## STATE CLOSES IN MOORE CASE

Prosecution Loses Point in Attempting to Connect Domestic Troubles With Death.

PORT ANGELES, Wash., Nov. 17 (AP)—The state in the trial of Dr. Paul D. Moore, accused of the murder of his wife, Anna, in Chicago, yesterday charged with the murder of his wife by administering poison, rested its case today. The announcement followed Superior Judge John C. Wilcox, that the medical conduct of the husband in an unusual manner ended in some way in the commission of the crime.

The state had declared that it would show that intimate relations between Moore and Mrs. Charlotte Kendall of Chicago, whom he had married, were connected with Mrs. Moore's death. CHICAGO, Nov. 17 (AP)—The government today asked authority in federal district court to confiscate 1,000 bushels of apples shipped from Yonkers, Oregon, to Chicago by the Suncrest Orchard, Inc. The government called technical experts and elements to testify that the apples were sprayed with arsenic to prevent them from ripening in storage.

Mary D. Bailey, assistant United States district attorney in charge of the government's case, said that only small part of the apple crop was involved in the government's investigation.

The government completed its case today and the orchard company will present its evidence tomorrow.

NEW YORK, Nov. 17 (AP)—The eyes of the financial and railroad world will be turned to St. Paul, Minn., next Monday, when the property of the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul railway, now tied up in the greatest railroad receivership on record, will be sold at auction under foreclosure proceedings.

The organization managers of the road—Kinder, Loeb & Co., and the National City Company—are expected to be the success-story bidders for the property, although opposing interests, including the Lake & Ingersoll Fire Insurance company, have indicated that they might submit a competitive offer.

An upset price of \$122,500,000 for the road, was recently paid by Federal Judge Wilkerson of Chicago.

Skates, Eatwater's store, 131 Shoshone street east, was entered by burglars between 7:30 and 8 o'clock Tuesday evening and about \$100 was taken from two safe registers, one in the front and one at the rear of the shop.

Officers Wednesday evening had recovered no clues in any of the three burglaries.

HAGERMAN, Nov. 17.—(AP)—Frank Gregg, 25, Idaho Power company operator at the Hagerman power plant, died in St. Alphonsus hospital in Boise Wednesday afternoon at 3 o'clock from effects of burns sustained Tuesday morning at the power plant when he was electrocuted while working on the 11,000-volt transmission line carrying 4,000 watts of electricity while making repairs at the Hagerman substation plant.

Gregg was given first aid attention in Hagerman and then taken to a doctor in the arrival of train No. 25, which was forced to wait for three hours before proceeding to the hospital. He reached Boise at 8 o'clock Tuesday evening.

He was admitted with Dr. R. H. Gagerman. He died 10 hours later. Mrs. Geneva Gregg, mother of the man, and his twin brother George, and Albert, 21 years of age, only survived him.

The body will be brought back to Hagerman for funeral services, which will be held Friday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock under auspices of the Old Fellow's Lodge of which the deceased was a member.

Interment will be in the Odd Fellows cemetery, Hagerman.

## ENDORSER'S LIABILITY TO BE TESTED IN SUIT
