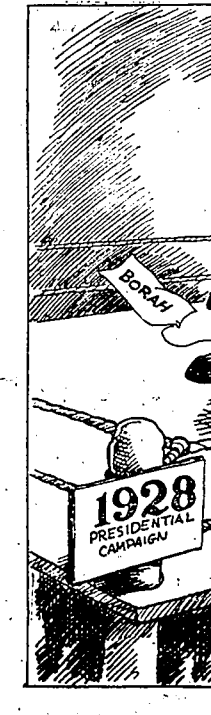

DATES FOR CITIZENS' TRAINING CAMP FIXED

Canal Directors To Meet With Swendsen

Twin Falls canal company directors, in response to advice from J. H. Bothwell, secretary for the company, communicated by telephone Thursday afternoon from Boise, will meet at 10 o'clock this afternoon for the purpose of conferring with Warren O. Swendsen, state commissioner of reclamation, in consideration of proposed exchange of surplus flow water rights of Snake river for storage water during the season of 1926, against which the local Falls company and the Minidoka and Blunley irrigation districts are making a determined fight.

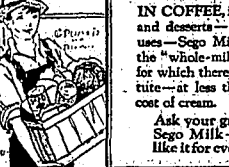

SUPREME COURT HEARS DRY LAW CASE ARGUMENT

Government Attorneys Contend
Bootlegger and Customer
Alike Are Guilty Under Eighteenth Amendment.

(By the Associated Press).
WASHINGTON, March 11.—Customers are liable to prosecution with bootleggers, the government argued in the supreme court today, if the latter fail to keep records of their sales available to the government for inspection.

The government's contention was overturned in the lower courts but buyers who listened to questions from the bench today got the impression that the supreme court might take a different view of the issue. The controversy arose in Philadelphia when the government sought to prosecute Jacob Katz, George E. Egan, and Herman Furststein for conspiracy on charges that Katz had sold liquor to the other men without keeping a record of the sales, including their names and addresses.

Quashes Indictment.
The federal district court of eastern Pennsylvania quashed the indictment holding that the section of the Volstead act requiring the keeping of records of sales related only to permit holders.

Questions and suggestions from the bench were frequent during today's argument, with Chief Justice Taft and Justices Holmes, Vandeventer, McReynolds, Sutherland, Sanford and Stone taking part. Many of them appeared to emphasize the peculiar status of the prohibition act under constitutional amendment, including the point that prosecution for several offenses is possible as the outgrowth of a single transaction.

May Use All Weapons.
Justice Holmes observed that if against the prohibition act was designed to permit the use of every weapon by the prosecution, even to the extent of poison and entrapment in enforcing the law and also remarked that defense counsel was attributing to the law a sportsmanlike character which it did not possess.

An expression of surprise, however, was drawn from Justice McReynolds that the government should insist, as he put it, that a bootlegger who placed a gallon jug of whiskey in his automobile could be prosecuted along with his customers for conspiracy because he did not furnish the government with a list of the persons to whom he sold it.

KREISLER'S HOBBY IS TO PLAY STOCK MARKET

TAMPA, Fla., March 11 (AP)—Fritz Kreisler plays the stock market in his idle moments.

A newspaper reporter found the noted violinist seated before the blackboard in a broker's office. With him was a few other men he referred to as "Foley". The latter, he explained, was his official stock buyer and adviser on Wall Street matters.

During a conversation, Kreisler divided his time about evenly between paying tribute to the violin as the king of instruments and conferring sotto voce with "Foley" as to the advisability of increasing various stocks. He noted the changing figures on the board as keenly as any of the fifty odd other traders in the room and finally agreed with his companion on the buying for the day.

SHARP ADVANCE CHICAGO GRAIN

Active Investment Buying Sends Wheat Price Upward; Argentine Crop Poor.

CHICAGO, March 11. (AP)—Active buying which appeared to be largely of an investment character, brought about sharp advance in wheat values today. Traders gave much attention to reports that bordered on the sensational regarding the inferior quality of the Argentine crop as a whole. Closing quotations on wheat were strong, 1.58 to 1.56 net higher, May new \$1.62 3/4 to \$1.63 1/4, and July \$1.41 3/4 to \$1.41 1/2, with corn 1.35 decline to 38c; oats 1.18 to 1.18 up and provisions ranging from the south to a rise of 2c.

According to some authorities, an acre of 60,000,000 bushels of wheat in a grade so poor that the test weight is less than 35 pounds to the bushel, a decline that in Liverpool quotations would be accompanied with the circumstance and was an additional impetus toward higher prices here. Investors with eastern connections took a prominent part in the purchasing movement and with offerings light the market readily moved up again, especially as a fair export demand for North American wheat was in evidence.

Highest prices of the day in the wheat market were reached shortly before the finish and were nearly 8c a bushel above yesterday's bottom figures. Among the contributing factors were scantiness of domestic receipts and that Northwestern stocks are decreasing more rapidly than the market hard winter wheat here was sold to Buffalo at a good premium. In addition, several winter wheat crop reports from the southwest were optimistic.

Corn prices lagged throughout the day. Better weather was a bear influence and an aggressive buying was apparent in the market with wheat rather than with corn. Provisions averaged higher, owing chiefly to foreign buying of lard.

FLYER'S ADVICE SHEDS LIGHT ON LOCAL PROJECT

Building of Hangers and Lighting System not Essential to Establishment of Landing Field, M. L. Templeton Says.

Building of hangers and installation of lighting system are not necessary and probably not desirable in connection of any plans for establishment of an airplane landing field at Twin Falls, according to M. L. Templeton, aviation returns and associate of "Tomie" Thompson, well-known exhibition flyer, who with Charles F. Dwight, secretary, and Arthur L. Swin, former president of Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce, recently made an investigation with view to selecting a landing field site in this vicinity and recommended acquisition of a tract of 200 acres of state land five miles south of South Park for this purpose.

In discussion of the subject with Mr. Dwight Thursday, Mr. Templeton referred to the example of Salt Lake where only landing field site was required by the city, hangers and lighting system being provided by contractors carrying the mail and other aviation interests.

Mr. Templeton's advice would seem to clear up some of the questions that developed last Monday when it was suggested to Twin Falls city council that the city acquire title to the proposed landing field. The only objection to the suggestion voted by council members at that time was with regard to possible expense involved for acquisition, improvement or maintenance of the field.

Improvement of the site, if Mr. Templeton's advice was carried out, would involve only clearing of space from a runway about a half-mile long and from a quarter to a half-mile wide. Mr. Dwight suggested that this work probably would be done by volunteers involving little or no expense.

Acquisition of this site, which is without an available supply of irrigation water, it is believed, and negotiations to this end are to be opened with J. H. Nash, state land commissioner, according to understanding reached at the council meeting.
