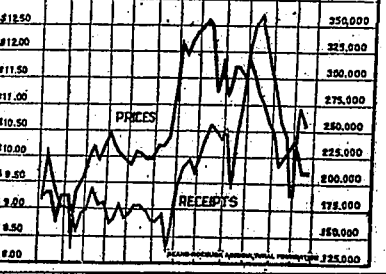
FAT AND FEEDER CATTLE DEMAND BOOSTS THE LIVESTOCK INDUSTRY

The large demand for both feeder and fat cattle, finds the Bears-Roebuck Agricultural Foundation in its cattle marketing investigations, has inspired a much greater confidence in the future of the industry.

Liquidation of western cattle herds was less noticeable in 1925 than in any year since 1919, showing that the cattle industry is gradually getting back to a state of normalcy.

Cattle receipts at the four leading markets reached their high point in October, going over the 350,000 mark. The western ranches and other great cattle producing sections ship to market at this time.

"About the same time a dispatch from Paris quoted the opinion of French authorities regarding international development. One speaker said: "In the face of the German preparation, with which we are familiar and the activities of the other powers, our best defense and our best means of self-protection is the expansion of our own economic expansion, and can only add to the importance of our country."

The dispatches present a strange contrast. England is determined to keep on her feet financially, and is therefore looking out for opportunities to reduce her military expenditures and save money. France is self-sufficient, and in spite of her exceedingly precarious financial position proceeds to enlarge her military expenditures.

It is easy to understand France's mighty fear. But it is also difficult not to condemn that country's mistakes of judgment and policy. France has not always looked herself at war, which makes it harder for friendly nations to help her.

AN ALL-AMERICAN UNION. It begins to look as if Canada were to become a member of the Pan-American Union. The Dominion Government was represented at the recent Pan-American Commercial Congress to be held in Canada.

There seems to be a growing feeling that the Dominion should include all America, instead of leaving out the great nation to the north of the United States.

Canada is more interested in South American trade than in Pan-American politics. It is a true friend to the international relationship, such as the Pan-American Union seeks to build for the Western Hemisphere, and the two things are very well together.

Canada is part of the British Empire, and intends to remain so. It is also a great American ally, and might well play a most important role in the affairs of the two American continents.

FRANCHISE UNACCEPTABLE TO BRIDGE COMPANIES

Deficit that might occur during any year would be borne by the bridge owners.

WHEAT MARKET CLOSES LOWER

At One Time During the Day Breadstuff for December Delivery Goes Above \$1.90.

CHICAGO, Dec. 30. (AP)—Wheat available for delivery tomorrow on final settlement of December contracts here, jumped today to the highest point yet this season, 1.90 1/2 a bushel, but the price of later deliveries came tumbling down as a result of heavy selling to realize profits.

Exciting nervousness characterized the wheat market throughout the day, and the close was irregular, varying from 5 cents net decline to 1 1/2-cent net advance, December 1.88 1/2, and March 1.90 1/2. Corn advanced 1 1/8 to 1 1/4 at 1.36 and 1.38 to 1.40, and provisions 2c lower to a five-cent advance.

Wheat price fluctuations today were unusually numerous and rapid owing to a combination of speculative accounts preparing for the year end and a three-day holiday ahead. The fact that the price of wheat had failed to respond well to yesterday's sharp advance in Chicago led to hesitancy on the part of the many speculative buyers.

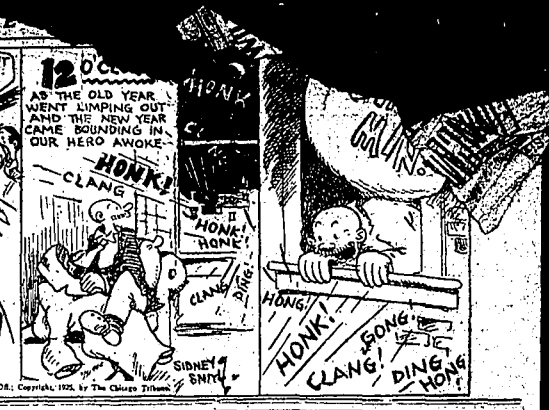

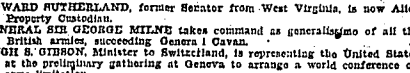

Deficit that might occur during any year would be borne by the bridge company's amendment proposal, which was submitted to the commissioners at the opening of the franchise bid.

The commissioners' proposal provides for granting of franchise for 50 years, at the expiration of which time the franchise shall terminate and the grantee and their successors and all other of its rights thereunder shall immediately cease and terminate.

It is provided in the commissioners' proposals that the bridge builder shall construct a highway in and across county lands from the north end of said bridge and extending in a northwesterly direction, connecting with an established highway.

The purpose of fixing the basis for determining the tolls to be charged for the use of said bridge is to provide a basis for the tolls to be charged for the use of said bridge.

That said grantee shall construct a bridge of steel, concrete or masonry, and shall be responsible for the maintenance and repair of said bridge.

Amount of bonds to be furnished by the grantee to guarantee payment of damage claims and for performance of the contract shall be ascertained by the commissioners.

Possibility of purchase of the bridge by the county prior to expiration of the franchise period also is the subject of another clause of the proposed franchise which provides that said bridge may at the option of said counties of Jerome and Twin Falls, be purchased and taken over by the county.

Exemption from payment of tolls would be granted under the commissioners' proposals to any person, including to or from a hospital, school or court, which, by law, he is required to attend as a witness in a criminal case.

Drafting of the commissioners' proposal franchise was begun Tuesday, and the work continued until late at night. It was resumed early this afternoon and continued until 6:20 p. m., when it was submitted to the applicants for the franchise.

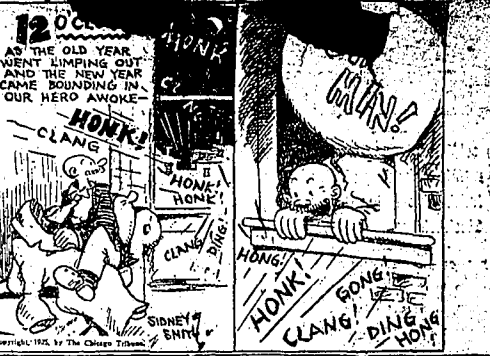
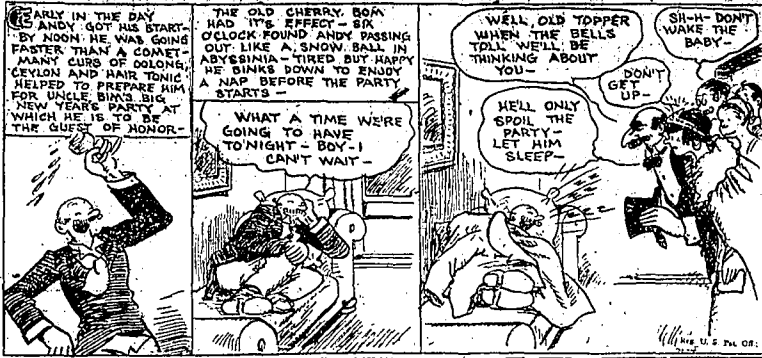

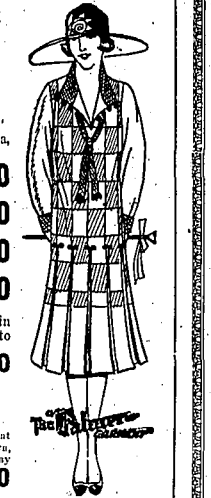
