# WETS AND DRIES HOLD DIFFERENT VIEWS ON VOTE

### Both Factions Claim Victories in Tuesday's Balloting on Issue; Four States Desire Modification, Returns Indicate.

(By The Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, Nov. 3.—The wets and the dries were far apart today in their interpretation of yesterday's election as it related to prohibition amendment as they are on the actual issue.

In every state where the dries had a fighting chance, except Massachusetts, they won in the senatorial contests, according to reports received at the headquarters, said Wayne H. Wheeler, of the anti-saloon league.

The result of this election should insure Volstead act revision within constitutional limits, said Senator Edge, republican, New Jersey, a leader among the wets.

### Wheeler Makes Claims.

Mr. Wheeler said that "even in Massachusetts, Governor Fuller, an outstanding drier, was re-elected governor by about 200,000 majority against Mr. Gaston, who said that he was the only man for the people."

"This shows that the liquor issue was not the dominant one in the defeat of Senator Butler," he said. "The wets got only one out of 35 senators elected. In the house elections, the wet strategy has been to pick out a few legislators who might win but even with the odds in their favor in these chosen senatorial districts, they have secured an amazing loss of defeat."

### Returns Incomplete.

"We do not have final returns on the referendum votes in the four states where they are asking for repeal of the state codes. The wets may win in one of these. The dries had only a short time to organize, while the wets, who spend money freely, prepared their organization during the time they were circulating their petition."

Senator Edge indicated that the results showed more of a wet ratification than a drier victory.

"Democratic claims that the result is a condemnation of Volstead economic policies is ridiculous," he said. "State issues and the wet and dry issue have accomplished the result."

## POISON BOMBS IN SPOTLIGHT

### Chemical Warfare Main Topic of Preliminary Disarmament Conference.

GENEVA, Nov. 3.—Predictions that great cities like New York and London could be bombed by poison gas bombs hurled from aeroplanes has caused delegates to the preliminary disarmament conference to attach special importance to their discussions on chemical warfare.

The United States, Great Britain, France and Belgium, which countries have been on opposite sides of important technical problems, are now in an agreeing attitude normally employed for chemical purposes, including dye works, can quickly be adapted to the manufacture of poison gas. There are many uses, including the question of poisons to be imposed upon any country.

France, which is the only country which has ratified the anti-poison gas treaty of Geneva, has come out stoutly in favor of treaties in the form of a treaty of Geneva, but which violates its agreement not to use gas.

In this proposal, France was supported by Belgium, Bulgaria, Czechoslovakia, Finland, Hungary, Rumania and Yugoslavia, but she was opposed by the delegations of the United States, Great Britain, Italy and Japan.

### France Has Little Fear

France, and her followers are convinced that the fear of reprisals would be sufficient to prevent any state from resorting to chemical warfare and that the more forcible the reprisals, the more likely would be their preventive influence. Hence it is suggested that all states in possession of chemical industry should undertake to put the control of any state that is attacked by gas, the raw materials, chemical products and means of operation necessary for production and to engage in joint reprisals themselves, so far as distance permits, by the use of gas, chemical warfare against the state which has committed an act of aggression by using gas.

### The American Delegation Opposed

The American delegation opposed to this idea. First, because it dislikes any suggestion to associate the danger from chemical warfare. The committee will tell the preparatory commission that in the gas industry, for example, the intermediaries employed are themselves persons of considerable means who are capable of immediate aid in chemical warfare. They have the means to produce gas, which are articles of commerce, can be used as poison gas, so that the plant which produces them for industrial purposes are immediately available for war use.

### COBB GIVES UP DETROIT TEAM

Manager of Tigers Succumbs to Constant Criticisms and Resigns.

DETROIT, Mich., Nov. 3.—The team has sounded for Tom Cobb. After 21 years of brilliant baseball, the Georgian, wearying of constant criticism for his failure to develop a pennant winning club, resigned today as manager of the Detroit Tigers.

George Moriarty, American league umpire, who has made his baseball reputation as field manager for the Detroit team, will be the new manager. His selection was announced today by President Frank J. Navin.

Cobb left for St. Auguste, Georgia, home immediately after tendering his resignation. Friends said that Cobb will devote his entire time to business interests. He is generally reputed to be the wealthiest of the baseball players and will not don a uniform for at least a year.

The announcement came as a distinct surprise to Detroit fans. Cobb has been severely criticized, especially in the past two years for his management of the Tigers. Many fans have called loudly for his managerial scalp. Often times have mingled with cheers in the past two years when he took his turn at the bat or trotted in from center field to argue with an umpire.

Cobb has possessed, during all his baseball skill and smartness developed by 21 years of major league league play to give Detroit the best ball club he could.

ROYAL TRAGEDY RECALLED WHEN PRINCESS WEDS

New Matrimonial Venture of Widowed Princess Marie Augusta of Prussia Gets Little Notice in German Press.

(By The Associated Press.) BERLIN, Nov. 3.—The marriage of the widowed Princess Marie Augusta of Prussia, youngest daughter-in-law of the former king, to her childhood sweetheart, recalls one of the saddest matrimonial tragedies of the Hohenzollerns in recent times. The second wedding of the princess was barely mentioned in the German press.

Born 23 years ago as a Princesse of Prussia, Marie Augusta was married in 1916, to Prince Joachim, youngest son of Wilhelm II. She was only 18 years old, her fiancé was 20. The union was an unhappy one. While divorce proceedings were pending in 1920, Joachim committed suicide.

STUDENTS ENTER TEACHING FIELD

Many Members of Class of '26 at Idaho University Choose Educational Work.

