INDIANA CLAIMS HIGH PLACE IN POLITICAL LIFE

Hoosier State Has Participated in Twenty-Eight Elections Since Entrance Into Union; Candidates Backed Chosen.

(By the Associated Press.)
INDIANAPOLIS, Feb. 25.—Indiana's position as a pivotal state of national politics is acclaimed by Hoosier statesmen.

The state has participated in 28 general elections since its admission to the Union in 1816. Twenty-three times the candidates for whom it has voted has been successful. In two of the five instances which were exceptions, the candidate who had a plurality in Indiana had a plurality in the electoral college.

With a facility for slipping back and forth between the major parties, Indiana has "gone republican" 16 times, democratic 11 times and whig twice in national elections. From 1872 to 1900 it was alternately democratic and republican in its vote for president.

The Hoosier state cast its first presidential vote for Monroe who was elected the year of its admission. It voted for Monroe again in 1820, and he was successful. In 1824 Andrew Jackson had a majority in Indiana, and a popular plurality in the nation, but John Quincy Adams won in the electoral college. Indiana's fortunes were with Jackson in the next two elections and he was successful.

The state voted for its Tippecanoe hero, William Henry Harrison, in 1840 and Van Buren won, but Indiana rode to victory with Harrison in 1841 and with Polk in 1844. The state voted for Cass a democrat, when Taylor won in 1848. Thereafter for six elections Indiana was on the bandwagon, with Pierce, Buchanan, Lincoln and Grant. The state gave Tilden a majority in 1876 when Hayes was elected despite a minority of the popular vote.

Then for nine more elections Indiana was on the winning side, until 1916, when the state relative to a majority for Hughes and Wilson was elected. In 1920 and 1924 the republican candidate won easily in Indiana and the nation.

Except for the 1884 campaign when Thomas A. Hendricks, Indiana native and former Hoosier governor, was the presidential candidate with Grover Cleveland the fact of a vice president's Indiana nativity or residence has not affected the result in the state, although Indiana is proud of its consistent production of vice presidents.

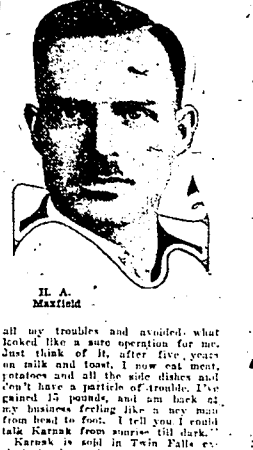

SEE PROSPECT IN TRUCK LINE TO CALIFORNIA

Los Angeles Men Investigating Feasibility of Project for Interchange of Products of Two States.

Opportunity for profitable employment of a motor truck has suggested itself to two citizens of Los Angeles who are owners of a truck and who have applied to Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce for information on which to base their conclusions as to the feasibility of the project.

The Los Angeles men purpose, if the project is deemed feasible, to make a round trip each week between Los Angeles and Twin Falls. On trips from Los Angeles the truck would carry California citrus fruits, grapes, walnuts and other products not grown in northern climates. It would be loaded on return trips to Los Angeles with Idaho apples, potatoes, prunes, poultry and other products for which there is ready and profitable market in California.

One of the truck owners would establish residence in Twin Falls to dispose of California products brought here by the truck and to procure loads of Idaho products for the return trip.

the institution. More money, Mr. Morse declared, was not the main need of the library, but larger quarters were imperative. In the event that it is impossible to secure these, Mr. Morse stated that she favored closing the library.

Some interesting figures were given by way of illustration of the place occupied by the library and the magnitude of the work it seeks to perform. Idaho Falls, she declared, with a population of approximately 8000, had but 6100 volumes in its library with an annual circulation of 28,500. Pocatello, with a population of 16,000, had 8840 volumes on its library shelves and an annual circulation of 29,250. Twin Falls, with a population of approximately the same as Idaho Falls, had 4500 volumes in its library, with an annual circulation of 72,000, thus proving beyond a doubt that the people of Twin Falls and the surrounding area are thinkers and are interested in better things than had so far been possible.

Asher B. Wilson, president of the chamber of commerce, detailed an imaginary trip to California and return over the new railroad, which it was hoped to make real by way of celebration of the opening of the road. Mr. Wilson declared a knowledge of the California market was necessary if Twin Falls were to profit fully by the new line and this fact was sufficient justification for the trip. He stated that on Monday next committees would begin an active campaign in an effort to make a definite list of those who would make the trip so that arrangements for the special train could be made with as little delay as possible.

