RAILROAD LABOR BILLS CAUSE OF SENATE DISPUTE

Senator Curtis Charges Watson-Parker Act Fails to Protect Public Interest in Event of Controversies.

(By the Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, May 6.—A row was precipitated in the senate today when Senator Curtis charged that the Watson-Parker railroad labor bill protected the public interest.

When the measure, Senator Watson, republican, Indiana, declared the railroad labor disputes had to be settled either by the valley bridge of the law or by the force of the former.

Denying that the bill would protect the public, Senator Curtis, republican, leader of the amendment authorizing interstate commerce commission to amend or modify any wage agreement reached under its terms if it did not protect the public interest.

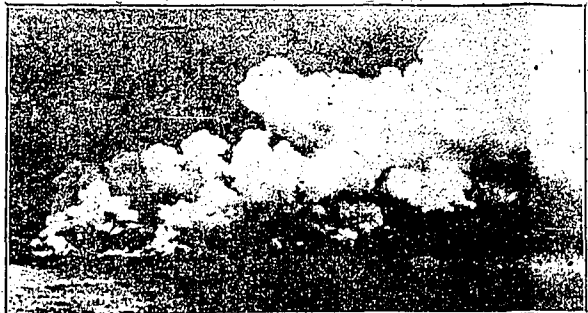

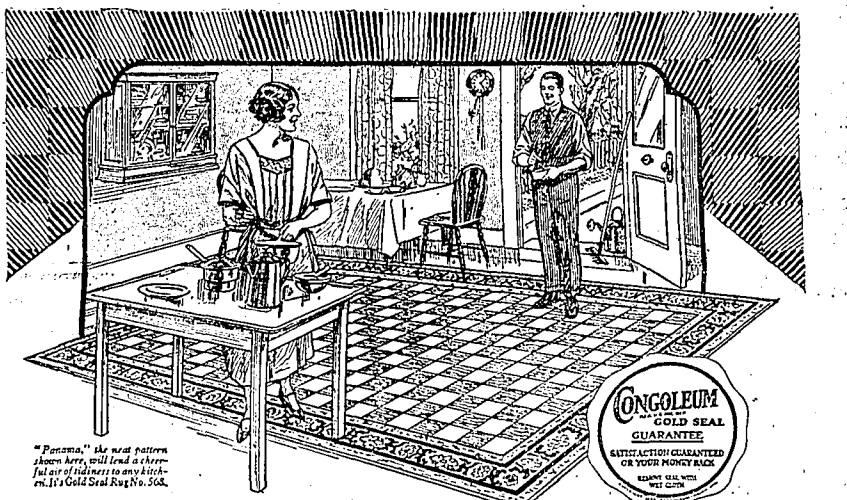

GENERAL TRADE IS SHADE LOWER

Babson's Weekly Business Review Shows Slight Falling off in Industrial Output.

BABSON, Park, Mass., May 6.—Special to The News.—General business conditions throughout the country have dropped off of late for 10 per cent to about 9 per cent above normal. There are certain fundamental conditions that are bound to have considerable influence on general business in the immediate future. Such phases, for instance, as the rate of output in factories, their production capacity, and the favorable balance of foreign trade, coupled with uncertain European political and monetary, the check in real estate speculation, the continued expansion in installment buying by the public in this country, and further uncertainty in both building and automobile production.

The business structure is still sound, but the change in attitude of contributing factors creates considerable uncertainty. There are no sound reasons for believing that the sagging tendency since the first of the year is destined. However, no radical break either in business or commodity prices yet seems certain. Further, in our receding course of various important phases of current business, we shall take a bird's-eye view of the situation found among some of our leading commodities during the past month.

Copper Unchanged.
Statistically, copper showed no material change during the month. The net effect of the Copper Export Association seems to have been somewhat upset by the recent stock market decline. There has been a slight increase per ton since the first of the year both from our mines and abroad. On the other hand, there has also been more consumed as well as more sent out of the country. The producing capacity of the copper people is well equipped to handle more domestic use of copper and foreign shipments.

Paper Stocks Not Large.
The paper industry has not slowed up as much as many other industries. Much paper is being produced yet we are getting the supply right along. As a result, there are no big stocks on hand at the mills. Producing costs are holding relatively steady although weakness seems to have appeared in both raw materials and certain grades of finished paper. Both mechanical and chemical are holding up quite steadily. Production of pulp is relatively high.

