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WILL COMPLETE MANY BUILDINGS

Incomplete Structures to Get First Consideration in Federal Housing Program. WASHINGTON, June 3. (AP)—Federal authority for the construction of the last 13 years but uncompleted, because of inadequate funds will gain priority in the new federal housing construction program as decided upon today by the treasury and postoffice departments. The \$200,000,000 public buildings bill recently passed authorized an appropriation of \$15,000,000 for the completion of 600 projects, most of them authorized in 1913. About half that appropriation will be sought for the remainder of the projects this summer. ADOPT REPORT AGAINST VOTE ON LIQUOR ACT

Senate Prohibition Committee Makes Short Work of Proposals for National Referendum; Table Bills.

(By the Associated Press) WASHINGTON, June 3.—Short shift was made today by the senate prohibition committee of proposals for a national referendum on the wet and dry issue and for modification of the eighteenth amendment and the Volstead act.

Three of the five members of the committee, which recently held lengthy public hearings on the measures, quickly voted a report by its chairman, Senator Menzies, of Colorado, recommending that the bills be definitely re-committed.

Senator Menzies, Gift, West Virginia, and Harrell, Oklahoma, republicans, signed the report, which also has the approval of Senator Walsh, democrat, Montana.

To File Minority Report. Senator Reed, democrat, Missouri, the chief member of the committee, said he would file a minority report later.

With respect to the proposal of Senator Edges, republican, New Jersey, for a national referendum on the prohibition question, the majority report said that a referendum was not provided for in the constitution and that it was the belief of the senators that it was not the intention of the framers of the constitution that a national referendum would ever be attempted.

The proposal of Senator Harrell, democrat, Maryland, for modification of the eighteenth amendment, so as to retain control of the liquor act, was also rejected. The committee was divided with the observation that "we believe this amendment to be morally right and occasionally wise." The report added that as long as the prohibition amendments is a part of the fundamental law it is the duty of all officers, legislative, executive and judicial, to abide by its enforcement.

Proposals Contrary to Law. Turning to the Volstead act and those of Senator Edwards, democrat, New Jersey, for modification of the Volstead act, the committee said its purpose was directly or indirectly to authorize manufacture and sale of intoxicating beverages "without the spirit and intent of the eighteenth amendment."

"The report was just as expected and the action has been discussed for weeks," said Senator Edges. "We have accomplished more than we had hoped at this time. We have effectively drawn the attention of the country to the complete failure of prohibition and the necessity of practical revision of the existing legislative and clearly unjust laws. Such action cannot ultimately be evaded."

FARMERS NEED SOUTHERN AID

Fate of Relief Legislation in Senate Hinges on Action of Members From South.

WASHINGTON, June 3. (AP)—With the fate of the farm relief legislation hanging on action of members from southern states, southern senators today joined in discussion of the McNary equalization fee measure.

Summons of the bill, which is similar to the Harrell proposal rejected by the senate, is to be introduced in the house, unless supported by southerners, some of whom expressed doubt as to its wisdom.

Senator McNary, republican, Oregon, who is leading the fight for the bill, was subjected to a hot fire of questions during the debate and he declared the measure would favor the producer and consumer and that opposition was coming from the middlemen and profiteers.

Asks Reason for Decline. Senator Mayfield, democrat, Texas, wanted to know why it was that the price of cotton had not been sustained during the year when 4,000,000 bales were burned over to cooperative organizations.

Replying, Senator Gooding, republican, Idaho, declared the cooperative farmers had been forced to advance their funds to farmers in need of cash and could not hold the cotton long enough to demand a better price.

Senator Handell, democrat, Louisiana, asserted that only nine per cent of the producers had been heard from and that the equalization provision should not become effective until the other 91 per cent had had an opportunity to voice their opinion.

SOLONS DIRECT INVESTIGATION OF GAS PRICES

Trammel Resolution Calling for Probe of Situation Approved by Upper House Without Record Vote.

(By the Associated Press) WASHINGTON, June 3.—A resolution directing the federal trade commission to investigate the increased price of gasoline and other petroleum products was adopted today by the senate without a record vote.

The resolution, introduced by Senator Trammel, democrat, Florida, requires the commission to report to the senate at the next session of congress "whether increases were arbitrarily made and unwarranted."

The commission is further directed to determine if there are any agreements between oil companies to raise or depress prices or if competition is restricted by conditions of ownership of oil properties, refineries or marketing facilities.

