Spud Supply Tops Needs, Agency Told

WASHINGTON, Jan. 20 (AP)—The agriculture department has more than enough potatoes to meet the needs of the country, a report from the bureau of agricultural economics says.

The survey showed that stocks of 1948-49 potatoes still in hands of growers and local dealers on Jan. 1 were between 25,000,000 and 28,000,000 bushels more than is expected to be needed before the 1949 crop becomes available.

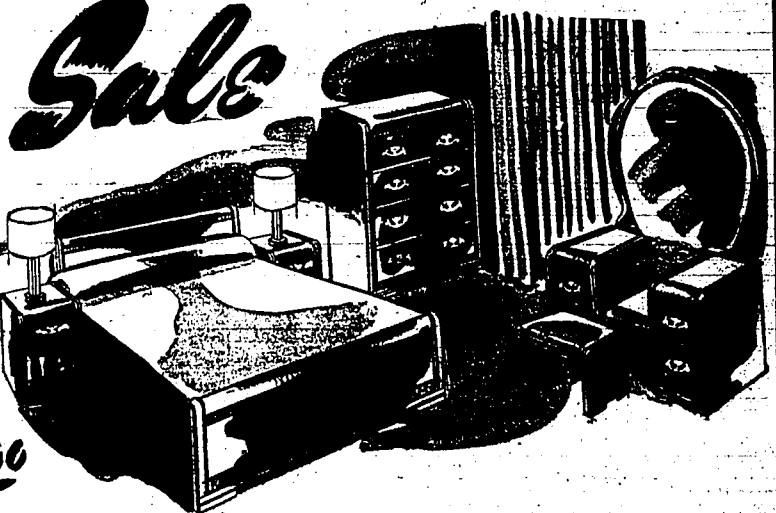

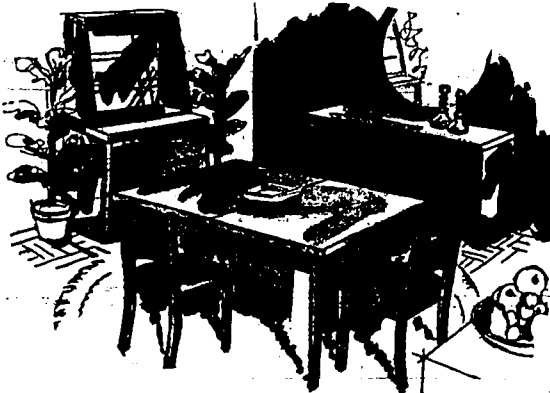

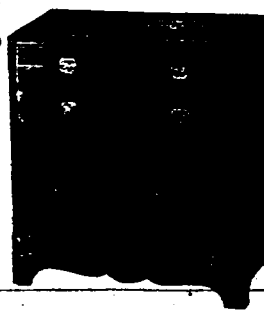

"If I were 21 again I would get a good education in whatever line I intended to follow," says Roy Painter. "I would work hard, economize, pick close companions, and live within my means. In fact, that's exactly what I did when I was 21."

When Painter was 21 he and a friend drove a team of broncos from western Kansas to Montana, a trip which was "just an outing." The long trek, which began in June and lasted until the middle of August, took them through Colorado, Nebraska, Wyoming and parts of Yellowstone park. A light spring wagon was used as they followed trails taken by old pioneers.

"I carried my 22 rifle and fish pole," Painter said. "We lived off the country. When fish and game were around we had plenty." They were taken to the Indian territory at night they tied the horses close to the wagon and slept under the stars. "I kept Indians from taking them. On July 4 they reached Ravenna, Wyo., where a three-day rodeo was in progress."

"We had no maps," Painter said. "We inquired of ranchers along the way where the next good water would be. We had to avoid farms and find good grazing places and water for the horses." They encountered quite a few non-pleasant experiences with bears in Yellowstone park. "Bears were made to swipe a song book from the Baptist church," he said. "However, the preacher donated one to our cause. After that there was no danger from bears and bobsleds until when we sang."

At 21 Painter had been to college one year. He had worked on a ranch, and in the fall of his first year he returned to Washburn college where he was secretary of the debating league. His career in banking began even before he was 21. During his summer vacations he worked in a bank in Ravenna.

"I started to school with \$45.00," Painter said. "I went through college and law school, and emerged with \$150, a typewriter, a good set of boxing gloves, and a wife—all paid for."

