

# RECORD MONEY AVAILABLE FOR GIGANTIC SPAN

### R. M. Murray of Spokane Meets Proposal of New York Engineer for Building Blue Lakes Bridge.

Portland, Oregon, interests, represented by R. M. Murray of Spokane, who was agent for the engineering firm of the construction of the Hanson bridge across Snake river canyon 10 miles east of here, are prepared to finance entirely the construction of a five-tower toll bridge over Snake river canyon at Twin Falls. Five miles north of here, according to statement made by Mr. Murray to chamber of commerce officials here Thursday evening.

Mr. Murray's statement indicates that competition has developed for the right to build the Blue Lakes bridge, since Dr. D. B. Steinhilber of New York, noted bridge builder and a member of the American Society of Civil Engineers, as a result of recent investigation here announced that the project would be a feasible and profitable one.

### Engineering Wonder.

The Blue Lakes bridge would be the longest and with one possible exception, the highest in the world, with a span of about 1500 feet suspended more than 500 feet above the water. Estimated cost range from \$300,000 to \$500,000. Construction would be completed within a year from the date of award of the contract.

### Murray Draws First Plans.

The Blue Lakes bridge project has been one of interest to Mr. Murray since the time he built the Hanson bridge over Snake river canyon. He visited Twin Falls some weeks prior to the time he was offered the right to make arrangements for financing the construction of the Blue Lakes bridge, and he stated that some of the money required be raised through local subscription to attract and personally delivered to him as proposed for this purpose.

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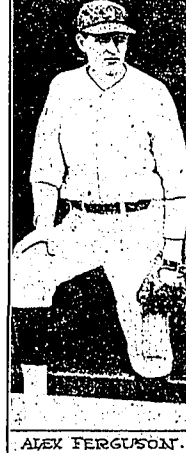

LEGION ACCORDS MITCHELL PLAN SOME APPROVAL

Delegates in Convention at Omaha Go On Record Urging Rehabilitation of National Air Defense.

(By the Associated Press.)
OMAHA, Neb., Oct. 8.—The American Legion accorded Colonel William Mitchell, the army's outspoken critic of the nation's aeronautical policy, a measure of commendation today when it unanimously adopted a resolution recommending the plan for rehabilitation of the national defense by creating a separate cabinet department, army, navy and air.

In three days of heated committee hearings which continued until a moment before the report of the legion's first aeronautical committee was brought to the floor, the resolution was fought over and rearranged until it was found acceptable to all parties to the debate which has raged ever since Mitchell since the legionnaires assembled here last Monday.

Leaders Work Well
The leaders had worked so well, however, that none of those who simply agreed last night that they would support the convention floor for open endorsement of Colonel Billy, offered to open hostilities.

Delegations Active
Various state delegations had arranged for caucusing until after the Mitchell incident was safely past, and tonight delegation headquarters were scenes of intense activity as the leaders sought by promises and trades to gain strength for their candidates.

Speeches advanced as a last minute candidate last year at St. Paul, Minn., when James E. Duff was selected. Tonight the plan was to get his name quickly before the convention, with Alabama yielding to Massachusetts for the nomination.

Yesterday forced reconsideration by it of the world peace committee's report presented today a resolution which substituted for the other proposal of "immediate adherence of the court of international justice as set up by the league of nations, approval of a plan to have the legion favor United States adherence to a court of international justice, but without indicating any definite court.

The work of the legion's world peace committee and the permanent committee on foreign relations was ordered merged today.

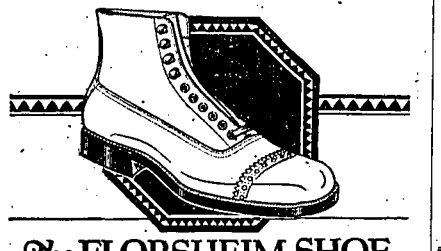

WHEAT DECLINES ON THE MARKET

Chances of Government-Crop Report Showing Increase Sends Grain Prices Down.

CHICAGO, Oct. 8 (AP)—Chances that the government crop report due tomorrow may show an increase over previous official estimates of the 1925 yield of wheat in the United States had a good deal to do today with bringing about fresh declines in the value of wheat. Closing quotations of wheat were unsettled, 56 1/2c net lower, new style, December 1.17 1/2c, 1925, and May 1.16 1/2c. Corn 56 1/2c off, and unchanged to 56c up, and provisions unchanged to 56c down.

