WASHINGTON, Dec. 1.—The breach between republicans and democrats over how to tap the treasury surplus to the best advantage to the taxpayers' pocketbook widened today at the capitol.

Bourbons Want Immediate Out House democratic leaders, after a conference, came out in favor of an immediate \$500,000,000 cut in tax rates, while republicans party chiefs stoutly maintained that no such proposal should be advanced.

Under the democratic proposal, the corporation tax, at present 12 1/2 per cent, would be cut probably to 10 per cent. The plan was made public by Chairman Oldfield of the democratic congressional committee who said:

Longworth Opposes Program Even before the democratic program had been in the west, the White House, asserted that it was opposed to tax reduction at present and felt that treasury surplus should either be applied to President Coolidge's tax credit program or to the public debt.

# Borah Recommends Immediate Return Of Alien Property

WASHINGTON, Dec. 1 (AP)—Immediate return of German property seized during the war and rejection of the McNary-Haugen farm relief bill were recommended to President Coolidge today by Senator Borah, Republican, Idaho, at a White House conference.

While alien property is returned without qualification, United States government will be faced with the odium of confiscating private property and violating a principle on which the government was founded, the Idaho senator declared after his visit.

He predicted the measure now being drafted by the house ways and means committee providing for the return of a part of the property immediately and of the remainder in installments over a period of years would not be passed by Congress.

"In principle this measure would endorse confiscation," he asserted, adding "this government cannot afford to sacrifice its honor for some \$280,000,000. It would be better to pay the American claims out of the treasury or issue bonds to cover them."

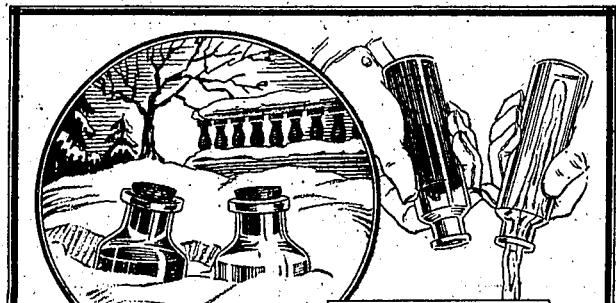

CHICAGO, Dec. 1 (AP)—Sergeant Mike Trant, Chicago detective and Jack Dempsey's bodyguard, always takes cream in his coffee—and so he turned today to the tale of "bunk" in a statement by Captain Charles J. ## "DEAR, DEE'DY DUBLIN" SCORNING ITS FACE

DUBLIN, Dec. 1 (AP)—"Dearidy Dublin," a traditional description of Ireland's capital, is being forgotten as the city is no longer dilly. The city commissioners have, by a contract with a Paris firm, succeeded in cleaning Dublin's streets as they have never been cleaned before.

But the Commissioners complain that the citizens handicap their efforts by careless habits and often strew the streets with match boxes, tram-tickets, cigarette cartons and other litter. Advertisements are urging better habits, and school organizations have been formed to teach a better civic spirit.

Only two movements were completed, a Fanfare scored for three trumpets, four horns, two horns, three kettle drums and one side-drum, and a piece called "King Lear's Ascent," written for strings, flute, horn and harp. The music, given its first performance by the Radio-Capitol Orchestra, has all the charm and poetry associated with Debussy's manner.

## PERENNIAL FOOTBALL SQUABBLE AMONG IDAHO SCHOOLS GREATEST BLOW TO ATHLETIC COMPETITION

The recent squabble over the state football title which caused considerable stir throughout the state is still being kept alive by the sports editors of the Idaho newspapers for their mediums, the Gate City authorities seem bent on stirring the emotions of the state to a high pitch of excitement and resentment toward each other.

As far as can be learned the facts of the controversy are these: When the state board of control met to fix dates for the inter-district games they decided that the winner of the title in the southern district should meet the winner of the western district on the field of the latter town, and the winners of that game should meet the title holder of the south central district in the latter district. The board also designated the Nampa team as the one to defend the title in the west. Pocatello was the outstanding team in the east, but had played but one game and was not invited and the board is said to have ruled that the Gate City team could not represent that district.

Claim Schedule too Heavy Pocatello officials claim this was not done, but that they withdrew their team because of the excessive expense, by the ruling of the board requiring them to travel to the west, and should have been allowed to play at home and then to go north for the state title game. The fact remains that Pocatello withdrew from state competition and no team in the west could be found to accept the title. The title in the south central district was as yet undetermined and Twin Falls played two games in as many days to win that title.