Lumber Prices Lower.
Prices of both softwood and hardwood have turned downward. There is a better balance between supply and demand. The lumber industry can be properly taken care of. New softwood orders continue to exceed the amount of softwood cut, but the margin is narrow. Hardwood prices are now not far from the average price that existed throughout 1925. No serious break in lumber prices is on the horizon.

Wool Resistance in Wool.
Wool prices are being checked, but the market has shown more resistance to lower prices. The 1925 clip has not entered consuming channels as quickly as usual. Wool stocks are not too heavy, and are being used up in very good proportion. On the other hand, wool is not coming to the market in any other near the normal amount. Quotations are now down about 25 per cent from the peak a year ago and 75 per cent over pre-war period.

Silk Imports at Record.
Imports of silk for the first three months of this year reached record proportions. Such imports have cut down the world visible supply available for

distribution during the balance of this season. We have used enough silk in this country to reduce silk stocks about 7000 bales. The supply on April 1 was 25,000 bales, and the average of about 31,000 bales. The rayon industry seems to be having greater difficulty now in moving finished goods.


Substituting for Potatoes.
Potato price quotations now seem to be about 200 per cent above the low price in 1925. This high price has naturally resulted in an automatic slowing down in the use of potatoes as well as in the substituting of other foods for potatoes. Potato acreage seems sufficient, and under normal growing conditions the final output should be materially over that of 1925. It is noteworthy that of late the importing of potatoes has been almost unobscured.

Coal Continues Downward.
Soft coal prices, 2. 0. h. mines, have continued the downward movement, and are now close to the lowest point of 1925. Low soft coal has been produced of late, but the total production for the first three months of the year was far more than a year ago. Hard coal prices are holding relatively steady, and it will take time to adjust the national position to a normal basis. Total production of hard coal for the calendar year is still 53 per cent under the average of 1925 years.

STARTS LONG FLIGHT.
SANTA MONICA, Cal., May 6 (AP).—Flying the first of 37 planes to be delivered to the United States army by the Douglas company on a recent contract, Lieutenant Leslie Schell, attached to the office of the chief of air service, left here today in an O-2 observation plane for Maxwell field, Alabama. Lieutenant Schell, who served as an advance officer for the army's world flight, first will go to Washington, D. C.

REV. J. M. CAMPBELL DIES.
CLAREMONT, Cal., May 6 (AP).—The Rev. James Mann Campbell, D. D., one of the "grand old men" of the Congregational church in the United States, died here last night on his eighty-sixth birthday. Dr. Campbell had the author of more than 20 religious books that have been circulated internationally. At one time he was editor of the Christian Outlook and later one of the editors of the Christian Century.

ASTOR USED DIPLOMACY WHEN DUNNING MONROE

NEW YORK, May 6 (AP).—When the John Jacob Astor of 1862 decided to dun former President James Monroe for an old loan, he tactfully sandwiched his request between congratulations and best wishes.

This is revealed in an autographed Astor letter just sold by the American art galleries. Dated in this city, April 29, 1825, and addressed to "Hon. James Monroe," the communication reads:

"Dear Sir:—
Permit me to congratulate you on your honorable retirement (from public life) in which I most sincerely wish you may enjoy that peace and tranquillity to which you are so justly entitled.

"Without wishing to cause you any inconvenience on account of the loan which I so long ago made to you I would be glad if you would put it in a train of settlement if not whole let it be a part with the interest due.

"I hope these few lines you and Mrs. Monroe enjoy the best of health and that you may live years to witness the prosperity of the country to which you have so eminently contributed.

"I am most respectfully, Dear Sir, "Your obed. Svt.
"J. J. Astor."

AMERICANS AVERAGE ONE CENT PER DAY PER MAN ON VARIOUS CONFECTIONS

CHICAGO, April 6 (AP).—A penny a day comes from the pocket of the average American to buy peanuts, gum, or some similar confection from a vending machine.

Somewhere near a million dollars a day, mostly in pennies, is passing through narrow slots into vending devices. The machine which vends its wares for one cent cannot invariably take in larger receipts than a machine operated by a nickel, a dime or some larger coin.

There is a slot machine to every 10 in the United States, and the ratio may be even smaller, according to manufacturers. More than a dozen operating companies count receipts of upwards of half a million dollars a year.

The largest single operator is believed to be William Weigley, who recently purchased the machines in the New York subway, where approximately 10,000 are installed.
