

REVENUE BILLS THROUGH ACTION

House Ways and Means Committee Decides to Increase Exemption on Federal Income Levies.

(By the Associated Press.)
WASHINGTON, Nov. 5. (AP)—Removal of more than 1,000,000 individuals from the federal income tax roll by increasing exemptions and widespread reductions in these levies were voted today by the house ways and means committee as the first actual step in its preparation of a new revenue bill. The income tax exemption bill agreed upon were \$1,500 for a single person and \$3,000 for heads of families, compared with \$1,000 and \$2,500 respectively in the present law. Other changes decided upon included:

- Reduce Surtax.** Reduction of the maximum surtax rate from 40 to 20 per cent; reduction of the normal rate from 13.75 per cent on the first \$1,000 of taxable income, from 4 to 3 per cent on the next \$1,000, from 8 to 5 per cent on the remainder.
- Increase in the age limit for the 10 per cent exemption allowance for dependents.** From 18 to 21 years in cases where children are in school.
- Retention of the present 25 per cent reduction in the tax on capital gains earned incomes of \$10,000 or less, also was decided upon by the committee.**
- First annual gift tax.** The gift tax by the committee was estimated to have taken more than \$200,000,000 off the government treasury. It was held in abeyance, to the approval of congress and was more extensive than the reduction proposed because of the increased exemptions.

Idaho Farmers Make Big Sums of Money From Potato Yields

Report Farmer Gets Check for \$24,000 on Crop from 36 Acres; Others Pay for Farms

BOISE, Nov. 5. (AP)—Idaho farmers this year are reaping a rich harvest from their potatoes. Shortage of potatoes for export has combined with a heavy yield here to bring big returns to the farmers. The price of potatoes has increased but little increased over last year, but yields will exceed those of 1925, and prices, \$4.00 a bushel, have made a corresponding stimulus here.

One report given last week received a check for \$24,000, representing the proceeds of 3000 bushels of potatoes. A. H. Rupert, the producer of 35 acres. PREPARED TO PREVENT MURDER'S LIFE

CO-OPERATION LACK SEEN IN LIQUOR PROBE

Shad Hodgkin, Chamber of Commerce Head and Former Mayor, Makes Pungent Comment in Address.

Twin Falls continuing liquor legislation is an instance of lack of cooperation in the community that tends to detract seriously from the reputation of the community, Shad L. Hodgkin, president of the chamber of commerce and former mayor of Twin Falls, declared in the course of an address Thursday evening before a banquet meeting of about 50 members of Twin Falls Credit association and their guests.

Mr. Hodgkin emphasized the value of cooperation in community building. He praised the credit association as a factor for making for elimination of economic waste and for encouraging development of individual character traits upon which credit is based.

Discussing the subject of credit from a broad standpoint, Mr. Orr Chapman, attorney, declared that credit depends upon essential faith in human virtues and rugged honesty that is essential to all human relationships.

He suggested that merchants in some instances, desiring to increase the volume of their business, had offended against sound credit principles by withholding demand for credit and unduly encouraging use of credit.

He praised the credit association as an agency making for better economic conditions by combating abuses of credit and bringing about appreciation of the value of credit.

Stating that the association might emulate the work with that of the chamber of commerce, Mr. Chapman indicated his opinion that too many diverse organizations now exist, and urged for unity of effort through one central organization.

F. W. Brannagh, chairman of the chamber of commerce merchants' committee, announced the decision of Twin Falls merchants to close their places of business at 11 a. m. next Wednesday in observance of Armistice day, and urged that business men attending the American Legion annual meeting day exercises in the Elks hall beginning at that hour.

Tells Methods
John J. Hughes, manager of the credit association, outlined methods for curtailing losses through bad credit risks and suggested formation of a legislative committee to work for amendment to Idaho laws to provide for dealing more actively with bad checks and other credit abuses.

Members of the association were expected to bring as guests at this meeting by out-of-town business men, each member bringing a guest who is engaged in the same line of business as himself.

The program was arranged by W. H. Hill. Speakers were introduced by D. D. Alvord, president of the association, who presided at the meeting.
