By WILLIAM F. HATCH BOISE, Jan. 26 (UP)—The Idaho legislature, taking a look at the ever mounting expense of state government, today decided to attempt a streamlining of all government activities in the Gem state.

A committee of eight, including the leaders of both parties, was announced to undertake the streamlining job. Four senators and four representatives equally divided as to party affiliation were named to the committee.

The committee includes Sen. C. Cannon, D. Emmers; Glen Handelman, D. Boucher; R. J. Coughlin; R. Bullington; Fred Taylor, R. Adm. Members of the house committee are Hanser Busby, R. Aida; Tom Bell, R. Minckler; Howard Hatcher, D. Nes Perce, and Ben Phelan, D. Lewis.

WASHINGTON—In an attempt to assure favorable publicity for the proposed amendment to the constitution which would give the president the right to appoint and remove judges, the House has passed a bill which would give the president the right to appoint and remove judges.

STEAM-ROLLERED—When "Dick" Wigglesworth, Bay State Republican, and others of the minority tried to ask questions in protest against what they called the "Communist-ordered" bill, they were rebuffed. BOISE, Jan. 25 (AP)—January 1940 will go down as southwesterly winds and a clear month record. E. H. Jones, federal meteorologist, has disclosed.

The dry season month on records dating back to 1878 was January, 1937, when the average temperature was 18.4 degrees, or 12.5 below normal.
