

WIVES NEW DEFENSE FROM ARIZONA TOWN

Telegraph Operator Would Testify Regarding Message He Declares to Have Been Sent by Mrs. McPherson.

(By The Associated Press.) LOS ANGELES, Oct. 6. (AP)—The wife of a man who was charged with the murder of a woman in Phoenix, Arizona, today was subpoenaed to testify in court.

The evidence is a statement from F. J. McPherson, telegraph operator at Globe, Arizona, who declared he has identified Mrs. McPherson from photographs as the woman who came into his office at Globe on June 15 and sent a message saying an automobile had been broken down and she was taking it to the garage.

Handwriting Similar. McPherson was writing when she dictated the message and the handwriting is similar to that of the woman who was charged with the murder.

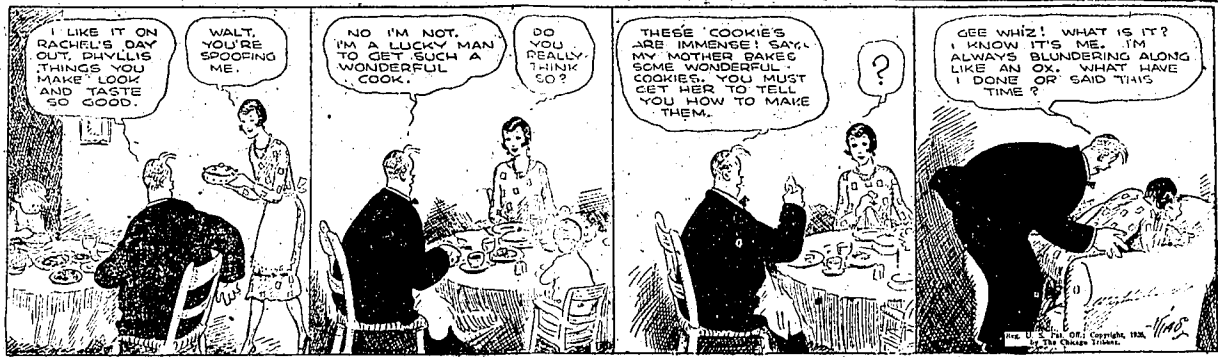

BRIDGES AND— Work upon the new South River bridge approach on the North side is proceeding steadily and negotiations are under way for the purchase of right of way for the approach on this side of the river.

As soon as this land is acquired, and the bridge company is in the responsible for the fact that the matter is still hanging fire, it is said to be the intention to let the contract immediately for the building of the approach on this side. When this is done the next step will be to clean up the canyon side so as to permit of the putting in of the concrete piers upon which will rest the two ends of the steel which will span the river.

The delays in connection with the beginning of work upon the bridge have been exasperating, there can be no question as to that. Yet it should be remembered that nearly two years elapsed between the date of the announcement of intention to build the Twin Falls-Wellis Railroad and the actual commencement of construction operations. Presumably there was good reason for such delay, although at the time the prediction was freely offered that the line would never be built.

In the case of the new bridge, the death of George Sears, president of the Union Bridge Company, together with the difficulties attendant upon the financing of the project and the tremendous amount of preliminary work necessary, constituted a big factor in the delay. Every successful project is characterized by extreme caution and in the case of a project of the magnitude of this it should be readily possible to understand this.

Presumably the work of building the bridge is now being prosecuted with reasonable diligence. Other delays may take place but it is altogether probable that they will not, so, with ordinary luck the structure should be open for traffic late next summer, possibly by July first.

This is the announced hope of the builders when the time comes we will know whether or not the announcement was justified.

To date nobody on either side of the river has a single dollar invested in the enterprise, other than the costs incurred in the granting of the franchise. The bridge is not being built by public money and the attempt to set up any such idea should be put down to the sort of political chicanery that has all along characterized the bridge negotiations.

The County Commissioners, acting in good faith, issued a franchise to certain interests empowering them to build a bridge over Snake River and in common justice to those on both sides of the river it is to be inferred that each brought to bear his best judgment upon the problem presented by the competing companies.

Probably a mistake was made in the

choice but if, in the case, there is no evidence and never has been that such mistake was other than a honest one. Nor is there any warrant whatever, outside the field of mere conjecture, that the result by the way of bridge construction would have been any different if the policy had been the other way.

The delay to date has been annoying and have drawn to the limit upon the patience of a good many people. But there have been altogether too many charges by laymen, too much inference of graft and "pulling," too much insinuation of favoritism and unfair figures concerning the matter on both sides of the river.

Added to which there is apparently an attempt under way to hoodlum the undertaking into believing that the "people's money" has been lavished in the enterprise and that if the structure is not completed forthwith Twin Falls and Jerome Counties will lose a million dollars in hard cash through the failure of the enterprise.

This is the kind of misrepresentation which depicts the average man with the whole movement of action and shakes his faith in the common, everyday honesty of mankind. It's unpalatable.

Student Assembly Hear Congressman

The children of Idaho are her most important resource," stated Congressman J. H. Bond, in an address before the assembled students and faculty of the high school Wednesday afternoon. You are an individual, in this high school, with a capital of intelligence and time invested. You make a profit if you get all it is possible to get from the school. There are four factors necessary to success, and they are ambition, initiative, and thousand and personality. With them you can do anything."

A recipe for success in the universal search for happiness was mentioned by the speaker. "If you can cultivate by yourself those things which you admire in others," he said, "you will be well on the way toward happiness. After all, the real test of happiness is the feeling that you are filling in useful places and trying to contribute to the happiness of others."

Congressman Smith was introduced by Superintendent E. D. Bloom. As a result of his address, the assembly singing of old time melodies and school, state and patriotic songs, completed the program of the assembly.