Great from possibility that the government crop report as to wheat would prove bearish, the wheat market had to take the brunt of advice that Russia had made actual shipments of 2,074,000 bushels of wheat in the last week, and that Argentina will be able to export 2,000,000 bushels a week until February, at which time the government crop report will be made. The market was also affected by the fact that Argentina wheat was reported as contending with American wheat at Liverpool, with British resellers offering again at 2c under the Canadian pool's price.

Better weather in Canada, where threshing has been slow, was among the factors that promoted selling of wheat in the wheat market here, and so, too, was talk about big crops of wheat in Europe and excellent yields of potatoes. As a result, the Chicago market reportedly ran into enlarged selling on rallies. Near the end of the day, however, much of the earlier losses here were overcome because of speculators buying here against sales of the Chicago market.

TWIN FALLS IN LINE OF GREAT FORWARD MOVE
Shad L. Hodgkin Tells Business Men's Meeting Co-operation and Vision Will Build Metropolis Here.

Co-operation with vision on the part of its citizens will build Twin Falls, in view of its strategic situation, the largest city in Idaho within the next 10 years, Shad L. Hodgkin, president of Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce and former mayor of Twin Falls, told an assemblage of about 50 business men at a dinner meeting held Thursday evening at the Hotel Idaho.

Tells Factors for Growth. In an enumeration of factors making for rapid and permanent growth of Twin Falls, Mr. Hodgkin included the Oregon Short Line Railroad, the new bridge, the new bank building, construction of a rim-stone bridge over Snake river canyon at Blue Falls and the proposed extension of the Oregon Short Line westward from Blue Falls.

Concerns of the Atlantic and Pacific coasts, Mr. Hodgkin stated, are contending for the right to build the Twin Falls canal, and that Twin Falls and its industry and that will assure Twin Falls location on a continental highway between national parks in California and Yellowstone parks thus placing this city at the crossroads of two great continental highways.

Boise citizens and business interests are co-operating with Twin Falls in urging construction of the Oregon Short Line west from Blue Falls which, Mr. Hodgkin stated, will place Twin Falls midway between the northern, eastern and western borders of the state.

Organization Essential. Maintenance of the chamber of commerce and the credit association, it was asserted by Mr. Hodgkin and other speakers at this meeting, is essential in order that Twin Falls citizens may work effectively toward attainment of the opportunities presented to this city.

The chamber of commerce, Mr. Hodgkin declared, supplies the necessary central agency to represent the entire community. Operation of the credit association, it was asserted by Wilbur S. Hill, John J. Hughes, manager of the national bank and other speakers, tends to reduce losses and promote what is commensurate and industry, benefiting both merchants and patrons by reducing overhead charges, and by reducing losses and slow payments. Mr. Hill explained the association's purpose and plan of organization and Mr. Hughes emphasized especially the efficiency of the organization through cooperation to combat issuance of bad checks.

Gender Marks Discussion. The meeting was characterized by normal discussion of many problems that beset Twin Falls business men which was led by W. W. Hough, chairman of the merchants' committee, who preferred an entirely frank and candid statement with the explanation that he was soon to leave Twin Falls and took this opportunity to express his candid opinion of Twin Falls men and institutions. Problems under discussion included the securing of better relations between business men and their patrons; methods of dealing with home-tissue canvassers and curtailment of credit losses and petty larceny. The discussions were participated in by a number of the business and professional men representing many and varied lines of activities, and including Messrs. E. H. Asher, Wm. W. Son, W. H. Eldridge, T. J. Douglas, H. C. Ericson and C. E. Pickett.

BULLET WOUND PROVES FATAL

F. A. Atkinson, Knull District Farmer, Dies From Effect of Shooting in Head.

Frederick A. Atkinson, 58, Knull district farmer, died Thursday at a hospital here, from effects of a gunshot wound in the head that is believed to have been inflicted by himself with a .32-caliber revolver Tuesday morning at his farm home seven miles northwest of here. The body was taken to the hospital and company mortuary. No arrangements for funeral services had been made Thursday evening.
