass Slaughter and Cattle Co., it was reorganized and renamed the Lottus-Dysart Development company. Dysart is said recently to have transferred his activities from Texas to California and for some time is reported to have been engaged in an attempt to interest California capitalists and prospecting colonists in the Mexican land promotion scheme.

BRITISH AND FRENCH REACH UNDERSTANDING

Foreign Ministers Agree to Reply Nation Will Send Germany on Security Pact Note; Step Toward Peace.

(By The Associated Press). LONDON, Aug. 12—Another step toward the security pact upon which western Europe likely will plan its hope for peace in the future was taken today when the French and British foreign ministers reached an agreement of the reply France is to make to the last German note concerning treaties of mutual guarantee.

Having settled these points, Foreign Minister Briand and Austen Chamberlain, the British foreign secretary, took advantage of their conference in London to exchange views on the security pact. Exactly what their views are on the subject, they know, but the foreign office tonight issued a statement saying their meeting had resulted in an improved prospect for conversations taking place in the near future, which will lead to a final agreement.

These conversations, of course, are to be between the statesmen of the allied nations, and those of Germany and a beginning likely will be made next time the German ambassador to Great Britain calls on Mr. Chamberlain.

M. Briand declined to indicate the nature of the reply France will send to Germany as a diplomatic matter, but he said the German government receive the message before it is given to the world. Although neither statesman said so, in various words, both Chamberlain and Briand seem to feel that informal conversations such as their have just happily concluded here in London will bring the statesmen of Europe closer and more quickly to an understanding in the future than will writing and formal conferences. M. Briand said it was not unlikely that conversations would take place "Put Everything in Order."

On our side, Mr. Chamberlain said he had put everything in order that it was possible for us to arrange at the present time. Many observers think it significant that the Belgians were absent from the conversations. Some see in it a sign that Belgium is becoming tired of its role of sticking to the French in endeavoring to extract their lives from Germany by force if necessary.

DAIRYING YIELDS BEST CASH CROP

Annual Return to Idaho Butter-fat Producers Amounts to \$825,000 Cash.

The report of the state bureau of dairying for the month of June, 1925, shows the production of butterfat and dairy products in the state of Idaho revealed the fact that the dairying of the state is a tremendous and valuable industry.

The following is a tabulation of the production in the state as a whole: Butterfat produced for manufacturing purposes, 3,000,000 pounds; butter manufactured in the state, 1,500,000 pounds; butter manufactured out of the state from Idaho butterfat, 2,170,000 pounds.

Canyon county is the largest producer of butterfat, producing 308,700 pounds; Blaine county is second as a producer of butterfat, producing 232,100 pounds.

In the manufacture of butter, Canyon county also ranks first, manufacturing 351,500 pounds, Blaine county ranking a close second with 315,400 pounds.

Ada county is the only county that produces the by-product of the whole milk industry called "cream" producing 20,000 pounds.

The Boise valley is by far the largest producing district of dairying in the state, producing in the neighborhood of one-fourth of the state's butterfat.

This is the first time in the history of the dairy business in Idaho that accurate figures have been compiled on the industry as a whole and it shows that the dairy industry is of tremendous value to the state because of the large amount of ready cash that it places into the state every day in the year.

The figures have been compiled by Ronald Wood, director of the state bureau of dairying and presented to the board of dairying at the meeting of the state dairy association at the state capitol building in Boise.
