These cleverly designed, illustrated and description-illuminated books have for them a strange fascination.

There is still another class of mail order buyers—the folks who have a lared time to make both ends, unext. They save money's small part of the time, think they do a part of the time, but keep deceiving, themselves that they do all of the time.

These latter folks are often made incurable satalog-buyers by some unscrupulous store keeper, by discourteous clerks, by coming into centact with merchanjs who are not business men. Every place, has, the dealer who will not chapare his prices and merchandise with those of the catalog bayes. The mention of a catalog house throws him into a gentrum. This sort of a merchant is a work state. "Act of the catalog house concerns, if he will but have sense coungh to know that lea must ment competition with quality, price and service.