Senator Trammel held the resolution before the senate for a week and each time there was a bill in the proceedings he asked for action, but it was always postponed repeatedly for some other measure. He accused the senate of wasting time over trivial affairs while the public was paying a heavy toll to the oil trusts.

In making his report, Senator King, democrat, Utah, used the resolution as a platform to again attack the federal trade commission, declaring that as important as the resolution was he did not believe an inquiry by the commission with its present majority personnel would be fruitful.

In reply to the defense of the oil industry, Senator Harrell, republican, Oklahoma, declared an investigation was not warranted as the rise and fall in oil prices was justified. He accused senators of being afraid to vote their consciences when it came to the oil industry, which he said, is now being operated along ethical lines.

The Oklahoma senator was speaking at 2 o'clock when the farm relief bill automatically came before the senate and he then left the chamber. Immediately Senators Harrell, democrat, Alabama, and Trammel charged that Harrell had attempted to obstruct action and that the senate should not be held up by any man.

During the argument that ensued, Senator Harrell responded and no answer but he had no objection to a vote. The resolution then was adopted by a house vote of 200 to 100.

The resolution is effective without house concurrence or presidential approval. A majority of the commission several months ago declined an unwillingness to act on resolutions for investigations adopted by only one branch of congress unless violations of the anti-trust act were involved.

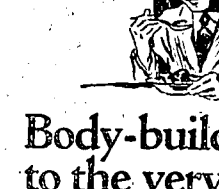

ANNAPOLIS, Md., June 3. (AP)—Mississippi, E. H. 'FARMER BILL' PARKHURST DIES IN BOISE HOSPITAL

BOISE, June 3. (AP)—W. S. Parkhurst, representative at American Falls of the state legislature, died today at a Boise hospital. The body will be taken to Tropic, Kansas, after a funeral service Friday afternoon.

Mr. Parkhurst, known as "Farmer Bill," was active in politics and journalism during his 15 years in Idaho. He was editor of the Richfield Courier and of the Bingham County News, and

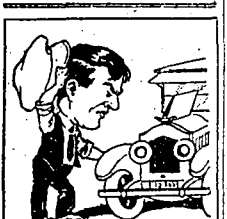

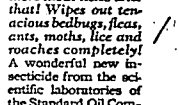

SALMON TRACT CONSIDERS CUT TO GAIN WATER

Elimination of 7500 Acres Under A System to Improve Rights on Remaining Area Claims Attention.

Elimination of approximately 7500 acres from the Salmon River irrigation project is being considered as one of the proposed methods of augmenting the project's water supply. It was stated here Thursday evening by Nelson Hayward of Allendale, president of the Salmon River Canal company.

The lands that would be eliminated from the project under this proposal are located at the south end of the project under what is known as the A system of the Salmon River canal system. Average annual diversion of water to the system amounts to approximately 17,000 acre feet, of which, according to computations made by Fred Bates, superintendent for the Salmon River company, only about one-third or 12,000 acre-feet is actually delivered to the farmers, the remainder being wasted as a result of evaporation and other losses in transmission.

It is proposed, if the elimination plan is carried out, to apply to the 50,000 acres remaining within the project the water that is now diverted to the A system.

Discussed by Settlers. The plan is being widely discussed among Salmon project landholders, and meetings have been called to be held Monday evening at Rogerson and Tuesday evening at Berger for consideration of the subject.

Other possible methods of augmenting the project's water supply which are being investigated by the canal company include the plan advanced by E. V. Berg, Twin Falls engineer, for lifting American Falls storage water to the project lands, and proposals for utilizing the waters of the east fork of Jarbridge river or the resources of Brunson river.

A second allotment of water for the season has been fixed by the canal company directors, bringing the total up to 7.5 acre inches per irrigable acre.

Gain at Reservoir. Level of water in the reservoir has fallen about five feet under the high mark for the season. Some recent gain has been recorded as a result of the voluntary action of the Utah Construction company in turning off its water for 10 days. This action followed a vigorous investigation carried on this season by the Salmon River company, and is the first concession of its kind made by the Utah Construction company to the Salmon river project.

A meeting of settlers is to be held in a few days to determine the time for making the second run of irrigation water. The second run is to continue for 10 days, and, according to present indications, it will begin about June 12.

Finch over the head in an attempt to escape from the Twin Falls county jail Wednesday night. The weapon was ineffective for DeCamp's purpose. The sheriff was not even inconvenienced.
