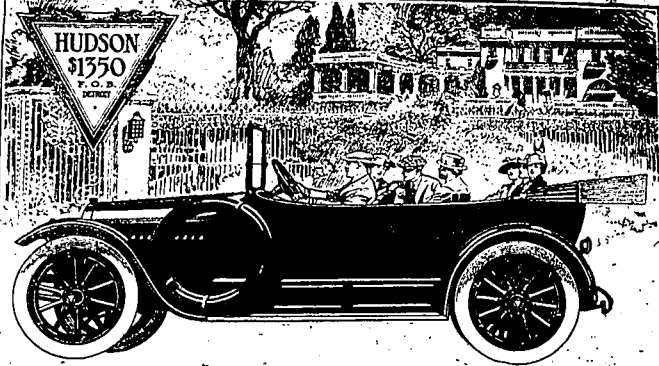

The Great Sawtooth National Park a Wilderness of Loveliness.

The Sawtooth National forest has an area of 1,230,130 acres and includes the headwaters of the big and little Wood rivers, Salmon river, the south Boise river. Its resources are varied and extensive and of the greatest value to the growing agricultural districts of Southern Idaho.

will enable you to reach practically every part of it. Telephone lines connect the principal points, and instruments are to be found at practically all the ranger stations, as well as at different points along the roads.

Those desiring to get away from the main traveled roads have ample opportunity by going with pack outfits into the south Idaho country or into the east fork of the Salmon river region.

Across the Salmon river valley are some high, rugged mountains known as "White" and "Grey" and "Green" Peak, which is nearly 12,000 feet in elevation.

is the country surrounding Mt. Hayden, the highest peak in Idaho, and the "Devil's Delictel" which form the divide between the east fork of the Wood river and Lost River.

There are also many pleasant places in the Sawtooth forest where anglers are more plentiful than in the Salmon river drainage.

Starting from Wood river point, Halley and Ketchum being the nearest it is possible to be in the heart of the so-called "Sawtooth Park" region in a few hours by auto, and in one or two days by wagon or pack outfit.

At the Ruskajohn ranger station, 21 miles from Halley, which will be found a telephone by which you can communicate with other points, and also with the ranger in charge of the Salmon river district.

charge will give you all the information he can. The best route into the east fork of the Salmon river is up Pole creek and down German creek. There is also a trail upper east fork going up Pole creek and Grand Canyon. Continuing on from the road crossing, a forest is 7 miles in 6 1/2 miles. A forest service telephone is installed at this place, the use of which is free of charge.

Another interesting trip from Halley is the one of Hyndman peak, the highest mountain in Idaho. This peak is about 20 miles distant from Halley, only about 15 miles of which can be traveled with vehicles.

From the Camas Prairie it is possible to go by auto or wagon into the big Snake and south Boise country, a scenery of great beauty.

It will be found that good fishing is the rule in almost all streams of any size in the forest. Game birds are well distributed and easily found, bear are fairly plentiful in the winter months, but very scarce in the summer.

Forest officers are always willing to render you all the assistance possible to make your trip in the forest enjoyable. Cooperate with them by using the utmost care with fire and by leaving camping places in a sanitary condition.

COMMENDS LAND LOAN SYSTEM

Federal Supervisor of Irrigation Mentions its Outstanding Features.

The state of Idaho has been a pioneer in the farm loan legislation. Other states have made considerable noise about their land loan legislation while Idaho has quietly put into operation a law which appears to be working to good advantage.

Under the laws of Idaho, the state land loan is permitted to loan all of the endowment funds upon improved farm land on the basis of not to exceed one-third of the actual value, not including buildings. The rate may be anywhere from one to five years with interest at not less than 8 per cent.

Another feature in which the Idaho law stands practically alone is the basis on which the amount of the loan is fixed. Idaho loans not to exceed one-third of the actual value of the property, not counting the buildings. Loans up to one-half the actual value of the property are secured by private and corporate money lenders and a number of the states are working out their loan laws on this basis.

The fact that Idaho allows loans on lands under government projects which lands are subject to water-right charges, may be considered a precedent and should be taken advantage of by settlers on government projects in other states, in support of their applications for loans of state moneys upon project lands.