Urges Ball Team
J. Robb Brady of Pocatello outlined a plan whereby organized baseball might be brought to Twin Falls through the entry of this city into a class C league consisting of Twin Falls, Idaho Falls, Pocatello, Salt Lake, Ogden and Logan. Mr. Brady's remarks were listened to with close interest.

Ed S. Larned, head of the county bureau of noxious weed control, told an interesting story of the dangerous possibilities of noxious weeds in the farm lands of the county and explained the difficulties attendant upon the work of fighting them. He declared that, in the final report, solution of the weed problem rested with the man on the farm. He advocated state action to bring about the compulsory control of weeds in all counties in this watershed, explaining the distribution of the weed through irrigation not only within this county but

DELEGATION URGES BALL CLUB HERE

Opportunity for Twin Falls to Join Utah and Idaho Cities in League Attractively Presented Business Men.

Opportunity for Twin Falls to join with Salt Lake, Ogden, Logan, Pocatello and Idaho Falls in a six-team class C baseball league and to become the center for organized baseball in the central Idaho was attractively presented at a meeting of several interested citizens in Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce offices Thursday afternoon by J. Bobb Brady and J. H. Halliwell of Pocatello and E. G. Bennett of Idaho Falls, representing the Pocatello and Idaho Falls clubs for which franchises in the league already have been secured.

Under decision reached during discussion at the meeting of ways and means of obtaining the franchise for Twin Falls to complete organization of the six-team league, invitation was extended to Mr. Brady to present the subject before larger audiences Thursday evening at the chamber of commerce dinner meeting and at the Elks lodge smoker.

Salt Lake's desire to retain organized baseball for central Idaho through organization of the class C league was emphasized in the explanation of plans for organization and operation of the league given by Mr. Bennett, who is a former citizen of Jerome and now head of Anderson Brothers bank in Idaho Falls. Mr. Bennett told how appreciation of advantages of participation in the league had overcome objections on the part of some of the Idaho Falls citizens when the matter was first presented there. Idaho Falls was prompted to enter the league Mr. Bennett stated, because of advantages to be gained by the town as a center for organized baseball both through attracting people to Idaho Falls to attend the games and through publicity which the league will receive.

Game Schedules
Schedule of 100 or 110 games during the season is to be worked out, and games are to be played at least twice a week. Each team will be restricted to employment of three professional players, three players held under option by other clubs, and eight amateur players, making a total of 13 players for each club. Salary limits are fixed by the league which will be one of only two class C leagues in organized baseball and which will be under supervision and control of the national baseball commission and its national league.

Visiting teams will receive 40 per cent of the gross gate receipts, the remainder going to the home team after deduction of five per cent to meet expenses of the league organization.

Under agreement already reached, gate receipts of games on five holidays during the season will be pooled and divided equally among the six clubs composing the league.

Share in Receipts
Visiting teams' share in receipts for games played in Salt Lake and Ogden, according to national rules, controlled by the Pocatello and Idaho Falls men, probably would be sufficient to meet the running expenses of each of the smaller clubs for the season.

Idaho Falls and Pocatello and Logan have subscribed \$500 each to ward support of their clubs and this

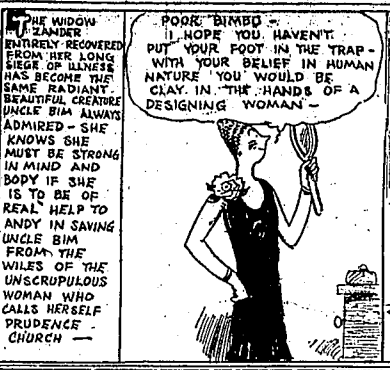

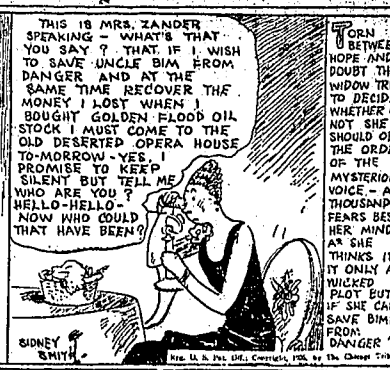

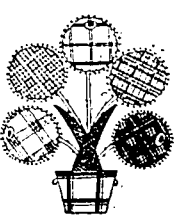
