IT CONTAINS SECRET CLAUSE

Recently Signed Treaty With Albania Merely One of Friendship, Assertion; Press Plays Premier Poincare.

(By The Associated Press) ROME, Dec. 8.—The recently signed Italian-Albanian treaty contains no secret military clauses and in an agreement considered injurious to peace in the Balkans, Italian official quarters stated today.

The treaty, it was asserted, is merely a part of friendship and arbitration between Italy and Albania, insuring peace, guaranteeing absolute sovereignty and territorial integrity to Albania, and confirming and extending the principles upheld by the league of nations.

Not Injurious to Peace Instead of being a means of penetration into Albania, Italy issued a solemn proclamation of Italy's abstention from internal Albanian affairs. It was within the Adriatic gulf, did not regard or affect the policy of the Balkans and that therefore it was absurd to describe it as injurious to Balkan peace.

Italian newspapers in general attribute the present outbreak in southern Europe to the French influence of active French influence at Belgrade under the guidance of Premier Poincare who is charged with changing the more moderate policies of Foreign Minister Briand.

Charges Military Agreements "Besides political agreements France and Jugoslavia have already concluded and developed military agreements," the paper declares.

In accordance with such military agreements, the treaty of commerce of Liego supplies Jugoslavia with cotton and woolen goods, and the last result at Suttari, Albania, had as its inspirer and ally the Jugoslav government, which is in alliance with France.

Mining Men Told Shortage of Oil Danger Is Remote

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8.—(AP)—Danger of an oil shortage in the United States is being downplayed by the American Mining congress today, as the Rocky mountain oil shale deposits have a potential oil production sufficient to supply the United States for several hundred years.

Stabilization of mineral production and eradication of labor difficulties were discussed by a half dozen speakers, representing various coal and mining industries while Secretary of Labor, Davis recommended that a conference of all bituminous coal industry be called to place that industry on a "prosperous basis."

Alignment of the cost of production to the marketing value of mineral products of the west, including copper, gold and silver, was urged by Robert C. Kelly of Arizona. Thomas D. Brophy of New York, urged greater use of copper as a source of energy.

Harry N. Taylor, New York, advocated improved marketing methods, as a remedy for the coal industry.

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URGES AMERICA TO TAKE ACTION

Chinese Minister Would Have United States Act Independently in Terminating Pact.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8. (AP)—The United States was urged to act independently in terminating the "unequal extraterritorial treaties" with China by Dr. Sun Yat-sen, Chinese minister to the United States, in an address today before the conference on the cause and cure of war.

He declared that America should abolish the treaties if the powers do not end the pact.

"The extra-territorial treaties impose too heavy a burden on China," Dr. Sun said for the success of operation of her government. "The Chinese treasury being depleted, an income it should receive, and the normal and proper development of the economic life of the people being prevented."

Cause of Present Strife

"The present civil warfare is a result of the opposition of the United States to foreign control," Dr. Sun asserted, describing the movement as a "genuine nationalist war."

"The purpose is to secure a situation under which China will be allowed to retain her national sovereignty rights," he declared.

"The present military situation is not disrupting the political and economic life of the Chinese people."

Discussing the proposed independence of the Philippine islands, Representative Underhill, republican, Massachusetts, declared the Philippines "are now fit for self independence and are ready to be admitted as a representative republic," while Representative Gilbert, democrat, Kentucky, advocated the withdrawal of American authority from the islands.

CLOSELY FOUGHT SUIT PLACED IN HANDS OF COURT

Attorney's Maneuver Takes Fire Insurance Company Case From Jury When Both Sides Ask Directed Verdict.

A jury in district court here Wednesday was relieved of responsibility of determining issues involved in the suit of the Idaho Fire Insurance company against Fyfever Newton of Twin Falls, an action for collection of \$1700 on account of promissory notes given six years ago in partial payment for 250 shares of the insurance company's stock, and that responsibility was transferred to Judge William A. Babcock, when each party to the suit Wednesday afternoon moved for a directed verdict in its own favor.

Attorney for Newton, who claims that he was induced by fraudulent representation to purchase the stock and asks for cancellation of the notes and for judgment for \$300 cash payment on account of the stock purchase, first moved for a directed verdict. The plaintiff corporation's attorney immediately thereafter moved for an instructed verdict in favor of the plaintiff, and pointed out that the situation thus created automatically takes the case from the jury.

Extends Into Night Session

Attorney's arguments in support of the motions for directed verdict were concluded at a night session of court, when Judge Babcock took the matter under consideration until this morning. Trial in the case entered its third day Wednesday. Much of the time has been occupied by attorney's arguments have taken place in the absence of the jury.

In the afternoon Judge Babcock, H. G. A. Winters, examiner for the state department of finance, was permitted to examine his testimony on behalf of the defendant when court sessions were resumed Wednesday morning, and Fyfever Newton also testified further.

In rebuttal, the plaintiff introduced testimony of John W. Eagleson, president, and Theodore Harrelough, auditor for the insurance company.

E. A. Walters and R. P. Farry are conducting the case for the plaintiff corporation, and J. R. Rothwell and W. Orr Chapman for the defendant.

Alleges Fraud in Real Estate Trade

Alleging that she was induced by false and fraudulent representations to exchange two lots in Jerome for property in Twin Falls, of which she has been deprived without consideration, Nora O. Kallala, otherwise known as Nora Naha, has instituted suit in district court here for \$25,000 damages from J. N. Clark and H. S. Beale, E. E. Montgomery and Claude Big, real estate dealers, and the American Surety company and the Standard Accident Insurance company, their lenders.

Plaintiff, who is represented by Rothwell & Chapman, attorneys, alleges that she was induced by Montgomery and Big to deliver warranty deed to her property in exchange for a par-

ported quitclaim deed and assignment of sale covering the Twin Falls property which, it is alleged, Montgomery and Big retained was worth \$2500, with only \$1100 encumbrance against it. Titled to the Jerome property, according to the complaint, was transferred by M. Le Grange, owner of the Twin Falls property, to Beale and Montgomery, and by them to Mack Walker, an indentured servant.

It later developed, according to the complaint, that Beale was the owner only of a contract for purchase of the Twin Falls property but had failed to meet a payment so that the contract was forfeited at about the time the trade was made, and plaintiff was divested of title to her Jerome property without consideration.