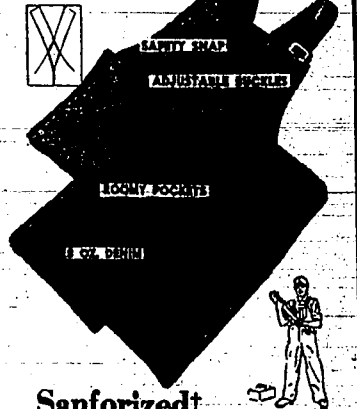

A total of \$15,000 was loaned to the polio epidemic fund of the \$54,000 raised last year, \$12,000 remained in the county.

Epidemic cases are treated in St. Luke's hospital, Boise, and convalescent cases are taken to the Infirmary, where the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis pays for care.

When patients are discharged from the hospital and returned to their homes they make periodic visits to the public health center for polio clinics.

Explosives Used By Power Firm To Open Stream

HAILY, Jan. 20—If the temperature stays as zero or above there probably will be little moisture for further blasting of water ways at Idaho Power plants in this area, according to Harry Purcell, local manager.

He said two cases of dynamite were shot off 10 days ago to blast the tailrace of the Bowers power plant of anchor log which had clogged it. The log had decayed wood fibers which overgrew the banks and covered the Broadford road which crosses the stream.

Blasting is done periodically, he said, especially in sub-zero weather when the anchor log forms under water, flows downstream and lodges against obstructions where it builds up and chokes the channel.

When temperatures are as high as five degrees above zero the stream will clear themselves, he explained. At 20 degrees below zero, the stream surface freezes over to a protective covering which prevents formation of the anchor log.

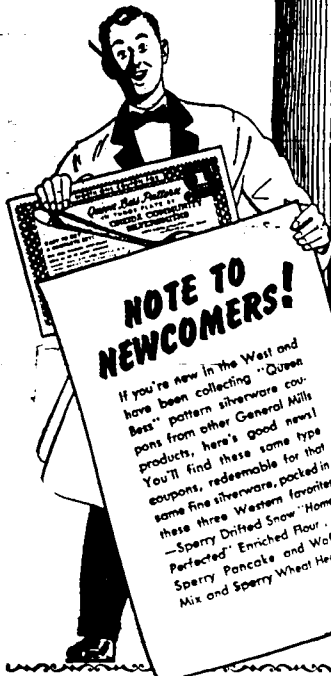
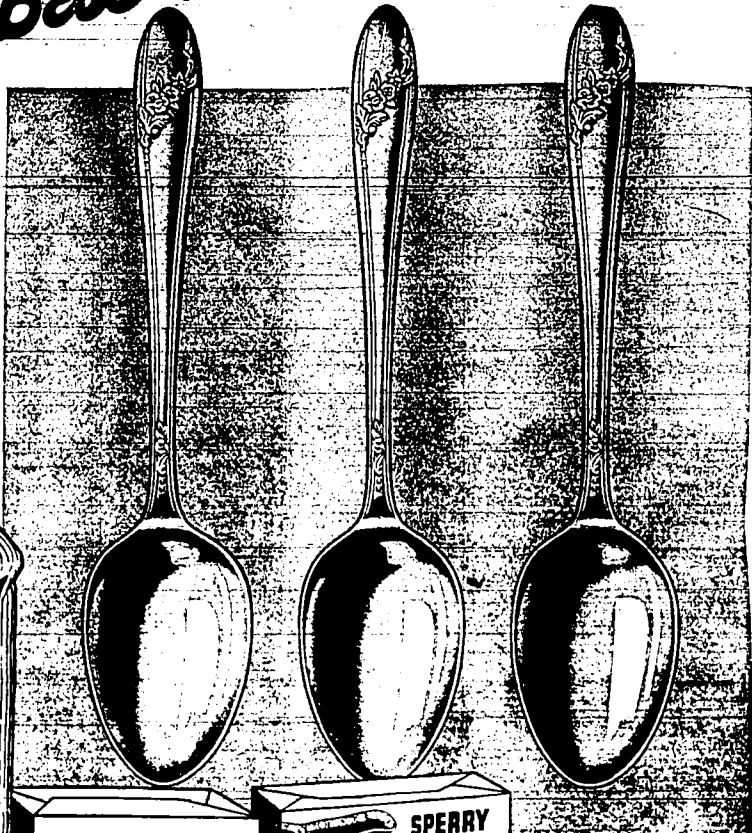
