# Auto Crash Kills Hailey Man; Ends 64-Day "Record"

HAILEY, Jan. 29.—Eric Ast Broadie, 41, became Magic Valley's first auto accident fatality of 1949 Saturday. He died here of injuries received in a mishap at 5:45 p. m.

Broadie received a crushed chest in the accident when a 1947 panel half-ton truck he was driving collided with a Lincoln county caterpillar tractor about a half-mile north of Shoshone. Death of Mr. Broadie was not only the first for 1949 in the valley but it was also the first fatality since three persons lost their lives in two accidents last Thanksgiving day, Nov. 25, 1948.

On that date Norma Jean Price, 16, Burley, was killed in a rail-truck accident near Jerome, and Mrs. Mrs. Lloyd Strachan, Twin Falls, was fatally injured in a collision north of Shoshone on U. S. highway 30.

The 64 days which passed between the fatalities established an all-time record for the area since auto came into general use.

Lincoln County Sheriff Earl Clayton said the tractor was run into the Lincoln county road, about a half-mile from Shoshone. It had good lights. Sheriff Clayton said Mr. Broadie was driving the tractor. He said the tractor was traveling about 25 miles per hour when the crash occurred.

Mr. Broadie was taken by ambulance to a Hailey hospital. His condition was reported as "improved" Friday night, but grew worse later.

# Bulldozers Of Army to Fight Snow

The army moved in yesterday on the worst blizzard disaster areas of the west for "the biggest bulldozer operation since the Ledo road." Given virtually a blank check by President Truman for the relief of this area, the fifth army brought in personnel and more heavy equipment to break the snow blockades in the Missouri river basin.

Meanwhile low temperatures continued in Magic Valley with a low of 20 degrees below zero at Burley. It was the winter's lowest there. Other minimum temperatures Saturday included Burley, -9; Bellevue, -10; Gooding, -10; Rupert, -10; and Twin Falls, -22.

U. S. highway 308, between Burley and Trenchon, Utah, was reported closed to passenger cars by heavy snow. Trucks and buses Greyhound lines began plowing buses over that route Friday night.

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# Initial Survey Of Cafes Here Is Completed

Completion of the initial inspection of Twin Falls restaurants under the requirements of ordinance No. 76 has been announced by C. E. Colton, city sanitation officer.

Grades should be established within two weeks and grade signs and placards should be in place designated by the sanitation officer.

It is expected that signs other than grade A will be issued to some establishments. Colton said. This will be necessary because some operators do not realize the necessity of maintaining the letter of the ordinance or because some restaurant operators have failed to permit necessary changes in their landings in making changes in restaurant layouts.

The grades of the restaurants are established by the terms in violation on the successive days. If one or more violations are noted, the restaurant is degraded accordingly, Colton stated.

In other words, before a covered item is placed in the restaurant, it must be in a condition which is safe and after a reasonable amount of time has been allowed for the item to be degraded, he said.

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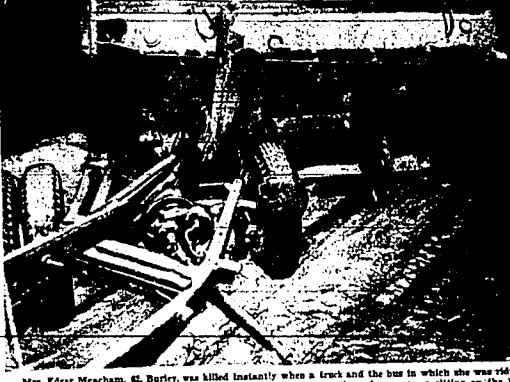

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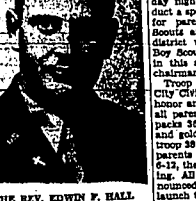

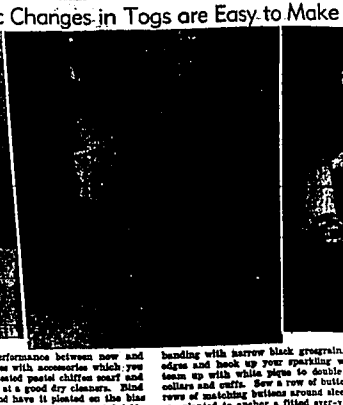

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### Hearings Set For Minidoka County Funds

**HOPPER**, Jan. 29—Tentative budgets for 1948 as set up by the county commissioners will be given a public hearing on Feb. 14. The tentative budgets listed do not include the county officials' salaries, which are approximately \$200 less than last year's figure.

The over-all budget figure including expenses governed by the state is \$1,181,153 for 1948, as compared with \$1,162,112 in 1947, an increase of \$19,041. The figures listed do not include the ward control fund which is not raised by taxes, but is paid by the farmers, who use the service.

### Retirement Boost

The principal increase in the state budget figures results from the inclusion this year for the first time of \$162,000 for the teacher retirement fund as established by the state legislature.

The county portion of the budget includes reductions both in salaries and estimated expenditures, salaries being trimmed from a total of \$412,113 last year to \$407,770 in this year's budget. An expense of all officers from \$27,964 to \$27,811.

Following is a brief review of the figures for each of the county officers showing 1948 expenses and 1947 tentative figures including salaries and estimated expenditures for all purposes:

But his career was hardly interrupted for he not only played for his fellow GIs but also gave many recitals under army auspices. Since 1944 he has presented three Carnegie hall recitals, a coast-to-coast tour appearing with such orchestras as the New York Philharmonic, the Miami Symphony, the Ottawa Philharmonic, the Philadelphia Orchestra and a return tour of Latin America.

During the 1945-46 season, Sandor presented world premiere performances of Bela Bartok's "Muzik and Last Piano Concerto." Over a nationwide network, Sandor, with the Philadelphia Orchestra, gave complete fidelity expression to the inspiration of his teacher, friend and fellow countryman.

A Columbia recording artist, the pianist has waxed two albums of his fine interpretations: "The Piano Music of Liszt" and Bachmann's "Record Piano Concertos," both of which were released by the recording company in two successive months.

South America recalls him each summer and his fame in the Latin countries is rivaled only by his fame as a North American concert artist.
