## WORK'S POLICY IS ASSAILED BY BORAH

(Continued from Page 1) submitted to water users who are forming an association to guarantee repayment of this sum. The United States under the contract would build a reservoir of 7,000 acres capacity and conduct the Vacher-Provo diversion canal with a capacity of 300 second feet of water. This contract, which will be phased before the organizations forming the association, in view of the fact understood, requires that the entire cost of construction be repaid to the United States in 25 years, with the federal government reimbursed for operation and maintenance expenses during the time the works are operated \$500,000 for the project during the first year.

Approves Contract. The secretary has approved a form of contract for the purchase of an interest in Water project in connection with the Vacher-Provo project, for which congress has appropriated \$2,000,000.

A part of this purchase, the interior department said, may have to be used for the Warm Springs irrigation district, and if this expenditure is above \$200,000 the district must pay the government the balance. The form of contract has been forwarded to the secretary of the interior for his approval. It calls for a meeting of the district representatives, due to local complications involving the right of the district to convey an adequate interest in the storage reservoir, the department said. It is provided in the contract that the secretary may require the district to institute and prosecute a suit to determine the extent of the right to be conveyed to the United States.

Before construction can begin, another contract with the Vacher-Provo district is necessary, and also a willingness to comply with a provision of the appropriation requiring the state to assume certain duties and responsibilities in settlement and improvement of farms. Secretary Work also approved a draft of a letter to the Vacher-Provo district and the directors to which water may be furnished from the reservoir and canals of the proposed Owyhee project. This letter also makes plans for payment of water charges and construction costs, if these districts are conveyed to the United States.

GARRIE FOIT TO WHITE HOUSE. WASHINGTON, Sept. 16 (AP)—Sen. Garrie Foit, Idaho, today carried to the White House his fight for relief of settlers on reclamation projects in the west.

Following closely on the announcement of the White House views that congress was to blame for lack of relief legislation, the Idaho senator indicated that he felt Secretary Work and the interior department were to blame for the unfavorable conditions in the west where settlers have been seeking extension of relief from reclamation charges. In conference with President Coolidge the senator urged a more liberal attitude on the part of the government and declared that the interior department had adequate authority under the law to carry out relief measures.

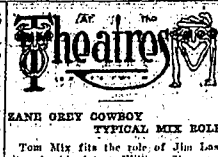

# SPAN BUILDER'S VISIT REVIVES BRIDGE PROJECT

### Dr. D. B. Steinmar, Noted Engineer, Here Representing Eastern Money to Investigate Plan for Blue Lakes Crossing.

Confidence that the building of a suspension bridge, 1350 feet long and 500 feet above the water, to span Snake river canyon at Blue lakes, directly north of here, will soon be an accomplished fact was expressed Wednesday evening by Shad L. Hodgins, president, and Charles E. Dwight, secretary, of the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce, following the visit of Dr. D. B. Steinmar, chief engineer of the engineering firm of Robinson and Steinmar of New York, builders of some of the largest suspension bridges in the world, including two over East river in New York.

Dr. Steinmar represents eastern financial interests, which, he said, are prepared to supply all of the money required for building of the Blue lakes span, provided possibilities of traffic over the proposed bridge are as great as indicated by information collected during the past several months.

#### Views Project Site

He arrived in Twin Falls Wednesday afternoon from Sidney, Neb., with company with Secretary Dwight, Mayor E. L. Ashton and James A. Croner, Jr. The engineer, Dr. B. Steinmar, of the engineering firm of Robinson and Steinmar of New York, builders of some of the largest suspension bridges in the world, including two over East river in New York. Dr. Steinmar represents eastern financial interests, which, he said, are prepared to supply all of the money required for building of the Blue lakes span, provided possibilities of traffic over the proposed bridge are as great as indicated by information collected during the past several months.

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Dr. Steinmar's attention was drawn to the project here, it was stated, as a result of information laid before him some months ago by Maurice Cron, son of J. A. Cron of this city, who is an engineer and contractor living in Chicago.

Dr. Steinmar, in the course of the conference Wednesday evening, was told of the plans of federal and state highway builders to establish the Sawtooth park highway, extending north from connection with transcontinental routes in Nevada through Twin Falls and over the proposed Blue lakes bridge to the Sawtooth mountains and Yellowstone and Glacier national parks. He was told also of the anticipated effects of the completion of the Oregon-Hwy. Line. Rogers-Wells road that will reduce the distance from this region to San Francisco by about 200 miles, and give figures showing the volume of traffic over present Snake river crossings.

# PERJURY CASES SET FOR TRIAL

### Court Overrules Demurrers to New Informations in Case of Pate and Accused Women.

Trials in the cases of Stephen Pate, Edna Burton and Mamie M. Conner on charges of perjury were tentatively set by Judge W. A. Balchek in district court here Wednesday. The trial was held next Wednesday. The repetitive denial was made after the court denied and overruled defendants' demurrer to new information filed Wednesday by the prosecuting attorney's office and after each of the defendants had entered pleas of not guilty to the charge.

The case demurrers to the original informations were sustained by the court and the prosecuting attorney was directed to prepare and file new informations. The court also upheld motions for continuance in the case of Stephen Pate to strike from the information the state's denial of Pate's assertion that he had conspired with the sheriff relative to proper conduct on the part of deputy sheriff.

The perjury charges are based on the state's contention that defendants had conspired with the sheriff to obtain a motion for new trial in the case of Earl Pate, son of Stephen Pate, who was convicted last spring of burglary. 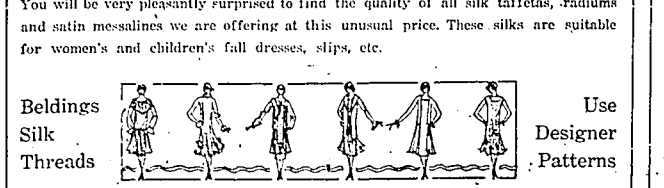