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, Moscow, Nov. 3.—(Special to The News).—A study of occupations of students who were graduated from the University of Idaho last June shows that the largest number of members of the class of 1926 entered the teaching field, most of them taking positions on high school facilities in Idaho and neighboring states, teaching all the mathematics and sciences, such as agriculture, home economics, commercial branches and athletic coaching.

Two are connected with the Lewiston State Normal and one with the Montana State Normal at Dillon; another teaches home economics in the Spokane public schools; one is a superintendent of schools and two others are high school principals; another teaches basketball and other sports at Lewis and Clark high school in Spokane.

Many Do Graduate Work. Altogether 25 are thus listed as teachers. There are 21 others who are engaged in graduate study in various universities, and a considerable number of these are also doing a certain amount of teaching in connection with their study. One is taking graduate work at Harvard, two are in the University of Oregon medical school, and five are taking advanced work in forestry at Yale.

Of the engineering graduates, one is employed by the Great Falls Paper Service company at his home town in Maryland; another is in training with the Chicago Central Telephone Institute; one is taking training with the Commonwealth Edison company, Chicago; two are draftsmen for the American Bridge company at Gary, Indiana; three are with the General Electric company; two with the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company; one with the Washington Water Power company, and one with the Interstate Commerce commission at Washington.

SEEKS RED ORE RICH IN GOLD

Old-Time Prospector Spends More Than Fifty Years Hunting for "Lost Lead."

HILLSBORO, N. M., Nov. 3 (AP)—After years of search for a "lost lead" of red ore, said to have been hidden in the town, Mount Taylor, aged by active American-Mexican mining, who says he is a descendant of General Zachary Taylor, will have about this section of the mountains in his life and to have made at least six big mineral strikes and spent as many fortunes.

One More Grubstake Taylor now is taking out a living and saving toward one more grubstake by prospecting and mining near Gold Dust, N. M., with a primitive machine he calls "the pore man's concentrator." He is reported to have mined on a vast scale at various times in his life and to have made at least six big mineral strikes and spent as many fortunes.

For instance, in 1800-1807, when an epidemic of influenza struck this part of the country, Taylor is reported to have having bought 125,000 dollars and paid the funeral expenses of as many of the poor of his community.

Early in the 1850s an Indian friend told young Taylor he could lead him to "lead much gold." They set out and penetrated the wild San Matilla mountain country. Finally they reached a spot from where the red ore could be mined and they got much like black dust, and granted dramatically.

Here he made gold. Taylor was disappointed to see no trace of gold in it. He was then ignorant of metallurgy. However, he wrapped some of the stuff in a handkerchief and threw it into one of his pants. He returned to Silver City, N. M.

One day, months later, Taylor was clearing his logs and found some of the stuff he had buried. He rubbed it on his palms, he suddenly noticed many particles of fine gold appearing as the sand blew away. He took the stuff to an assayer to learn that the dust tested \$200 gold to the ton.

In the meantime his Indian guide had died. And for 40 years Taylor has failed to relocate the treasure spot again.

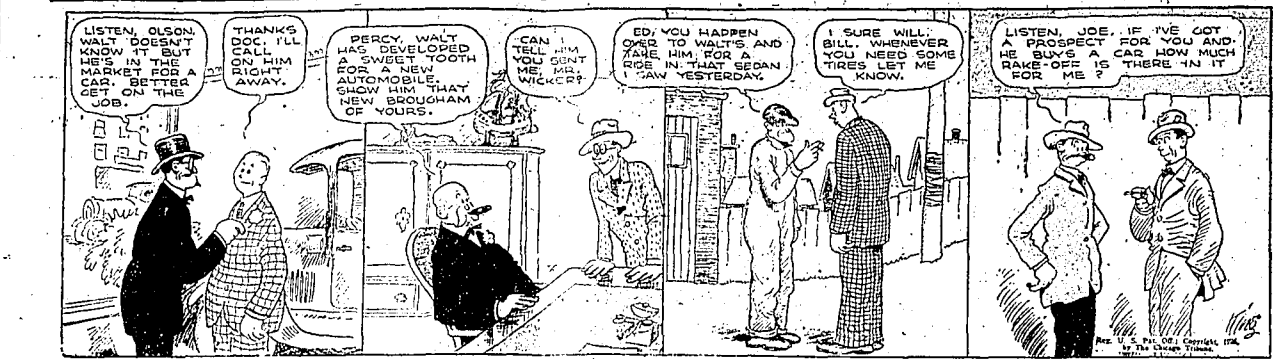

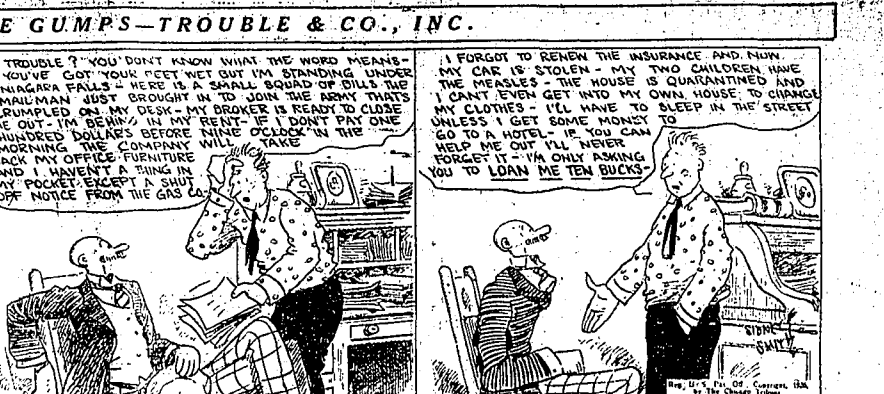
