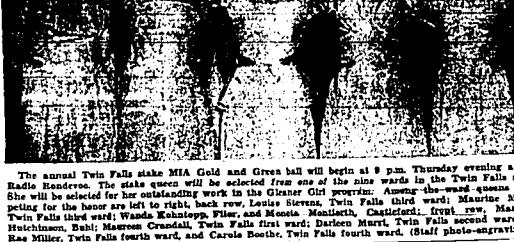

Solon Unveils Plans to Curb Wheat in '49

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22 (AP)—An anti-wheat bill to hold down this year's wheat and cotton crops was disclosed today by Chairman Henry Thomas D. Oiler, of the Senate agriculture committee.
Secretary of Agriculture, Brannan outlined the bill to the committee at a closed session, and Thomas told reporters afterward that the bill would increase the acreage of wheat to be planted.
Oiler plan calls for serving notice on wheat and cotton farmers that the 1934 crop their plant will not be considered part of their acreage production in figuring any future acreage allotments.
Thomas said the purpose is to "discourage large plantings of wheat and cotton" and to hold down the acreage of wheat and cotton farmers expressed fear that there may be rather large surpluses of both of those crops next year.
A Year Gains
Under present law, if acreage contracts are not signed by the farmer in the first five years of the plan the amount he is allowed to plant is the amount he planted in the first year.
