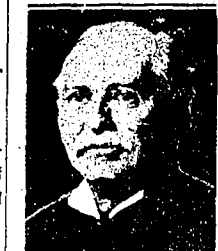

EVER ACCUSED YOUTH INSANE Parents and Other Relatives Testify Everett Norris, Former Suspect, of Unsound Mind.

Parents and other relatives and acquaintances of Everett Norris, 22 years old, who is accused of forgery in connection with alleged issuance of a bad check, testified in district court here Wednesday in an effort to prove that the accused man is defective mentally and irresponsible.

Thomas Norris, father of the defendant on the witness stand Wednesday referred to two instances which in his opinion indicated that his son was of unsound mind.

On another occasion, Norris testified, Everett insisted that his father pay a debt of \$1 to a man who owed Everett \$11 for labor prior to the employer's payment with the latter.

Other witnesses testified that young Norris had displayed strong disposition to avoid companionship of other persons and when brought into court in controversy with other persons his disposition was to avoid such persons.

Statement was made by one witness that young Norris had inflated in the army about five years ago after confiding in the witness that he had been associated with other persons, whose names he refused to divulge, in a burglary.

Specific Charge. Everett Norris is charged specifically with issuance of a check for \$7.20 bearing the name of J. W. O'Donnell, is alleged to have been forged. The check bears date of July 29, last, it is said to have been cashed for Norris at the Wiley military store in Twin Falls.

PERSHING DECLINES. "I am compelled to deny myself the opportunity for an honor that might well crown the career of any soldier."

...I am not a candidate for the office, and have not authorized the use of my name in that connection. I shall be content to serve in the ranks. Because of important work that I have on hand at present, it would not be possible for me to give the exclusive attention to this task which my official responsibilities demand. If not, it is to be hoped that the Legion may be able to find someone as well fitted. And it is something for Pershing to remember that he was offered by others and declined it himself. SILK PRICE CONTROL

The Japanese government, it is said, plans to stabilize the silk price by enabling them to withhold their product from the market when necessary, and so keep the price from falling too low. It is some such assistance as Brazil has given her coffee growers, and it suggests the governmental support given the British East Indian rubber producers in controlling market and prices. Japan is the greatest producer of raw silk, and the price has fallen more than 25 per cent in the last three years. It is not likely, however, that Japan will go very far in this direction. For there is a trade weapon in this and other countries which is lacking so far in the case of rubber and coffee. Namely, the artificial silk, can be used for almost any purpose the natural silk can be used for, and its quality is steadily improving. The United States can produce and handle the artificial silk, and has ample weaving facilities to supply its own market. So great, in fact, is the development of this new industry that it may eventually put the silk worm out of business and drive Chinese and Japanese silk growers into some other industry.

EMPTYING THE LAKES
