

WITCHIE FOUND GUILTY OF ARMY COURT CHARGES

Former Assistant Air Chief Suspended from Service for Five Years for Attacks on Aviation Policies.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17.—A verdict of guilty on all specifications and the general charge of neglect of duty, in the army court martial which charged William Mitchell by the court martial which has been conducting his trial for insubordination since Oct. 21.

WORLD COURT ISSUE AGAIN BEFORE SENATE WITH SENATOR BORAH LEADING OPPOSITION

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17.—The world court issue finally was brought before the senate today with immediate indications that the long and bitter league of nations fight is to be reopened.

The chief point of controversy is whether adherence to the court means affiliation with the league and the forces in the senate are arrayed in much the same fashion they were during the months of struggle over the covenant.

Leadership of the forces for admission again has fallen to a democracy. Senator Swanson of Virginia, the sponsor of the resolution of ratification with the reservations recommended by President Harding when he submitted the court proposal in February, 1923, and since approved by President Coolidge, who has urged Senate action.

Standing in the forefront of those opposing the court is Senator Borah, republican of Idaho, the member of the foreign relations committee, who was prominent among the league irreconcilables. Supporting him are the republicans.

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HEARING GIVEN, AHERN'S CLAIM

Engineer in Court Tells of Work Preliminary to Building of Rogerson-Wells Line.

The case of Earl J. Ahern against the Idaho Central Railroad company, an action for recovery of \$15,000 for engineering services rendered and wages, salaries and other furnished by Ahern to the company, was given to the jury Thursday evening as the close of trial which occupied the day. The case was argued by Judge W. A. Babcock to return a verdict to the court this morning in the event of finding an agreement during the night.

Mr. Ahern and G. M. McGuffey, civil engineer in charge of the railroad, were called in evidence on behalf of the company, which was represented by Judge J. H. Hoffmann. Under questioning by his attorney, Harry Bennett, Mr. Ahern told of his work in connection with preparation of plans for the proposed railroad to extend from Rogerson to Wells, this work being done under agreement entered into in June, 1923, with the late George E. Davis, president and general manager of the company, whose death occurred in May, 1924. Mr. McGuffey testified as to the value of the services thus rendered.

The agreement, Judge Hoffmann contended that Mr. Ahern's compensation, under the agreement, was to have been paid out of the few days' traveling charges of the company's assets and plans. Mr. Ahern denied that without Mr. Ahern's claim the company would have had nothing to show.

Assets of the company now are held by J. H. Hoffmann, civil engineer, as trustee, under purchase from J. L. Stewart of San Francisco, principal partner in the purchase of the line. Purchase by the trustee was effected as a condition precedent to construction of the Rogerson-Wells line.

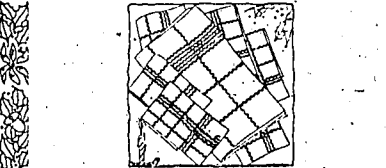

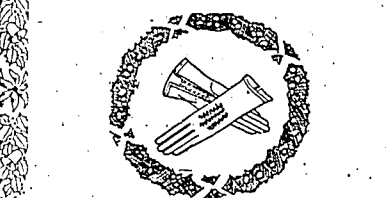

THE COST OF BOOKS

Winston Churchill, famous American
biographer says he has written some
books in the last few years for
publication. "Like a child building
houses in the sand," he does it
for his own amusement.
Mr. Churchill can afford to do this.
He has made enough money on past
ventures to indulge such a whim. But
he gives a reason for it that is not at
all flattering to himself. He doesn't
write books for publication. He writes
books for his own amusement.
His chief objection to them seems
to be the price they charge for
books. Today, says Mr. Churchill,
books cost so much that they are be-
yond the reach of those who love
them.
"A good book is to be cherished, not
kept and read or re-read. People
who can't afford to pay \$2 or \$2.50
for a book must now get them out of
libraries. Something is lost. They
lose the association of good books
and the pleasure of seeing them in
the house as familiar as friends, and
reading them occasionally."
Fortunately there are libraries to
furnish books for those who can't buy
them. In this respect America is far
ahead of other countries. But the
libraries in foreign countries don't need
the libraries in this country, because
they sell books for cheaper than we do, and
there are usually editions of good
works within the reach of almost any
one.