Pocatello played Twin Falls on November 5 and defeated the Bruins 2 to 0. At that time there were three defeated teams in the district, Gooding, Fruit and Twin Falls. Pocatello sought to have Twin Falls agree that this be called an inter-district contest, but no such agreement was made. Shortly after this the Gate City withdrew from state competition and Twin Falls went ahead, obeying the decrees of the state and district boards, and finally winning the title in the south central district.

And now find our friends usually engaged in selling an example of said stirring up process to the students of their institutions. And the next generation will have little better luck trying to solidify a state whose lawless resources go undeveloped and whose people wonder if hidden to the count, less thousands who eagerly seek new recreation grounds during each vacation period.

Why go on indulging our children with these needless hatreds and arousing the people of communities to senseless prejudice for this? Why school athletics? Would it not be better to eliminate competition altogether if it is to be the cause of such a future?

Ellsberg was awarded the distinguished service medal for his part in the S-1 salvage operations. Appointed to the post of lieutenant in command, though born in Connecticut, he was honor man of the 1011 class and was assigned to the naval construction corps.

## MAID FILES DAMAGE SUIT

NEW YORK, Dec. 1 (AP)—Suit for \$100,000 damages was filed in supreme court today by Margaret Mellon, niece, former party girl in the home of Myron C. Tilden, attorney, based on her arrest in connection with the theft of jewels valued at \$300,000 from the Taylor home November 8. The former maid also asked that she be awarded \$10,000 exemplary damages because of the "total disregard of her rights and liberty."

## PROTEST SEATING OF SENATORS

WASHINGTON, Dec. 1 (AP)—A protest against the seating of Senators-elect by Margaret Mellon, niece of Illinois, both republicans, in the executive congress because of alleged election frauds and excessive campaign expenditures was made today by the United Committee for Prohibition Enforcement.

## WILD BULL TERRORIZES CITIZENS OF DALLAS

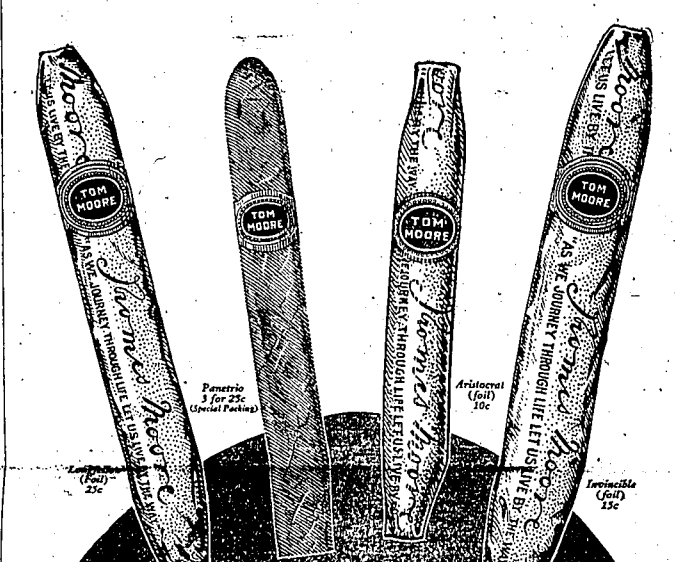
DALLAS, Texas, Dec. 1 (AP)—A wild Mustang bull terrorized several streets of Dallas today before he was killed by a deputy sheriff.

# HOSPITAL RULE UNDER ATTACK

### Defendant in Suit to Enforce Anaesthetist Fee at County Hospital Denies Validity.

Test of the validity of an order issued by Twin Falls county commissioners, requiring payment of an anaesthetist fee by all patients using the operating room at the county general hospital, is to be made in trial in the case of Twin Falls county against Kertson Green, which is to be held before a jury in probate court here today.

The case is one of five similar actions instituted simultaneously by the county attorney to enforce collection of the fee.

In the test case the fee amounts to \$7.50. Defendant has declined to pay it on the grounds that anaesthetist in his case was administered by a person other than the anaesthetist employed by the hospital, and he alleges neither the fee nor the commissioners' requiring payment of the fee is "unreasonable, capricious, arbitrary and unjust, and not within the power or authority of the board to rightfully or legally enact."

Defendants in the other cases included are: Frances Colquhoun of the Twin Falls, E. R. Byrne, C. Bruce Reagin, A. T. Hadlock and C. D. Thompson, each represented by Bethwell & Chapman, attorneys.
