

DEMAND EARLY ACTION TO AID FARM MARKETS

Delegates to Corn and Cotton Conference at St. Louis Adopt Declaration of Principles at Final Session.

(By The Associated Press) ST. LOUIS, Mo., Nov. 17 (AP)—Early action to bring about a more controlled and unwise excess supplies of crops at their own expense so as to obtain cost of production with a reasonable profit, was demanded by delegates in a declaration of principles adopted at the closing session here today of the corn and cotton states conference.

Endorsement of the federal farm plan by the agricultural leaders of the states was the chief feature of the conference. The plan, which was introduced by the late Senator Charles McNary, calls for a reduction in the production of surplus crops and a corresponding increase in the production of the staple crops.

DEATH SUMMONS C. B. CARTWRIGHT

Twin Falls Pioneer Business Man and Descendant of Famous Family Found Dead.

Charles H. Cartwright, who in 1864 with W. G. Barr, established the Twin Falls first grocery store, was found dead Wednesday morning at his residence at 132 Tenth avenue north. Death was attributed to effects of a fever of the chest and throat, which he had been afflicted for nearly seven years. He was 77 years old. Mr. Cartwright never married, and had lived alone for many years.

Death is believed to have occurred during the night. The body was found by Burton E. Morse, a neighbor who, apprehensive over Mr. Cartwright's condition, called at the house when he found the door ajar and a strong smoke issuing from the chimney or other indications of activity within. The body was removed to the coroner's morgue. No arrangements have been made for funeral services pending advice from the surviving relatives, in brother, Dr. Cartwright of Salem, Oregon, and a sister, Miss Emily Cartwright of Oregon, Illinois.

Mr. Cartwright was a nephew of Dr. Peter Cartwright, celebrated Methodist minister, who was defeated by Abraham Lincoln in 1840 for election to the United States house of representatives from Illinois. His older brother, the late James H. Cartwright, was chief justice of the Illinois state supreme court at the time of his death some months ago, at the age of 81 years.

Graduate of Princeton university and an ordained minister of the Unitarian church, Mr. Cartwright held the first position in the west and spent many years in western states and in Alaska. He devoted many years to work as an instructor in public schools.

The grocery, which was established here by Mr. Cartwright and Mr. Barr on Third street south, was sold to the late Harry Allen and became the nucleus of the Idaho Department store, which was organized subsequently by Mr. Allen and associates. Mr. Cartwright, after the sale of the grocery, resided for some years as janitor of the Hotel Grand, and was held in high regard, both by teachers and students.

Active Odd Fellow

He was a charter member of Twin Falls lodge, Independent Order of Odd Fellows, which was instituted in 1902, and was active in the affairs of that fraternity. It was his wish expressed to members of the order here, that he should be buried in Twin Falls by the local lodge. Advice received Wednesday morning from the sister was to the effect that the body should be brought back to Illinois, and decision in this regard is being made.

When stricken by his grievous ailment, Mr. Cartwright was confined to a cot in his private and in hope of relieving the condition, he consulted specialists in Rochester, Minnesota, Portland and St. Paul, but he was the owner of the Cartwright

Mr. Koehler will assume active management of the theatre again, after several weeks absence, during which he submitted to a major surgical operation at the Twin Falls county hospital.

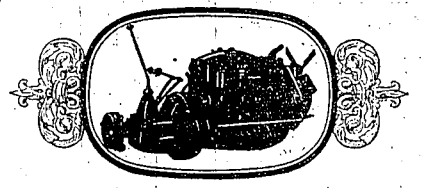

JURY ACQUITS IN WATER CASE

Verdict Declares William George Not Guilty of Interference With Irrigation Ditch.

William George, Twin Falls district farmer, is not guilty of misdemeanor charges of interference with an irrigation ditch alleged to have been committed on May 28 last, according to the verdict returned by a jury in district court here Wednesday evening at the conclusion of three days' trial in the case.

Under terms of Judge William A. Babcock's ruling on a motion argued by defense counsel, the jury viewed the ditch and premises in question Wednesday and received the case at 2:30 p. m., following closing arguments by attorneys P. K. Hickman for the defense and Prosecuting Attorney J. W. Taylor for the state.

The verdict was returned a few minutes after the jury returned to the court room on its own request to hear reading of a portion of the testimony on George's regard to the means he had employed on May 27 to equalize the distribution of water between his own farm and that of L. H. Griffin, both of which are served by the same ditch. Mr. Griffin was the principal witness for the state, who charged that a piece of wood placed by George in the diversion box had diverted to the George farm a greater amount of water than that to which he was entitled.

William H. George, son of the defendant in this action, was convicted last fall of interference with a local ditch in this district last June, and had appeared to the state supreme court on judgment involving 30 days term in jail and payment of \$200 fine.

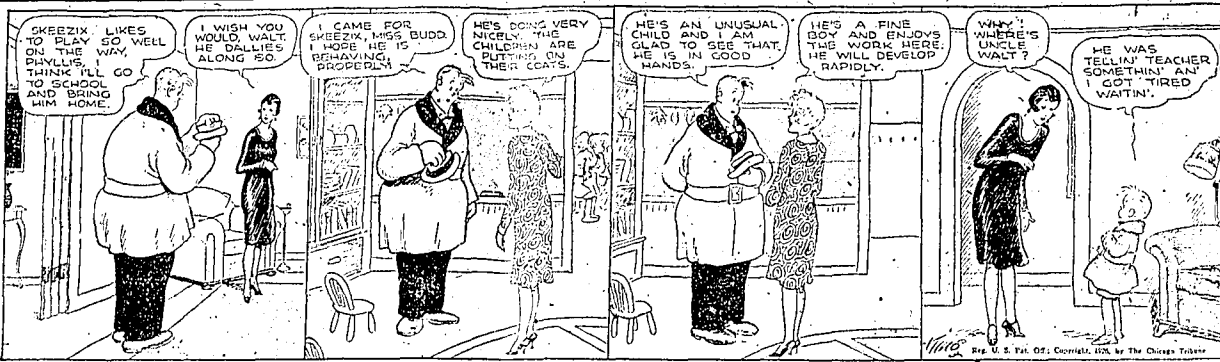