COSTLY CAR NEEDED.

Much has been said about the car-
ting farmer who neglects his farm
machinery, thus hastening its break-down
and impairing its efficiency. Now,
listen to the tale of the National An-
ticipatory Chamber of Commerce, told
by A. F. Lord in Chicago recently.
That organization has found that 75
per cent of automobile break-downs
are caused by lack of lubrication or
adjustment of the proper time. Great
annual neglect of cars results in thou-
sands of accidents every year, involv-
ing human injuries and death. And
finally, the Chamber says, the money
lost to American automobile owners
every year due to neglected lubrication
and failure to keep up usual ad-
justments reaches \$100,000,000.
That startling sign is considerably
more than the budget tax reduction

FOREST CONTROL GETS APPROVAL

Society of American Foresters Endorse Department Supervision of National Reserves.

MADISON, Wis., Dec. 17 (AP)—The Society of American Foresters today sent a telegram to William H. Devney, chief federal forester, endorsing continuation of control by the secretary of agriculture over grazing in national forests. The telegram reads:

"The Society of American Foresters thoroughly endorses our position that there be no interference with the present authority of the secretary of agriculture exercise complete control over grazing and other secondary use of national forests."

"It believes the announced objects sought by organized stockmen of the west, if attained, would not only interfere seriously with the administration of national forests for production of timber and protection of water supply but would also threaten the integrity of the entire national forest policy."

DRY REGULATION NOW CHALLENGED

Diplomatic Immunity from Prohibition Act is Attacked by Senator Blease, Democrat.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 17 (AP)—Diplomatic immunity from the prohibition act was challenged today in a resolution by Senator Blease, Democrat, South Carolina, calling for investigation of the use of liquor at embassies and legations here.

The resolution further demanded to know whether the Italian debt commission brought liquor into this country and if so why its members not promptly arrested as American citizens would have been.

The South Carolina senator sought unanimous consent for his consideration of his bill but on the objection of Senator Curtis of Kansas, the republican leader, it went over until tomorrow.

Urges Probc.

Treasury department officials under the resolution would be requested to make an immediate investigation and to report to the senate whether whiskey, wine or beer had been served by any foreign ambassadors, minister agents in Washington, since the passage of the Volstead act, and if so, whether it had been done with the approval of the president or any other official whose duty it was to enforce the prohibition law. With respect to the Italian debt commission, it also asked by whose authority the foreign negotiators had been permitted to bring into the country, champagne, whiskey and beer, if this had been done.

Under-Secretary Winston said tonight that the Italian debt commission was granted full diplomatic status while in the United States and under international law 14 members were immune from prosecution under the Volstead act.

ESTIMATE DIFFERENCE BELIEVED RESULT OF RUSSIAN CALCULATION

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17 (AP)—Miscellaneous of the European grain trades as to the exportable quantity of wheat to be contributed to the world supply during the crop year are probably due, Secretary Hoover said today, to deficiencies of the Russian crop reporting system.

Estimates were current last fall that Russia might export 200,000,000 bushels, and the commerce department found it necessary to issue a statement that the exportable total could not be more than 600,000,000 bushels. The actual shipments so far have been much less.

The failure to produce a large quantity of wheat for export is having a serious effect upon Russian trade, official observers said today, citing as one reason the cancellation by the soviet government of orders previously placed in the United States and elsewhere for machinery.

Four days after the birth the mother died. She was beneficiary of the estate, which is in the form of a trust fund.

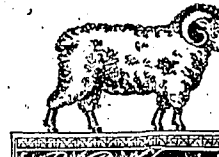
