F. Fire Consumes Grain Bin

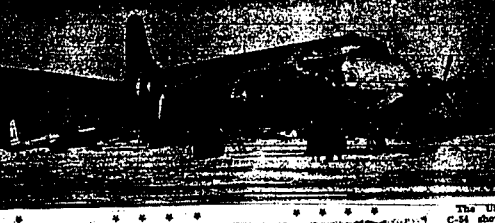

Air Chieftain Urges Immediate Forming Of 70 Combat Units

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8 (AP)—We have "none too much time" to prepare, Secretary of Air Springfield said today. And he restated his belief in a 70-group air force despite its heavy cost.

The 70 combat groups are one feature of a four-year program aimed at creating by 1952 an air force able to meet any crisis. The air force began building toward it last year but it takes annual appropriations to fill the program.

With a tight budget and a defense budget in prospect, the secretary of the air force said in a first annual report, "the expenditures of money which this program requires are great."

"Legislative and executive authorities must constantly weigh the state of world conditions, the military needs of the country and the financial aid with which the air force is carrying out the program.

"That it is almost sure that there be most carefully weighed the importance of stability and results."

This country has none too much time to provide itself with the means of its own defense. It cannot afford the waste of its time and resources that an inherent in reaction and stop-and-start planning.

Cold Weather, Sickness Cut Christmas Tree Fire Turnout

Quantities of roasted hollids, buns, relish and mustard, and cookies were consumed by scores of persons who attended the annual Christmas tree bonfire Saturday afternoon and evening in the 500 block of second avenue south.

The first fire was started at 2:30 p. m. and the second at 7 p. m., according to E. N. Price, who sponsored the event.

Bill to Raise Truman's Pay Is Considered

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8 (AP)—A bill to raise President Truman's \$75,000-a-year salary probably will be taken up by Congress next week.

Whether the bill will come as an outright salary increase, subject to a tax of 60 cents a tax expense (limit) or as a tax-free increase, will be determined by the House.

Speaker Rayburn of Texas said the increase in salary will be meaningful if it merely boosts the President's income into a higher tax bracket.

Rayburn predicted that Congress will increase the President's pay or at least raise the emoluments of his office.

But they split over how the raise should be handled. Representative Rich, R., Pa., told the House he favors a straight salary increase to \$100,000 or so—taxable.

"Let him feel the pinch of high taxes like everybody else," Rich said.

Mr. Truman now pays about \$25,000 a year in taxes out of his \$75,000 income.

Forest Usage By Stockmen Is Reviewed

HAILEY, Jan. 8.—More than 1,000 cattle and sheep graze in the Sawtooth national forest during the summer season of 1944, according to a report issued by Supervisor F. R. Moore, Hailey. Cattle remained in the forest on an average of slightly more than four months. The average stay of sheep was three months during the season. Stockmen reported the loss of 43 cattle and 1,236 sheep. Poisonous plants were held responsible for more than one-half of the cattle losses. Moose pointed out, and less than one-fourth of the sheep losses.

Prey animals accounted for nearly one-third of the loss sheep. Loss of 20 cattle and 700 sheep was charged to unknown and miscellaneous causes.

Although the cold spring held back forage growth early in the season, the year as a whole is considered to have been normal or above. When warm weather came, growing conditions were more favorable than in 1941. Earlier and heavier fall rains helped produce better late-season forage. Revenue from grazing during the year amounted to \$44,500, the report states. One-fourth of that amount is returned to the state of Idaho to be used by the committee which the Sawtooth national forest is located. Another 10 per cent is returned to the forest service for improvement and maintenance of national forest roads in the state.

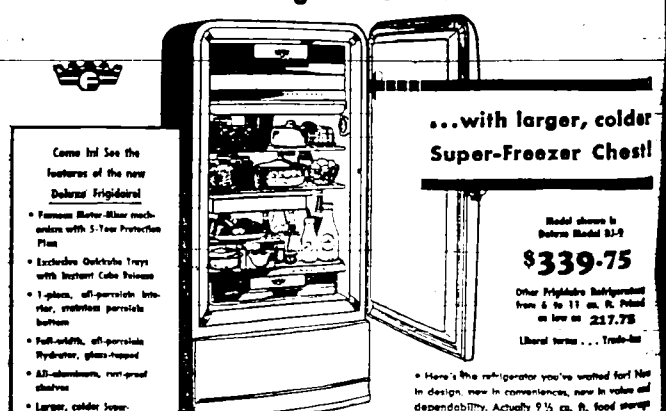
